Herter, 64, has been afflicted with arthritis of the hips for the past 10 or 15 years.



Herter Can Handle Paris Peace Talks

SECRETARY OF STATE DULLES' resignation, while expected sooner or later, cannot be received with anything but sympathy and regret

We have on occasion disagreed with Dulles' policies and methods, but his personal courage and self sacrifice can

DULLES ADHERED to his goal of world peace and his efficere program for attaining that voal in the face of more bitter opposition and crucial decisions than any American

Now the eyes of the world are focused on Washington to see who President Eisenhower will name as successor to the legendary John Foster Dalles.

Even before Dulles residued, it was announced that Act-ling Secretary of State Christine Herter would head the S. delegation at the Paris conference. BUT WHETHER EISENHOWER will name Herter to

replace Dulles is vet to be seen.

Herter does not have the same personal concept of per-

sonal diplomacy that Dulles was renowned for He prefers to make policy and let his subordinates in the field work

This, plus the fact that Herter is less known and perhaps less accepted by other diplomats, places him at something of a disadvantage in assuming the leading role in

MICH HAS BEEN made of this in the United States and there have been stirrings of alarm and deep concern over Herter's qualifications for heading the Paris talks.

Herter has a wide background of diplomatic experience and has been working closely with Dulles for a long enough time to be familiar with Dulles' philosophy and policy

We have always felt that the formulation and administration of foreign policy is not, and cannot be a one-man operation. Herter and his team of negotiators are wellversed in foreign affairs and the issues at stake in Paris We see no need for concern or alarm over Dulles' resig-

nation, Dulles was a skilled statesman, brave and forceful, We are sorry to see him incapacitated and sympathize

we are confident that Christian Herter is ready and able to handle the situation at Paris.



Dr. Robert Hoopes of New York, vice-president of the American Council of Learned Societies, was appointed Dean of the Faculty effective July 1. Appointed effective Sept. 1 were Dr. James H. McKay as associate professor of mathematics; Dr. Peter H. Amann, assistant professor of history, and Richard J. Burke, Jr., instructor in philosophy.

Hoopes' appointment "is the most important single step in the development of the promis-ing educational program of this new institution," said D. B. Varner, Chancellor of MSU-O.

"For the past several months "For the past several months we have been considering a long list of the ablest and most promising young educators in America for this key position and we are delighted that Dr. Hoopes has accepted our invitation to join our program. He is unusually well-trained, has broad contacts in educational circles on both the east coast and the west coast, and his experience during the past two years as Vice-President of the American Council of Learned Societies gives him an ideal background for this position." this position."

Hoopes, 39, is a native of Park Ridge, Ill. He was gradu-ated from Cornell College in 1941 where he was a member of Ph. Beta Kappa. He received a master's degree in English from Boston University in 1942, a second Master's degree from Hamard University in 1948. From 1949 to 1956 Dr. Hoopes

was a member of the Depart-ment of English at Stanford Uniment of English at Stanford Un-versity where he was considered one of Stanford's outstanding teachers. Spring Arrives at Michigan State

Spring will soon permit the campus to bloom in a variety surely the easiest thing to have done, or cut the property of colors, proving again why State's campus is one of the into rectangular building blocks." most beautiful in the nation.

But this attractiveness, that Spartans and visitors have come to expect, didn't just happen. Since State's founding, the campus has been looked after by an inspired line of planners-plus an occasional group of vocal alumni,

An example of this interest came to light recently when Harold.W. Lautner, head of urban planning and landscape architecture, found a dusty circular published by the Chicago Alumni Club in 1920.

aim was to get the signatures of all alumni "in favor of keeping the circular form of campus in its purity."

Alumni favoring the circle began distributing the piece in opposition to unnamed persons who planned a quadbuild new structures within the 25-acre Circle brought this sign

'If these large new buildings were placed in the center of the campus they would dwarf the trees and open spaces and shut off the best vistas of the campus. They would give MAC, which is today the most beautiful college in America, a non-descript character, throwing it into a common class with a hundred other colleges and universities.

The campus had been stamped with both dignity and informality from its 1855 beginning. The earliest known map of the area shows the strong woods effect on which planners could build,

Those who delight in today's Circle Drive will agree when Lautner says it was fortunate that the first planner, who probably was John C. Holmes, first secretary and superntendent of horticulture in 1856, used imagination in placement of the first buildings.

He apparently decided, Lautner explains, "to turn the

Building progressed slowly during State's first 50 years, but landscaping moved quickly and the system of curving

roads between buildings had begun to take shape.

*The two startling elements of the next 50 years to affect the campus had not shown themselves," Lautner explains, "one, the motor car; the other, student enrollment and growth."

An estimated 12,000 automobiles owned by students and employes now use campus roads daily. While traffic moves slowly during rush hours, it remains a tribute to the early The pamphlet was entitled "The Campus Circle" and its planners that an efficient yet tastefully designed system of pavements branches from the Circle.

The concept of the Campus Circle probably evolved soon after 1900, Lautner says. Under O. C. Simonds, a Chicago landscape architect, and the Olmsted Brothers of Boston, rangular design for the campus. This latter's proposal to the circular idea gained acceptance as a basic campus de-

It was for this circular plan that the alumni rallied in 1920. No one has seriously considered quadrangles since

Among the things which make State's graceful campus the envy of crowded schools are its 27 miles of roads, 53 miles of walks and 84 acres of parking lots. The location of all is tied in one way or another to the foresight of

The university's land holdings have grown so since the founding of State that it now has nearly 4,500 acres for its planners to look after-about 900 acres comprise the campus proper.

Physical value of the campus was placed at \$15 million in-1946, Lautner explains, It is now in the neighborhood of \$100 million.

"At the change of every class hour the student is introduced to an environment that combines a cheerfulness of campus in upon itself and not line the first buildings upon the existing plank turnpike (Grand River) on the north; trement and repose, These are also values in an education."
