## Oil Control Expected

WASHINGTON (A)-The White House is expected to announce soon a mandatory control program to curb imports of crude oil, as a defense measure.

fense measure.

Government sources, reporting this Wednesday, said:

1. The office of Civil and Defense Mobilization now winding up a one-month investigation of the import problem, is preparing to advise President Eisenhower that the inflow of foreign oil is undermining this country's ability to meet its own needs in wartine.

2. A special cabinet committee named by Eisenhower to devise means of dealing with the problem has reached substantial agreement that the present voluntary restraints should be replaced with compulsory import quotas.

The voluntary system expires at midnight Friday. Announcement of the new plan may come this weekend, informants said, but the issuance of the specific quotas could be somewhat later.

The control system is expected to cover crude oil and unfinished gasoline.

It was uncertain whether it also would apply to finished gasoline, aviation fuel, and oth-

also would apply to finished gasoline, aviation fuel, and other refined petroleum products.
Officials predicted, however, that the limitations will not apply to residual fuel oil, received mainly from Venezuela.

## Congress to Retain Muddled Draft Law

IT SEEMS CONGRESS is still incapable or unwilling to ractify the hodge-podge existing in present selective service laws. So it winds up sticking to an obsolete and discrimmatory draft,

The Army is presently inducting young men at the rate of 7,000 a month. This month, 783 Michigan residents faced the draft.

The reason behind all of this is that Congress is afraid to abandon the draft. The Navy and Air Force feel that many of the volunteers new filling their needs would not volunteer if they did not face compulsory service anyway.

The problem is partly one of time also. The present draft hw runs out June 30. In January, Ass't Sec. of Defense Charles Finucane urged Congress to extend the present

VET THE PRESENT draft laws are far from satisfacbory. The idea behind the draft is that every citizen is obligated to serve the nation. This is all well and good, but the inequity with which the draft has been applied in recent years has made the concept of "universal" service midiculous and meaningless.

Deferments for physical unfitness, educational purposes, fatherhood and other reasons have reduced the manpower pool to the point where there is nearly a 60 percent selection for non-service.

MANY DRAFT BOARDS are filling their quotas entirely from category two, and the typical board is operating in category three at the 23-year-old level.

The result is that more and more eligible men are escap ing the draft, while the unfortunate category three men are bearing the brunt of the burden

As missiles and new weapons continually reduce the need manpower, the number of eligible men escaping the draft becomes even greater. The inequity and basic un-

A particularly distresing aspect of the situation is the apparent unwillingness of the Congress and the Defense Apparent unwiningliess of the and correct the inequities and position of the p injustices of the present "universal" selective service system. They seem to be content to take the easy way out

and merely extend the present system.

There is apparently no immediate solution in the offine Congress is presently considering two bills. One would simply continue the draft as it is now for four years. The other calls for a two-year extension plus a study to find ways of improving the present system.

One of these bills will probably be adopted with the end of June bearing down on Capitol Hill at full speed. At least, we hope it is the two-year plan, which would hold some promise for relief at a foreseeable date.

#### Athletic Attack Draws Many Sharp Rebuttals

An attack on athletic scholarships by the president of Yale University Wednesday drew sharp rebuttal from a number of college athletic officials.

In a speech at Johns Hopkins university Monday, Dr. A. Whit-nes Griwold, the Yale president, criticized athletic scholarships as "one of the greatest educational windles ever perpetrated on American youth."

American youth."

Dr. Griswold said "its aim is not the education of (American) youth, but the entertainment of its elders., not the welfare of the athlete but the pleasure of the speciator."

Yale is a member of the Ivy league, which prohibits athletic scholarships,
