





Sorority Pledging Drops

Statistics on results of fraternity and sorority rush this winter term reveal an upswing in fraternity pledging and a definite drop in sorority pledging.

Fraternities pledged 450 to 475 men, over 100 more than the 326 they took at this time last year.

Forty per cent of the freshmen men rushing were eliminated because of grades, but 20 to 25 per cent of eligible male students pledged a fraternity this term, according to Interfraternity Council.

One of the four candidates who ran for president last spring repeatedly voiced the opinion that student government must both narrow its scope of debate and improve the quality of its membership if it hopes to provide tangible results on a dependable, stable

The first point simply means that AUSG should concentrate on one project at a time. For example, providing a student-run book store. Or arranging discounts for students in local stores. Or increasing the AUSG studentloan fund. Or agitating for lower off-campus rent rates. Or whatever! But one at a time, instead of this present belter-skelter-fullspeed-shead-in-all-directions. AUSC has little enough energy to begin with: why dissipate it so senselessly? It's like trying to warm a
