

There's one peculiar custom in largel that we never mastered, and that is the matter of wearing shorts. Males wear either long pants or shorts. Not bermuda shorts, but short shorts Shorts are worn in the country, and only small pected everyone to be running around in shorts.

On our first trip to town, not wanting to appear out of the ordinary, we thought we'd dress like the natives. To put it mildly, we were a little surprised to find no one else walking the streets in shorts. We were as conspicuous as lobster tails in a kosher del-

Still, our position wouldn't have been so had if it weren't for another Israeli custom: the people stare. They don't pussy foot about with quick glances or sidelong looks. If they see comething strange, they stare. And laugh, Rather openly. If you think of Americans as being "frank," then Israelis are surely "blunt."

Ab, the buses! Trains do not seem to exist in Israel. If you wish to go some place, whether it's the length of the country or just down two blocks, you ride a bus. Some of them definitely look like World War II vintage, but regardless of age, they have all lost their seat padding and axle springs, and they are all-
