### Kenton's Jazz Draws 3,000

Modern jazz has many faces--and most of them were on display Friday night at the Stan Kenton jazz Workshop concert. An estimated 3,000 enthralled listeners on the riverside lawn of West Shaw Hall heard 250 of the finest young jazz musicians in the country performing under some of the outstanding figures in contemporary American music.

Hollywood arranger Ross Garcia, noted trumpeter Donald Byrd, bandleader Art Van Damme, John LaPorta of the Berkely School of Music, trumpeter Marvin Stamm and Johnny Richards, both members of Kenton's band, were among the jazz "greats" present at Friday's concert.

In his opening remarks before the concert, Kenton said: "Most of the young people performing here tonight had never seen each other before last Sunday. One of the things asked of them was that they produce a musical work of merit for tonight's concert."

Above all, modern jazz is many sounds--and most of them could be heard at the workshop concert.

Modern jazz is the sentimental "Missouri Waltz" performed in nine-eighths time under Garcia's direction.

Modern jazz is any sound ranging from the standard "Moonlight in Vermont" to an original student conglomeration called "Rhubarb." It is a band with an average age of 15 playing numbers composed by an 18-year-old.

Modern jazz is the mellow sound of a mellophonium solo played by 20-year-old MSU senior Bob Ruskin of East Lansing.

The mellophonium typifies the ever-changing aspect of contemporary jazz. A cross between French horn and trumpet, the mellophonium was pioneered by Kenton's band in an effort to produce tones not within the former instruments' range.

Modern jazz is the well-known sound of Kenton's band playing the dreamy "Maria" from "West Side Story" and then swinging into a foot-tapping, hand-clapping "History of the Blues."

Modern jazz is Kenton himself--innovator, bandleader and top entertainer.

What direction will the myriad forms of today's jazz take in the future?

LaPorta of the Berkely School of Music said:

### 550 Sign Package Liquor Plea

The first step to make East Lansing wet has been made.

A special committee from the East Lansing Chamber of Commerce turned in their petition containing 550 signatures just under the deadline Wednesday.

The petition had to be in 90 days before the next general election in this area.

The next election is November 6.

The urgency in getting the petition in under the deadline was brought about by a misinterpretation of the rules of the city charter.

Some four days before the deadline, the chamber committee believed there was only a 60-day regulation period for an amendment petition to be handed in.

There was much speculation as to whether the petition would slide in under the deadline or not.

"The hard work and sweat of a lot of people went in to getting the petition in on time with more than the minimum signatures required," said Joe Makula, head of the special chamber committee.

"We weren't sure until the last day," he said, "that we could get the required number of signatures."

Now the next thing we have to go through is finding out how many signatures will be disallowed for having improper qualifications to sign a petition asking for an amendment to the city charter.

Miss May Slavik, city clerk, said she didn't know how long this task would take but the petitions, if they still bear the necessary 500 signatures, will be presented to the next City Commission meeting on August 20.

The decision as to whether an amendment will appear on the

In an educational institution the size of MSU where varsity athletes are regarded so highly by the administration, they could be a tendency to give the teams and their members preference. We will search for these possible encroachments at all times and publicize them when they occur.

The IM building belongs to the student, just as the tennis courts do. So does much of Jenison. Let's keep it that way.

## Con-Con Increases Terms

How would Michigan's proposed new Constitution affect the courthouses around the State? Associated Press newsmen Gene Schroeder and A. F. Mahan explain the local government clause of the Constitution in this, the eighth in a series of nine articles reviewing the work of the Constitutional Convention.

LANSING--(AP)--The Constitutional Convention undoubtedly created a strong for-adoption political force by substituting two little words for a long one.

The present Constitution provides that a sheriff, clerk, treasurer, register of deeds and prosecuting attorney shall be elected by each county "biennially," which means every two years.

The convention's proposed new Constitution says this set of courthouse officers shall be elected for "four year" terms.

This matches terms which delegates also voted to give State officers. The Democratic minor-

ity, which found some fault with three other sections in the local government article, raised no objection to this one.

Township government was perpetuated over objections of Dr. James K. Pollock (R-Ann Arbor) a convention delegate and a University of Michigan professor of political science.

A little sweetening was thrown in, too, for township office holders now limited to two-year terms by a provision that a supervisor, a clerk, a treasurer and a maximum of four trustees "shall be elected for terms of not less than two nor more than four years." The Legislature would fix the term.

Dr. Pollock insisted only two forms of local government are needed in Michigan--the county as an area-oriented government and the city as a service-oriented government.

"Townships may be desired and necessary in certain parts of rural Michigan for some time to come," he said, "but I would prefer to have them disappear on a statutory (act of the Legislature) basis than to have them embalmed in the Constitution."

"After all, 28 of our states get along without townships. . . we now are burdened with the cost of maintaining 1,258 of them."

His proposal to permit the Legislature to provide for organization and dissolution of such political subdivisions and leave townships out of the Constitution was defeated by a 41-88 vote.

Delegate Arthur G. Elliott, Jr. (R-Pleasant Ridge) saw these as major basic improvements written into the proposed new Constitution by his local government committee.

--Giving cities and villages power to levy taxes other than property, with the proviso that the Legislature can preempt the field or place any restrictions by law.

((This would legalize beyond any doubt, unless the Legisla-

ture passes a law against such, the levying of flat-rate city income or payroll taxes, among others.)

--Providing county home rule whereby each county, subject to Legislative rules, can structure its government to suit itself if its electorate approves.

--Authorizing "two or more counties, townships, cities, villages or districts, or any combination thereof among other things to: Enter into contractual undertakings or agreements with one another or with the State or with any combination thereof for the joint administration of any functions or powers which each would have the power to perform separately"

(Thus cities or other units of government could get together, subject to rules to be laid down by the Legislature, to undertake projects too big for any one to handle alone.)

Instructing the courts to liberally construe in their favor any Constitutional provisions or laws affecting cities, villages, counties or townships, and adding: "Powers granted to counties and townships by this Constitution and by law shall include those fairly implied and not prohibited by this Constitution."

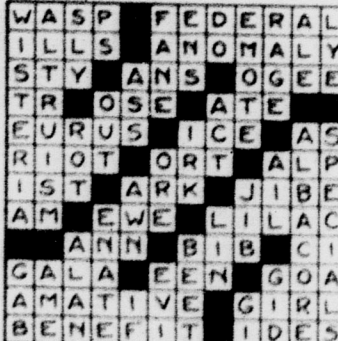
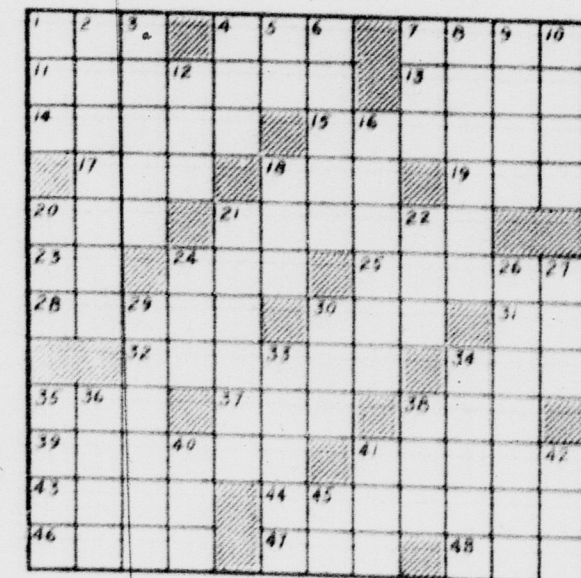
Elliott said that these instructions, contained in the last two sentences of the article, might prove to be the most significant of any. He pointed out that in the past specific authority had to be spelled out for local units of government before they could act in any field.

One of the three changes Democrats proposed unsuccessfully would have required county charter commissions to be chosen in partisan elections. Another would have required the election of boards of supervisors in partisan elections "and on a population basis from each township and city."

A third Democratic proposal (Continued on page 11)

## Her Fear Cured

"There's nothing like a canoe trip to cure a person's fear of water," says Mrs. Carol Manthy, who recently navigated 600 miles of Michigan waters with her husband Bob.

Bob and Carol Manthy left July 3 for the Great Lakes Forestry Exposition at Mio. Manthy, a graduate student in forest economics at MSU, heard about the proposed trip from John Calkins, publicity agent for the Forestry Exposition.

Mrs. Manthy said: "The publicity people wanted a forester to make the trip. They simply couldn't believe that a forester's wife would be making the trip too."

"We had planned to see the Seattle World's Fair, but one day Bob came home with an idea about a canoe trip, so..."

The Manthys, who live in Spartan Village, began their journey on the Grand River outside of Lansing at Waverly Bridge.

"We had thought it would be nice to start on the Red Cedar—for the campus atmosphere," Mrs. Manthy explained. "However, it would have taken us three hours' paddling to reach Lansing. We decided against the Red Cedar the night before we left."

Mrs. Manthy said that the weather was "extremely hot" during the Grand River portion of the trip.

"In spite of suntan oil, we were both well burned," she said.

"Bob kept telling me the dams would get smaller. To our dismay, they got larger each time."

The Manthys had to carry the canoe and 250 pounds of gear around each dam.

"Webber Dam on the Grand was nearly the breaking point," Mrs. Manthy recalled. "We reached the dam at about 4 p.m. and we just weren't able to manage the canoe by ourselves. Luckily, a family came by and the man helped Bob."

"The man's name was Joe Donahue. I don't have any idea where he lived, but I vowed I'd mention his name to any reporter who gave me the chance."

The Manthys paddled along the Grand River to Grand Haven on Lake Michigan.

"Our arrival at Grand Haven was the only point at which I was determined to turn back," said the petite blonde canoeist.

"People warned us not to try Grand Haven on a Sunday—that every motorboat in creation would be on the water. So we arrived in Grand Haven Sunday

afternoon—and every motorboat in creation was on the water."

"Waves from the motorboats nearly caused us to capsize. We took water in at the gunnels in the wake of a huge outboard. This was the point when I became slightly hysterical and started to cry. It's a good thing my husband didn't tell me he was scared too."

The Manthys stayed in a motel that night.

"It was certainly a boon after the day's rather harrowing experiences," Mrs. Manthy said. "We didn't go out the next day—I just looked at the water."

The Manthys attached a three-horsepower motor to their canoe for the Lake Michigan trip.

"The lake trip was really quite calm," Mrs. Manthy said drily.

"However, we did have one rather interesting experience."

"We were traveling at night near Ludington, because the water was so smooth that we wanted to go as far as possible. Eagerly looking for the lights

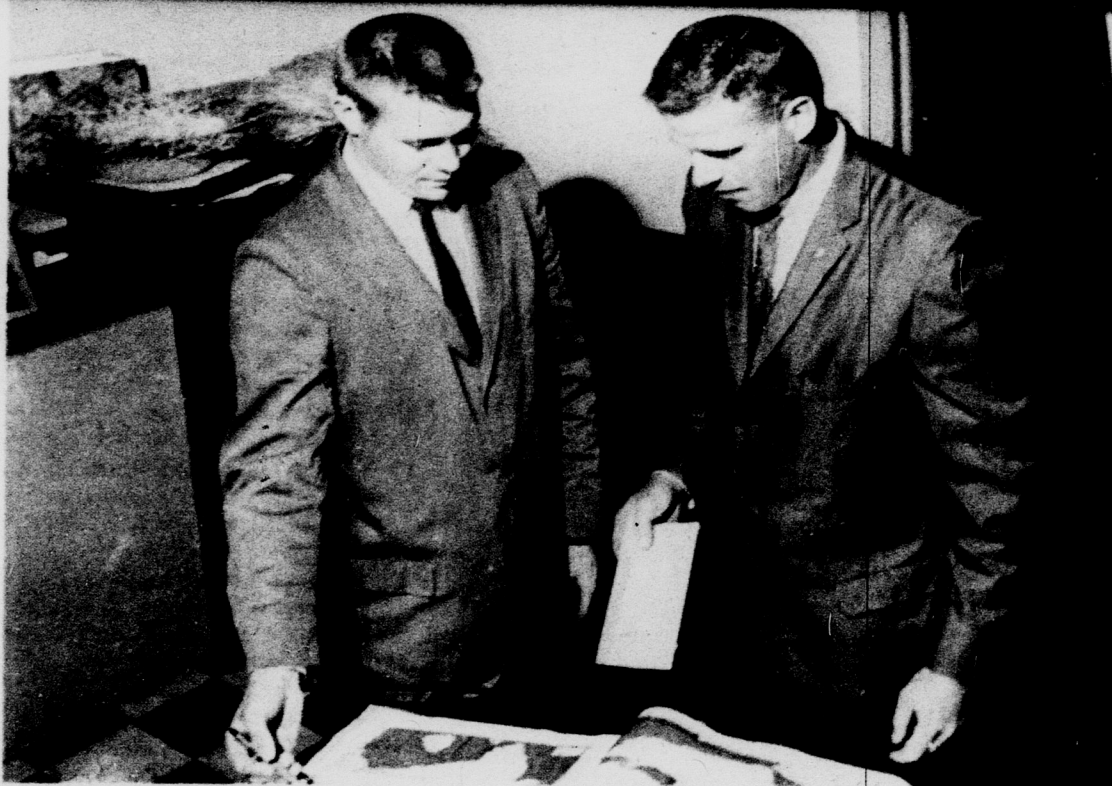

## Student Going to Nepal

Many people have never heard of Nepal and most of those who have don't know where it is. But Bob Harter, a June Michigan State graduate and now an MSU employe, leaves in September for a six month trip to the mountain kingdom.

Harter, who lives in Carson City, will be the fourth Michigan State student or graduate to go overseas this year as part of the International Farm Youth Exchange.

Five youths from overseas arrive here this week as the second half of the exchange. They come from Taiwan, Spain, Venezuela, Iran and India.

Harter leaves Sept. 28 from New York for England on the first leg of his cruise to Nepal, which is an independent kingdom on the southern slope of the Himalaya Mountains and is south of Tibet and north of India.

In Nepal he will live and work with a dozen families.

Harter says he hopes he can give the Nepal people he lives with a touch of "American thinking and culture. In turn it is my hope that their thoughts and

way of life can be brought back to the United States with me." Harter is studying language, in Japan until February.

Since the program started in 1948, Michigan has contributed 62 persons to the exchange with

Already overseas are Sharon about two-thirds of them Michigan State students, says Mary Ries, Tecumseh, who graduated in June, in Taiwan until February; Jeanie Stewart, Burt Lake at Michigan State.

Private funds raised at local, and Bud Thar, Decatur Junior, in state and national levels finance Israel until December.

A fifth Michigan resident, \$3,000 for each two way exchange.

They stopped for lunch at Roghan's home in Lansing and continued their westward trek at 5 p.m.

The departure date was set back one day because a veterinarian's certificate of health was needed for the two horses to cross state lines, Roghan said.

"Each state can check the physical condition of the horses," he said, "and a complete examination might be required each day."

The two riders estimated their trip would take "roughly 60 days."

Sleeping arrangements and food will be earned by doing chores for friendly farmers along the way, said Roghan hopefully. But they are carrying bedrolls and a small supply of food.

The horses will be fed by grazing along the way and eating oats earned by doing chores at farms.

"After reaching Seattle," Roghan said, "we will stay at a ranch where we have reservations."

When the fair is over the horseback travelers plan to ride to Pasadena, California. They hope to take part in the Rose Parade on New Year's Day.

"I hope to see many of my friends from Michigan State at the Rose Bowl," said Roghan.

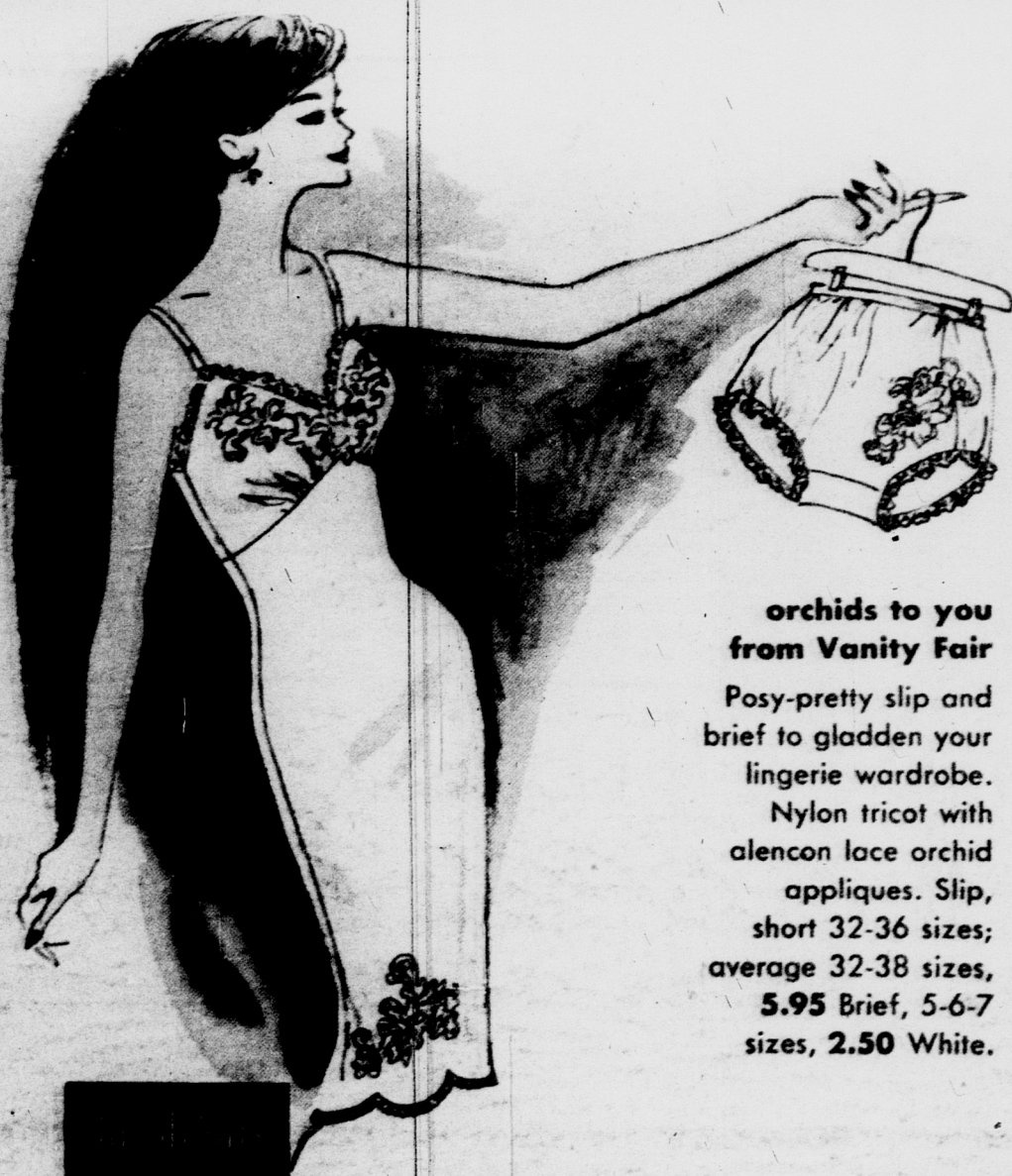

of Ludington, I spotted a beautiful lit panorama and called my husband to see.

"The 'skyline' was gorgeous--but it turned out to be a huge lake steamer. I yelled, 'It's moving toward us, Bob.' We cleared the steamer by 100 feet. That incident marked the end of our night traveling."

The Manthys used an outboard motor on the trip up the Manistee River. They spent a week traveling down the AuSable River to Mio. Mrs. Manthy called the Au Sable the "most relaxing portion of the trip."

Mrs. Manthy spent most of the Forestry Exposition in bed because of strep throat.

"I didn't even get my chance to reign over the water carnival," she sighed. "But it would have been worse to get sick on our trip in the middle of nowhere. We traveled days at a time without seeing civilization. Of course, that's one of the nice things about canoe travel."

The Manthys reached Mio Thursday, July 26.

"We could have arrived earlier, but there was no reason to hurry down the Au Sable," Mrs. Manthy said.

The couple ate special dehydrated food known as "freeze-dry."

The Manthys began practicing for their trip once a week in late May.

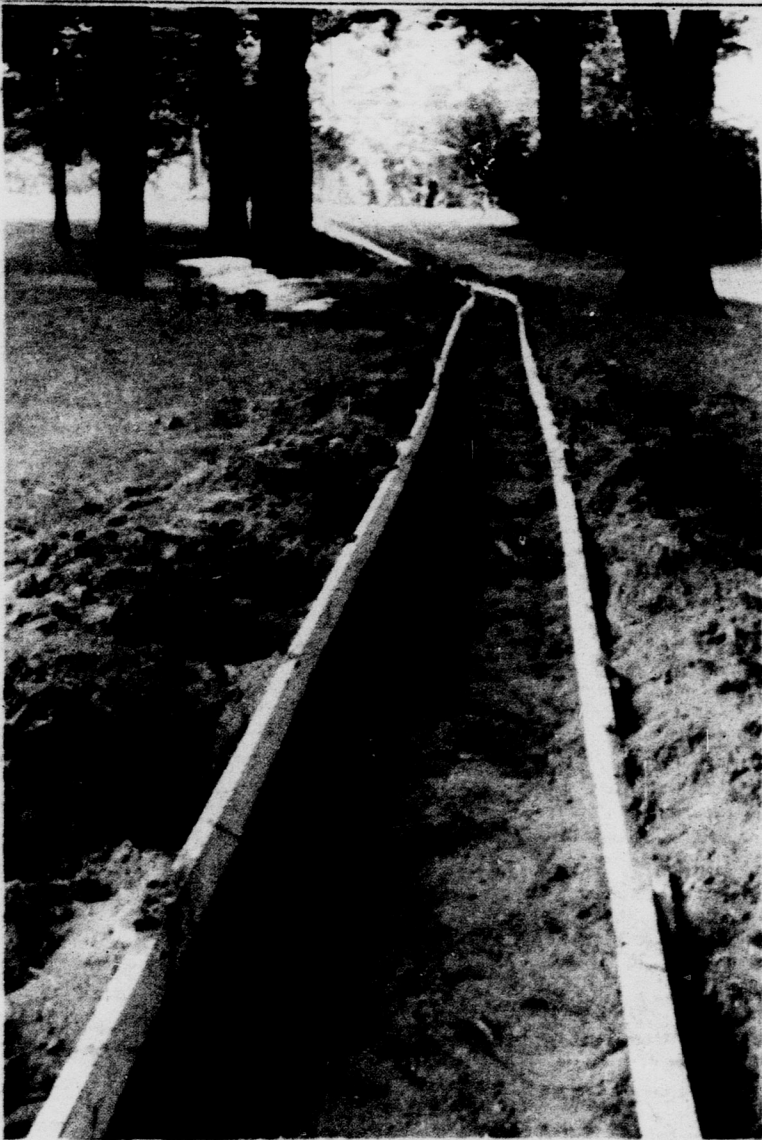

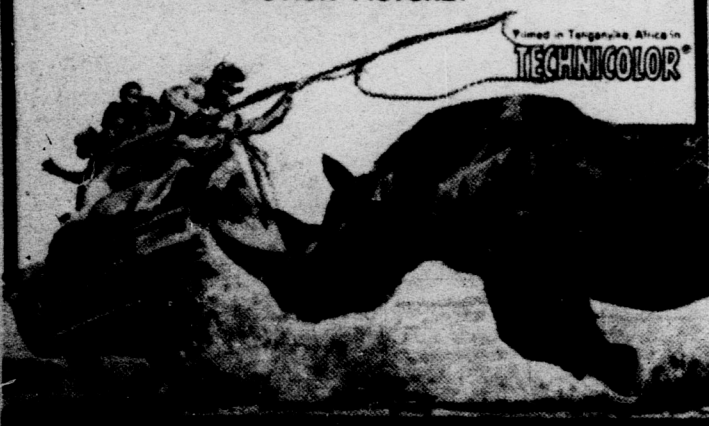

## Football Is Upon Us

Here it is Aug. 14 and already football is besieging us.

The professional teams have played their initial exhibition games of the season. Dozens of football magazines have hit the newsstands. Publicity departments at big time colleges have sent or are preparing brochures about their football teams for the press, radio and TV.

At Michigan State Ken Early and his equipment crew begin this week readying football uniforms and other equipment for the arrival of the Spartans Aug. 31.

Practice officially begins Sept. 1 and coach Duffy Daugherty and his staff of assistants are setting up preliminary meetings on strategy and practice plans.

Pressure is mounting upon the Spartan coaches. Their team is

being singled out by many experts as one to beat this fall, as one of the top teams in the Big Ten and in the nation.

One magazine is reportedly choosing Capt.-fullback George Saines and center Dave Behrman as all-America performers and picked Daugherty as the probable Coach of the Year in the nation.

While other magazines are saying Michigan State is going to have one of the best teams in the nation, they are quick to point out some of the admitted shortcomings and weaknesses of the Spartans.

The major lack, according to Daugherty, is the absence of real depth which Michigan State boasted of in the past. If anyone among the top 14 players is injured, the Spartans could be in for real trouble.

The desire is strong in the Spartan camp to win the Big Ten championship and take part in the Rose Bowl game at the end of the season.

Gus Schrader, sports editor of the Cedar Rapids, Ia., Gazette writing in the "Official Collegiate Football Record Book, 1962" issued by the NCAA, had perhaps the cleverest observation of the Spartans.

"The Spartans have yet to win a Big Ten title under Duffy Daugherty, but he's been a bridesmaid so often his shoes must be full of rice. MSU has a strong nucleus back from the 1961 club that terrified the midlands until hitting Minnesota and Purdue in early November," Schrader said.

Daugherty's staff is figuring out how to keep his team healthy all season and continue its drive to the title through all nine games, not just the first five or six games like last year.

The Spartans were driving toward national prominence and the conference title, winning their first five games last year, including a 28-0 lambasting of Michigan. But then they lost 13-0 to Minnesota, which went to the Rose Bowl, and 6-0 to Purdue, which went nowhere.

Michigan State recovered in time, against weak opposition, to post a 7-2 mark and 5-2 in the conference for thirdplace.

This season's march to the first Big Ten title since 1953 begins Oct. 13 with the first conference game here in Spartan Stadium against traditional foe Michigan. The first game of the season is Sept. 29 at Stanford.

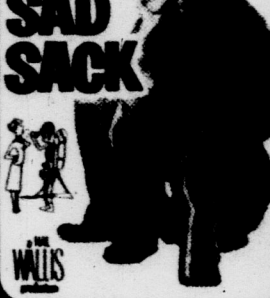

ballot in November will then be up to the city commission. Harry Kull, public relations director of the chamber, said the chamber thought that making East Lansing wet would help the city in various ways.

"Areas around East Lansing," he said, "are wet and this has not seemed to have hurt them in any way."

"The tax monies on the sale of liquor, beer and wine to go are going just over the East Lansing border now. We believe that our city should have some of this money as it would indirectly benefit all of our citizens."

"This item could also influence future growth of East Lansing."

"One thing to be remembered," Kull said, "is that this petition is arguing for the right to sell liquor, beer and wine on a take out basis within the city limits, not for the right to open bars or taverns."

Any way you look at it, the first step has been taken, and it will be interesting to see what develops in this attempt to change the way life has been led the last 55 years in this community.

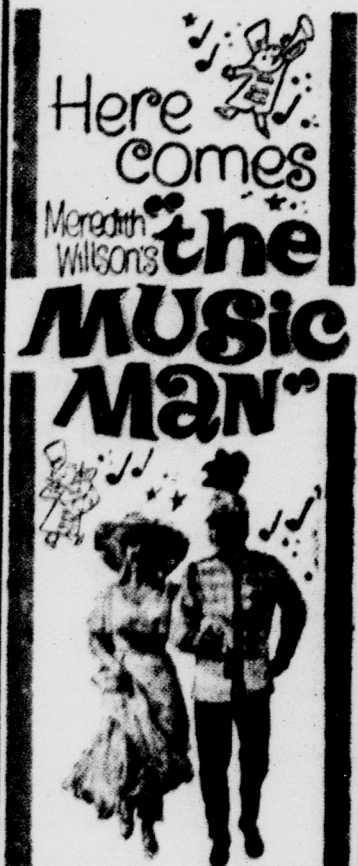

would have required a three-fifths vote of a city or village to approve the sale of any municipality owned utility.

The new Constitution would require a three-fifths vote to approve the acquisition of a utility or the granting of a franchise not subject to revocation at the will of the city or village. But only a simple majority would be required to authorize sale of a municipally owned utility.

Each township is authorized one member on a county's board of supervisors, as at present. And the proviso also is continued under which the Legislature fixes city apportionments on boards of supervisors.

Metropolitan areas, however, would be authorized by the new Constitution to establish "additional forms of government or authorities with powers, duties and jurisdictions as the Legislature shall provide."

"Wherever possible," the section goes on, "such additional forms of government or authorities shall be designed to perform multi-purpose functions rather than a single function."

Following through on its "right to know" policy, the convention inserted this section in its proposed Constitution:

"Any county, township, city, village, authority or school district empowered by the Legislature or by this Constitution to prepare budgets of estimated expenditures and revenues shall adopt such budgets only after a public hearing"

"The term 'style trend' is merely a convenient label. Jazz isn't going to travel one or two directions. This may have been true 20 years ago when jazz was so new that there was only one way to go. However, jazz has a history now. The art is branching out into many new directions in much the same way as classical music."

The main thing is not whether a musician conforms to a certain 'style trend,' but whether he really believes in what he is doing and is expressing himself in an artistic manner. The fact that every new type of jazz is not accepted or liked in no way affects its validity as an art form."

LaPorta mentioned the fact that jazz is far more popular in Europe than in America. "The mass of European people love jazz. In America, we're so busy trying to absorb European culture that we ignore the one art form which is truly our own. Of course, we are a very young country. I do think that when America grows up more she

will discover a tremendous awakening interest in her native music, jazz."

Richards of the Kenton band said:

"The future of jazz--and all music--is definitely in the universities. The music schools will be training grounds for all our young musicians. It's happening this minute in music."

"The schools are improving at a fantastic rate. The university music departments in the Southwest and Middle West are better, in my opinion, than those in large cities. Many of the older boys at this workshop are

going to music school. It's going to become an absolute essential for a professional musician."

What are a talented young musician's views on the world of music?

Ruskin, the 20-year-old MSU trumpeter, said:

"One thing I've learned at this workshop is what a wonderful thing the world of professional jazz really is. Talking with real performers showed me that it's nothing at all like the image people get from movies and television. I hope to get a job with Kenton's band when I graduate."

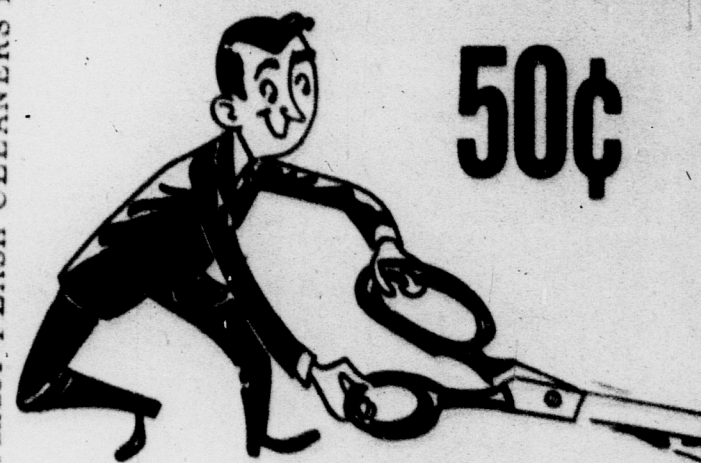
