Governor John Swainson has given his approval of a Senate bill which provides for the acquisition and preservation or shoreline areas for public

recreational purposes. Swainson filed his statement with the U. S. Senate Committee on Interior and Insular atfairs last week

The bill would appropriate 10 million dollars to establish a program of shoreline land acquisition. The federal government would match state funds on a 50-50 participating
