In Monday's paper, Delores Turnbull, a freshman from Gilchrist, criticized the dormitory food. She complained about the quality of the food, and the fact that it was usually cold and tasteless.

We have no opinions on the quality of tood served in Gilchrist. But we do object strongly to the incidents which occured is a result of Miss Turnbull's public crit-

The day the letter appeared, Delores was called down to her housemother's office. Mrs. Samann, her housemother, in a very congenial and courteous manner, asked if Delores would always be a trouble maker. She stated that Delores had caused previous trouble in Gilchrist, and that her complaints about the food followed the general pattern.

MRS. SAMANN announced that Delores must back up all her accusations with proof, and that she might be called into the dean's office if the dean so desired.

Wednesday a second letter appeared in the State News. It was signed by 19 women from Gilchrist who reaffirmed Delores's criticisms about the food, and mentioned the humiliation and reprimands she had received as a result of voicing her com-

The afternoon the second letter appeared, Delores was again called down to Mrs. Samann's office. She pleasantly accused Delores of instigating the second letter. and asked if the food had improved since the day the first letter was published. When Delores admitted that the food had improved, Mrs. Samann demanded that Delores write a public apology in the State News so stating.

DELORES REFUSED, and Mrs. Samann

claimed that since she wouldn't apologize she had better be able to back up the statements in both letters with proof.

We talked with Delores Wednesday, after her two visits with the housemother. Delores admitted that the first letter was written in emotion, but that the food was truly bad and that her value judgements of the food did not require proof. She disclaimed any connection with the second letter, but explained that her dormmates had written it to defend her views.

We called Mrs. Samann immediately afterwards. She replied to every question, "I refuse to comment." When we asked her to defend her own position, she again refused to comment. We can only assume from this that she has no defense.

Delores is at present deeply concerned with her relations in the dormitory, but even more concerned with staying in school. She said that rather than have the whole thing publicized, she would prefer to just let it "all blow over" and stay out of more trouble. When we explained our purpose in publishing the facts, however, she agreed.

This is not the first instance of a person being called to task for publically expressing his views. But in this case we have definite facts and the willingness of the individual concerned to reveal her name, instead of quietly letting it pass.

WE FEEL THAT this situation is a flagrant violation of the rights of students and citizens. When individuals are subjected to persecution for publically expressing their opinions, it is time for the university and its staff to seriously reexamine its

Criticism is basic to the efficient functioning of our democratic system. The fact that the food in Gilchrist improved after Delores's letter is ample proof of this principle.

Rather than demand a public apology from Delores for expressing her views, we would encourage Delores and others like her to rationally express their views and exercise their right to freedom of speech.

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
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

There are two kinds of censorship. One is legal censorship--carefully administered by the cours with due provision for fair trial, appeals, etc. The other is extra-legal censorship-which may be administered by any women's organization or private individual with a four

There are no eriteria for the Women's Clubs' "inspection teams:" if two women dislike "A Farewell to Arms" they can have it removed from the racks as easily as "Nugget" or "Playboy

The Women's Clubs claim that their only aim is to remove material that might corrupt or that the State of Michigan has two laws that cover this problem: the first prohibits the sale minors of any material that might corrupt or damage their morals, and the other prohibits the display on public streets or

To the Editor:

May I commend you for an excellent editorial on problems of the assigned reading set-up at the library. It covered the ground thoroughly and fairly.

I fear that one of the assumptions about policing the use of library facilities has been that such stricter supervision might imply faculty and administration distrust of students. Tax paying parents, they assume, might resent such an attitude and let the Legislature know of this resentment.

However this is not an issue between the university's administration on one side and studente on the other. This problem is one between fair-minded students on one side and unfair students on the other.

Students are the library's and the university's principal customers. The fair-minded students have every right-even duty-to insist upon protection from the unfair ones. I strongly urge the fair-minded students to press their case insistently and systematically. The taxpaying parents of these students will be the happier for it

Theft and mishandling of public property in the library is challenging problem in law en-forcement. May I also suggest that its investigation and improvement might make a worthy field-work project for our stu-dents of Police Administration.

A GREAT CITIZEN

He was born in Denmark but came early to this country. where his occupations were various. He was at times a coal, miner, a farm laborer, a traveling salesman, a police reporter for a newspaper, a carpenter, an author. He became a social reformer, was instrumental in introducing parks and playgrounds in slum districts, he instituted tenement house and school reforms, established Good Government Clubs. He wrote many books on the subject of needed changes and social reforms. He was a warm friend of Roosevelt.

FATHER OF FLYING

An American scientist who devoted the best of his life to the service of the Government at Washington in the development of the flying machine. He made several attempts to fly over the surface of the Potomac with but scant success. His inventions contributed greatly to the progres of aviation, but he died before the practicability of flying was thoroughly demonstrated. A shaft was erected in his honor as the father of aviation at the Panama-Pacific Exposition.

An American author of short stories and novels, he had, as a young man, an adventurous career, working as a miner, compostor and schoolmaster. At eighteen he was working on a San Francisco newspaper. Later he founded a paper in which he printed his own stories. He was Secretary of the Mint at San Francisco. He was sent to Scotland as United States Consul. He spent the last years of his life in London.

His stories were of American life and chiefly of the rough life of the mining camps in California. They are noted for their humor, pathos and wit and are full of charm. He also wrote poetry.

A great American humorist whose works appeared in newspapers and magazines and whose popularity was achieved chiefly by his lectures. His humor is of a broad slapstick variety of wit very popular in the middle of the last century. His real name was Brown, but few people know this. His first real success was attained by a series of articles in the Cleveland Plain Dealer. He finally became famous in England where he died an where a complete edition of his works was published the year

Who was he?

A GREAT MAYOR

A great Mayor of a great city. In his early life he worked in street railway office where he rose rapidly. He concentrated his interest upon street railways, made several inventions apply ing to them and invested his savings in them until he had a considerable amount of stock in the street railways of Indianapolis, Detroit, Cleveland and Brooklyn. After he had become a wealthy man he read an important book on political economy and became an ardent advocate of public ownership and other economic and political reforms. He sold his street railway holdings and entered politics. His political career consisted of two terms in Congress and four terms as Mayor. It was as a municipal executive that he displayed his greatness and won his fame. He died when at the height of his influence and power. Who was he?

FAMOUS WRITER

An American writer and soldier, born in Indiana. He fought in the Mexican War and as a Federalist in the Civil War. He was Governoe of New Mexico Territory and later Ambas to Turkey. He wrote several popular novels but is known chiefly by one dealing with the life and times of Christ which made him famous and which has been dramatized and produced extensively.

Who was he?

FAMOUS WOMAN

A famous American philanthropist and poet, she was co-editor of the Boston Commonwealth, a lecturer on social subjects prison and other reforms. She was active in championing the cause of women and was President of the New England Women's Club. Her writings include dramas, reminiscences, sketches, etc. The collections of verse includes one very well-known patriotic poem which is known by all American school children. Who was she?

A RIPE PURITAN

A minister and the son of a minister, of brilliant intellect and accomplishments, a good son and father with a private and public record entirely to his credit, yet his name has passed down in the history of Massachusetts associated with the story of a crime so discreditable to the fair name of the State that to most people to name this man is to think also of the story. As a child he was very religious and extremely superstitious. When he grew to manhood he still believed in good and bad angels and a personified devil. He wrote a book stating his belief in witchcraft. When the excitement broke out in Salem on the supposed discovery of witches and witchcraft, he was instrumental in causing to be condemned and executed many of those who were accused. This has never been proven.



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

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
