





## Hatch To Oppose Bartlett For State Education Post

CERTIFICATION code and state school aid formula needs revision to make it more equitable to the needs of districts of different size and wealth.

Bartlett contends that Hatch,

"doesn't know what he's talking about."

In response to the failure to rewrite the teacher's code, Bartlett said attempts to write it were in "a very bad state of confusion" when he succeeded a Republican superintendent.

He said it has taken five years to produce a substitute code and it will be ready for adoption this year.

Bartlett was assistant superintendent in Grosse Pointe and has taught at Eastern Michigan University and in Detroit area schools.

Hatch, in addition to teaching at MSU for 17 years, has held teaching and administrative posts in elementary and high schools and various educational departments at 11 colleges and universities.

### Smokers Are Cause Of Blazes

Claremont smoking is the major cause of the more than 160 fire alarms rung in each school year, says Brian E. Langley, fire safety officer.

"Education programs through the department of public safety and the safety committees in the dorms are now in progress to cut down this hazard," he said.

The fire alarm system which has been installed in campus buildings has been dubbed the local evacuation alarm.

"It derives its name from the fact that it doesn't ring in a central station. The alarm in the building sets off others in that same building and it is then evacuated. A call to the fire station brings the trucks," he said.

It takes three minutes for fire engines to reach the scene of a fire, says Brian E. Langley, fire safety officer.

responsibility of educator on the student.

Erickson came to MSU in 1944 as a professor of education and became director of the Institute of Testing, Counseling and Guidance.

Petitioners now must sign a campaign supplement to the petition whereby they agree to abide by the rules of the campaign.

An official violation form is now in use enabling anyone to make specific complaints against candidates running for office under the election commission's supervision.

Jim Barnes, present AUSG president said this year's election will be much better organized.

"Haphazardly prepared expense sheets will no longer be accepted. Rules used to be open to interpretation as to what constitutes campaigning," said Barnes.

"Billings has tightened the rules so significantly they won't be punished for something they didn't know was wrong. The rules are more clear cut now," he said.

## Poznan Choir Slated For L-C Tonight

The full, pleasing choral sound of 30 boys and 25 men, coupled with 10 years of tradition, await Michigan State University patrons tonight.

The Poznan Choir of Poland, currently making a tour of the United States, will pay a visit to the campus for a Series B concert at 8:15 p.m. in the University Auditorium.

The group was originally scheduled to sing in this country in 1958, but was prevented from doing so because of Hitler's invasion of Poland and the subsequent near-destruction of the choir's personnel on the battlefield and in concentration camps.

Founded in the middle of the 19th century, the choir flourished during the 18th century when young voices took over the roles formerly assigned to boys. In 1881 the chorus was changed to its original make-up of men and boys.

During World War II a young conductor and former Poznan chorister, Stefan Stulgrosc, formed a small choir of 16 boys and eight men. Risking persecution, the group rehearsed in cellars and attics and performed with the religious services in two churches allowed to the Poles.

When the war ended Stulgrosc reconstructed the Choir and has brought it back to its early eminence.

The choir will open its MSU concert with examples of polyphonic music from the 14th and 15th centuries, then turn to choral music of the Polish Renaissance, showing an international flavor in their program, the singers will perform the "Ave Verum Corpus" and "Lullaby" by At-



## 4-H Plans Incorporate Science

The 4-leaf clover, the symbol of America's 4-H clubs is also the trademark for new programs

of the Michigan Extension Service.

Young people have long been associated with rural young people and farm and home projects. Now science is the basis for new programs.

How? Gary Seavers, on leave from the University's Cooperative Extension Service, has been serving with a research project in Washington D.C. seeking some directions.

Visiting Michigan this week, Seavers reported that the proposed programs have at least three major purposes:

1. Young people think imaginatively, systematically and objectively.

Development of intellectual curiosity, junior leadership and group dynamics and international understanding are among a few of the possibilities.

An eight-man technical advisory committee is guiding the national study. On the board are N.P. Ralston, director of Co-

operative Extension Service, and Dean John Ryder of the College of Engineering.
