Supreme student legislative responsibility shall be vested in the Student Senate.

The composition of the Student Senate shall be the following: (a) One representative from each of the following organizations, to be an elected

(b) The Senators on the Student Senate shall be elected by the student body by district in proportion to the population. No district may be more than twice the size of another in apportionment ratio. The Senate shall apportion the districts one term prior to the elections which shall be held Spring Term unless deemed otherwise by the Senate.

(1) The On-campus living units shall comprise one region with districts and apportionment as the Senate shall define by ordinance. This shall include university married housing.

(2) The off-campus living units shall comprise the second region consisting of one (1) district for all off-campus housing except fraternities and sororities, and a second district for fraternities and sorprities. The apportionment of districts shall be defined by ordinance of the Student Senate.

(c) There shall be a maximum number of twenty-five (25) and minimum of twenty (20) elected Senators.

(d) There shall be one nonvoting representative from each of the class council. the Association of Women Student Activities and Judictary Boards, and the Graduate Council to be an officer of each said group.

(e) The Committee on Committees shall hold open petitioning that interested and qualified individuals may be placed upon the several committees as Associate Senators.
