
Deny Clemson Plea; Negro To Register

Warren Rejects Appeal

WASHINGTON (AP) - A one-two punch from the Federal courts Monday apparently shattered South Carolina's last hopes to prevent the admission of the first Negro to all-white Clemson College.

Both Chief Judge Simon Sobeloff of the U.S. 4th Circuit Court of Appeals and Chief Justice Earl Warren refused to delay effectiveness of the Appeals Court order that Harvey Gantt, 20-year-old Charleston, S.C., Negro, be accepted as a transfer student from Iowa State University.

It appears certain now that Gantt will be enrolled next Monday as the first Negro to attend

Planned Dorm Expansion To Repeat Coed Pattern

The campus will be extended to Hagadorn Road in 1964 with the construction of two \$6 million dormitories.

The new dorms, now in the preliminary planning stage, are to be located near the southwest corner of Shaw Lane and Hagadorn Rd. A structure should begin "in May, at the latest," according to Jack Breslin, University secretary.

Patterned after Case and Wilson, the dorms are scheduled for completion in the fall of 1964. There is room for a third dorm on the site, but plans for it are tentative.

The basic concept of the coed-academic dorms will be employed although the new buildings will differ from their predecessors in

floor plans. The auditorium, library, classrooms and faculty offices are to be housed in a separate building, Harold W. Lautner, director of the physical plant plan, said. There will be a dining area and additional office space in each of the buildings.

The dorms are being designed for a total capacity of 2,230, with two students to each room. The dorm rooms will probably be arranged differently than in Case and Wilson, Lautner said, although this portion of the plan is not complete.

Funds for the building project are to be raised through University bonds, Breslin said. The new dorms will bring to a total of six the coed-academic

housing units. Wonders and McDonel halls, now under construction, are to be completed this fall.

Breslin said he was optimistic about obtaining power for the new facilities.

"We're not constructing a building that we won't be able to heat and light," he said. "The problem is that we have very little reserve power."

Ted Simon, superintendent of buildings and utilities, recently said it will be "physically impossible" to supply all of the power necessary in the new buildings. The University has requested \$2,500,000 from the state legislature to begin power plant expansion.

Breslin, who serves as the University's legislative contact, predicted that the power plant expansion will be complete by 1964.

Plans Hold Key To Biochem Construction

University officials will meet with architects Friday to determine whether bids for a \$6 million biochemistry building can be accepted in February.

Clair Huntington, supervisor of new construction, said officials hope plans for the new building will be completed in time to accept bids for the February meeting of the Board of Trustees.

"If the plans aren't finished by the end of this week, we won't be able to accept bids in time for the meeting," Huntington said.

The biochemistry building is part of the long-range plan for an MSU medical school which will open in the fall of 1964.

"In addition to usual bids, we will also accept bids for laboratory equipment in connection with the construction of the biochemistry building," Huntington concluded.

U.S. Air Cover Never Planned For Invasion



KENNEDY

WASHINGTON - President Kennedy never issued any last minute orders cancelling U.S. air cover for the 1961 Cuban invasion, Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said Monday, because no such air cover ever was planned.

"There just wasn't any United States air cover that was planned," Kennedy said. The President's brother thus gave for the first time the administration's version of one of the most controversial aspects of the ill-starred landing. It coincided with a statement made last week by Jose San Roman, one of the principal leaders of the Cuban invasion effort, but ran counter to charges made by many administration critics.

The Attorney General said the basic reason for the failure of the venture was inadequate planning.

De Gaulle, Adenauer Make Open Treaty

PARIS - West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and President Charles De Gaulle Monday agreed on a treaty of close cooperation in diplomacy, defense and culture, open to other states of Europe. Their decision was reached in several hours of conferences after West Germany backed away from an exclusive inner alliance with France inside the European and Atlantic communities. It also apparently doomed the French concept of a continental "third force."

U.N. Occupies Kolwezi

KOLWEZI, KATANGA - A U.N. Congo command column occupied Kolwezi peacefully Monday, gaining entry to President Moise Tshombe's last stronghold--as he had pledged--without a shot. The occupation appeared to be the last of the military operations setting the stage for the return of Katanga and its mineral riches to control by Premier Cyrille Adoula's central government.

Gromyko Says 3 Inspections A Year Enough

MOSCOW - Soviet Foreign Minister Gromyko says three on-site inspections a year are enough to police a nuclear test ban, and Western demands for more cannot be justified.

Birch Society Membership Doubles

ST. LOUIS, Mo. - Robert Welch, founder of the John Birch Society, said Monday his organization doubled in membership last year and expects to do so again this year.

"We have had some minor setbacks, but we are growing all the time," he said. The Birch leader, however, refused to disclose membership or details of financing.

Welch felt the society was successful in alerting the American public to the dangers of Communism.

Charge Student With Negligent Homicide

State Police said Monday that charges of negligent homicide would be filed against Elena A. Seuffert, North Muskegon junior, for her part in an accident near Cadillac Saturday which claimed two lives.

Miss Seuffert was the driver in a four-car accident which took the life of Mrs. Julia Cook of Ewart and her son, Richard of Flint.

Miss Seuffert was attempting to pass a car when she crashed head-on into the car driven by Cook.

She is hospitalized in Mercy Hospital in Cadillac along with her companion, Detroit senior William Bassett.

Off-Campus Housing Gets New Office

The third floor of the Student Services building was crowded with file cabinets and cartons, Monday, as the off-campus housing division moved into a new office.

The office was formerly located on the second floor of the Student Services Building.

"We didn't need all the room we had on the second floor after the housing office was reorganized," said Jack Seibold, director of off-campus housing.

The central housing office was reorganized last fall and broken down into three divisions. On-campus housing assignments are now handled by the residence hall department and married housing is administered from a new office on Harrison Rd.

The Admissions Office formerly located on the third floor now occupies the old off-campus office.

NSA Function Analyzed

(Editor's Note: This is the first of a four-part series on the National Student Association.)

Rising university enrollment, segregation in United States education, student responsibility, academic freedom and international student understanding are major areas of study for the National Student Association (NSA).

Non-partisan and non-profit, the organization represents over one million students and is considered the most representative student group in America.

The association is divided into two parts - the National Affairs Commission and the International Affairs Commission.

National affairs deals with the philosophy, structure and techniques of the local unit of student self-government, leadership development, student judiciaries and the role of student government in education.

The international segment deals with relations between American students and foreign students.

NSA is a confederation of student bodies at 400 American colleges and universities which are represented through their student governments.

U.S. Won African Friends By Helping Oust Tshombe: Williams

Meredith Case No Fiasco, Says Kennedy

WASHINGTON (AP) - Assistant Secretary of State G. Mennen Williams Monday said the United States won new friends in Africa by helping the United Nations oust the separatist regime of Moise Tshombe.

"The participation of the United States in the Congo operation has greatly increased the respect of Africans for us," Williams said.

Williams, who heads the State Department's Bureau of African Affairs, spoke as evidence continued to mount that the United Nations has succeeded in ending the secession of Katanga, a province that declared its independence from the Congo just a few days after the Congo itself became independent in 1960.

Williams viewed the UN victory as a defeat for Communism. "We think the major achievement of the UN operation was to

remove one of the main obstacles to Congo unity and stability. Now the Congo government can get things rolling. Whenever there is stability or independence, the power of the Communists to enter and dominate is greatly diminished, or even diminished to zero."

The end of Katanga secession, Williams said, also has given the United Nations important dividends.

"It has increased the reputation and influence of the UN," Williams said. "There was a tendency for African nations to be a little disappointed with the slowness at which the UN was moving. Now there is real respect for the ability of the UN to do a job."

Williams outlined the role of

the United States in the operation.

He said the United States gave the Congo government financial aid to help keep it solvent and to avoid inflation, provided planes to move UN troops throughout the Congo, military equipment and food for the UN troops, and assigned a few technical personnel to help with the airlift.

Williams said no U.S. combat troops took part in the operation.

Editor Of 'Der Spiegel' Released From Prison

BONN, Germany (AP) - Hans Schmelz, an editor of the news magazine Der Spiegel, was freed Monday after 11 weeks in jail on suspicion of treason. Of ten other people arrested in the controversial case, only publisher Rudolf Augstein remains in custody and no charges have been filed.

2 Profs Compute Weather

When it comes to the weather, if we can't yet direct all snow to ski resorts, we at least like to know when it's coming.

Two professors of Air Science, Capt. George S. Akers and Capt. Donald W. Holloway, proved themselves to be competent amateurs at anticipating the thermometer Friday.

With the aid of the computer shown in the picture they summed up both the natural and the human element of Saturday's weather in their forecast: snow, followed by little boys on sleds.

Akers first became interested in the weather following his assignment to a food service squadron.


He received a B.A. in math from the University of Louisville, enlisted in the Air Force and received a commission through the Officer Candidate School program.

He was then assigned to the University of Washington in Seattle where he received a B.S. degree in meteorology.

Akers served at Tinker Air Force Base in Oklahoma, and in Germany as a weather forecaster for three years.

After four years at State, he expects to leave this summer to be assigned with his wife and two children to the Air Weather Service in Bermuda.

Holloway attended weather school at New York University and was assigned to Korea as a forecaster.

"In Korea," he said, "all weather was manufactured by the Red Chinese. That should give you a good indication of the weather we had."

Following his stay in Korea, he went to Denver, Colo. as a weather forecaster and then to an intelligence position in Washington, D.C.

Holloway hopes to return to the intelligence service when his tour is done at a civilian institution

here ends in the summer of 1964. "It is impossible," Holloway said, "for an Air Force ROTC graduate to enter graduate school in the field of meteorology.

"A college graduate with one year of physics and math through calculus meets the requirements," he said.
