Speaking on the present steel strike. Dunlop said if it is not settled in the allotted time, legislation may be enacted. Such legislation, he said, may require that industries have their own policies for settling disputes. Congress may tell industry, that they either settle the dispute or Congress will.

Legislation may be passed, he said, which would require a minimum fraction of important industry to shut down at any one time during a strike.
