Sec. Miller Leaving MSU for Western

James W. Miller, secretary of Michigan State University, was appointed to the Western University of Kentucky. Miller, a MSU professor of plant science and former director of the department of education, will take office at WKU Jan. 1.

He expects to remain secretary until that date, but will be appointed to the new State Board of Education before the fall election.

Accepted the position with

Sec. Miller said, "I feel extremely happy to have the faculty student body demand growth of this

Frequent "compositions" to the short skirts are bulky sweaters worn way down below the waistline in the new fall shades of olive, plum and gold. And are they bright!


Newspapers in daily wear include those numbers over blouse-collared blouses in fall prints or contrasting lines.





SIX MSU coeds toured Europe this summer and ended up in Rome at the Olympics.

This was no ordinary vacation, it was the climax of five years of hard work for the Lansing group.

Swimming their way across Europe, they were representing America as the national women's swimming champions.

TEAM MEMBERS included Sue Montgomery, East Lansing, through graduation this year; the field of swimming consists Mary Jean Campbell, Grand Rapids; Pamela Fawcett, East Lansing; Debbie Hembrough and Shirley East Lansing, senior; Betty Dow, a junior from Highland Park; Linda Harrison, East Lansing, senior; Shirley Stoeckel, Farmington Hills; Carol Gandy, Farmington Hills; and Karen Zavala, Lansing, Freshman. All members of the team are members of the YMCA YCAA, Dowd, a native of Quincy, Illinois, and Karen Lazdike, Freshman, is a former YMCA member.

According to the team, however, the most outstanding member of the group is Shirley Stoeckel, a member of two other national teams, and the three-time national AAU swimmer. Her coach was Sandy Gilmer, who will be their coach during the 1960 season. The Michigan State swim coach for the team was Mrs. Alice Hall, who recently joined Coach Stanley Johnson's staff at Eastern Michigan University.

At the 1958 AAU championships, the team won the gold medal in the 400-meter medley relay, and Shirley Stoeckel was the victor. The first place finish was shared by the Michigan State team, which was to prove the difference between the two teams in the 1959 AAU championships.



200 Police Ready For Traffic Jam

Yesterday is game day in East Lansing as the Spartans and the Wolverines tangle on the gridiron.

But besides those two teams there will be a third team which will be around town Saturday afternoon equipped with the most modern equipment available and using the strategy of some of the best brains in their business.

This third team of 200 police officers whose job it will be to see that 30,000 fans go to and from Spartan stadium safely, quickly, and calmly.

Coordinating this team including officers from campus, city, county, and state units, will be Lt. Allen Andrews of the department of public safety. From his post at the southwest corner of Old Capitol Park deck of the stadium, Andrews will use radios and binoculars to keep traffic moving as freely as possible.

When a jam is spotted, a call will go on and an officer will be dispatched to remedy the situation.

The simplest way to describe the traffic pattern is to say all roads leading into East Lansing and the campus will lead to the stadium. Andrews said.

If a driver gets into this one-way traffic pattern he will immediately end up in a parking lot near the stadium on the side of the road waiting for traffic to clear, the officer added.

"I just want to get a smooth smooth flow from one side of campus to the other," he said.

Students living in married housing will be especially affected by the one-way flow since Harrison road, an exit way from all married housing areas, will carry a heavy flow

of traffic going toward the stadium.

There will be no northbound traffic on Harrison north of Willow.

Spartan Village residents shouldn't use Harrison at all," Andrews said.
