### Hypnotism--The Answer For Future Problems?

A Kent State University pro- buses, fessor advocates hypnotism to improve student study habits, ..... State -- we may need him!

About 90 per cent of all college students can improve their study habits, according to Professor Stanley Krippner, a reading specialist, who has just completed a five-year hypnotism study.

Krippner said hypnotism also helped students on exams and strengthened the desire to study.

The professor says that only a light trance need be induced for improvement to take place.

He cited one example where a student was told while hypnotized that he could ignore room temperatures, his feelings of thirst and hunger, and the telephone, radio and record player.

Within three weeks the student was spending several consecutive hours each night studying without the interruptions that had interfered with his homework in the

Krippner's findings could revolutionize future plans for Michigan State.
