**Attack by Russia Called Risky****Soviet Missile Power Disputed**

WASHINGTON (AP)—A surprise missile attack on this country is rated as too big a gamble by Soviet Russia to risk by Gen. Nathan Twining, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

At the same time, Twining seems to accept the repeated view of Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo.) that the Soviets will have a 3 to 1 or more advantage over the United States in ballistic missiles over the next few years.

## Senate Told-All-Day Sessions May Start

### Drive Begins to Push Civil Rights Legislation

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Democratic and Republican leaders served notice on the Senate Tuesday that round-the-clock sessions may start next Monday in a drive to get a vote on civil rights legislation.

Sen. Lyndon Johnson (D-Tex.), the majority leader, told his colleagues there has been a growing demand for marathon sessions next week, in which the Senate would not adjourn until the explosive issue has been settled.

He agreed with Sen. Everett Dirksen (R-Ill.), the Senate GOP leader, that round-the-clock sessions could start Monday if that is desired by the majority of the members.

Sen. Richard Russell (D-Ga.), chief strategist for the southern forces, told the majority and minority leaders his side would fight round-the-clock sessions with every trick they know.

He implied he did not believe the southerners could be forced to yield by such tactics, declaring "you might as well get your closure petition out now." A closure petition would limit debate.

Sen. Allen Ellender (D-La.) told his colleagues he would move to bring all other Senate business to a halt if 24-hour sessions were ordered.

He said he would object to any committee meetings during such periods. Most committees may sit only by unanimous consent while the Senate is in session.







## Skating Champion, Miss Heiss Wins First U. S. Gold Medal

SQUAW VALLEY, Calif. (AP)—Carol Heiss kept a promise made to her dying mother and brought the United States its first gold medal in the Winter Olympics Tuesday when she won the Women's Figure Skating championship in a virtual breeze.

The 20-year-old honey blonde wonder from Ozone Park, N.Y., executed a complex routine with almost preposterous precision, leaving a crowd of some 8,000 at Blyth Arena dazed.

The chief contenders for second place and the Silver Medal were Holland's Sjoukje Dijkstra, the European Champion, and Barbara Roles of Temple City, Calif.

Miss Heiss had promised her mother she would win the prizewinning Olympic Gold Medal. Mrs. Marie Heiss died shortly after watching her daughter lose to a teammate, Terley Albright, at Cortina, Italy, in the 1956 Olympics.

Miss Albright has retired from competitive skating.

In her dressing room Tuesday, Carol said:

"This was for my mother. I only wish she was here with me to share it."

"I'm glad it's all over. The last four days have been an awful grind."

"This is my greatest thrill." Miss Heiss, dressed in a red velvet costume with gold and white braid trim and a matching hair piece, skated to a medley of themes Tchaikovsky, Delibes and Rossini. Her complicated maneuvers included difficult axels (twisting jumps), executed both ways alternately, bringing the audience to its feet.

Her jumps were extraordinarily high.

The ice appeared very hard and many contestants made uneven landings when the edges of their blades failed to cut deep enough.

Seven of the 26 skaters took tumbles, and another, Patricia Pauley, the British champion, collapsed in the center of the arena when she was finished. She got up without assistance, but was hunched over as she skated slowly to the sidelines. She had recently recovered

from the flu and the 6,200-foot altitude apparently was too much for her.

Many other skaters were obviously on the point of collapse after completing their performances.

Miss Roles, the last of the 26 contestants, was attired in a red costume and opened her routine with difficult toe stops which drew applause. She won more enthusiasm from the stands with three consecutive waltz jumps, executed on one leg.

The crowd cheered again when she performed an unusual bend back spin. Miss Roles concluded her act with brilliant spins
