"This program would definitely contribute to the attempt to unite the Judeo-Christian world," he said. "The idea of one world is becoming increasingly important. Ideas are interlocking as they move forward,"

Pettit thinks that the ideal time for a theologian to travel is after he has some experience. However, other demands come in after he graduates. Perhaps the minister's own community might find it worthwhile to subsidize his trip. A retirement gift of travel comes much too late to be effective.

Five weeks in every culture would be sufficient, Pettit believes. 'I'm appalled by the small percentage of college students who have traveled outside their own state. Television has done wonders to bring better understanding, but there is no substitute for being there and experiencing first hand."

Pettit, who visited Russis in 1958, finds that ministers would also benefit from study in U.S.S.R. Although the Russians claim to be atheists, the background of the people's behavior is deeply rooted in religious history. However, he realizes that the Holy Land is the primary
