Book Review

Critic Reviews Fadiman's Self-Education Program

"The Lifetime Reading Plan" by Clifton Fadiman, World Publishing Co., \$2.75. Reviewed by Donald A. Yates.

For several decades, Clifton Fadiman has collected a mounting pile of books, through personal choice, has likely made a large number of conquests over the years. He is a cultural popularizer in the best sense of the term.

some of these titles, always having pre-reading with an educated desire to get at the texts themselves, while others will induce one to read fast.

This is not to inflict the author. There is a real bonanza of enjoyment.

This is a sound, valuable book for any person with: 1) the desire to discover the wisdom that mankind has bequeathed to its inheritors; and 2) the determination to find time for his community rewarding undertaking.



New Report On Cyclotron Being Issued

A new report of progress has just been completed on the Campus Cyclotron project. Printing and mailing is all that is left.

The cyclotron, when completed, will be able to produce artificial radioactivity from the nuclei of atoms. It will also be able to speed these particles within it.

This report is only one of many issued by the project since its start in 1956.

Copies will be sent to Russia, Switzerland, and other countries which are working on nuclear research cyclotron facilities. Dr. H. G. Blosser, project head, said this co-operative effort of many nations has led to improvements of cyclotron studies.

The report gives findings which were accomplished by an extensive sequence of computer programs on the MISTIC. Information from magnetic field measurements is processed by the computer. Results give ways of building better cyclotrons.

Studies have shown ways of cutting loss of beam extraction from the cyclotron from 90 to 50 per cent. They also change the beam from a broad fan to a pencil-shape. These will result in greater efficiency of the machine.

Proposals have been sent to the Atomic Energy commission and the National Science foundation for support for building the estimated \$1.5 million machine. Congressional action must be taken to approve the proposal.

The project is presently supported by extension of an \$86,000 grant from the AEC.

If the proposal is passed this session of Congress, the machine could be ready for use in the spring or summer of 1963," Blosser said.

A committee in the Physics department set up the project in 1956, to teach nuclear physics at the graduate level. The project was enlarged greatly since the hiring of personnel in 1958 and will be of great educational value when completed.



New Snow, Cold Weather Blasts East

Winter stung the eastern half of the country with more bitter cold weather Monday, while new snows fell in Virginia, Maryland and West Virginia and closed schools as far south as North Carolina, reported the Associated Press.

As the cold air knifed into the deep south a snowfall in Elizabeth, N.C., closed schools, and blizzards dusted south Carolina. Freezing weather nipped Georgia, Virginia, West Virginia and Florida.

The snowstorm sliced highways throughout the east, causing many traffic fatalities. It also brought cancellation of Monday's nine-race program at the Bowie track in Maryland.

At least 71 deaths were attributed to the cold and last week's storms and blizzards.

The Philadelphia area had another inch of snow Monday and Pennsylvania added another weather death to its toll. The victim died as a result of exposure in 30-degree-below-zero weather in Schuylkill county in east-central Pennsylvania.

Below zero readings were common at dawn throughout the east. The weather bureau said zero levels would edge as far south as the mountains of Maryland and West Virginia and the upper Ohio Valley during the night.

Snow fell from southern New England and New Jersey into the eastern Ohio Valley, with another widely scattered band of flurries spilling from the Dakotas into Michigan.

Showers dampened western Washington and central California and freezing rain stuck north central Oregon; other showers ranged from southern Arizona into southern New Mexico and the central Gulf region.



ATHENS, Greece. (AP)-The U.S. 6th fleet--was steaming across the Ionian Sea toward the port of Athens.
