Concert To Close Youth Gathering

A concert in Fairchild Theater at 1 p.m. Saturday will end the 29th annual Youth Music Program.

More than 500 young musicians from high schools throughout the state have been participating in the music education program, sponsored by the MSU department of music and the Continuing Education Service.

Saturday's three-hour concert will feature five large ensembles, including an orchestra, symphonic and concert bands, choir and two festival bands. The student groups will be conducted by Youth Music faculty members who have been teaching in the program for three weeks.

The orchestra will be conducted by Richard Snook, from Grosse Pointe High School. George Cripps, from East Car-

olina State College, will conduct the choir, Harry Begian, from Cass Technical High School in Detroit, and Carl Bjierregaard, from Muskegon High School, will conduct the symphonic and concert bands, respectively.

Two festival bands also are scheduled on the concert program. Ronald Phillips from Belding High School will lead the green festival band and Donald Roselofs from Muskegon High School will conduct the white festival band.

Specialized training has been offered the students in numerous areas of instrumental and choral music under the program.

In addition to teachers from Michigan high schools, MSU music department members and graduate assistants also aid in the program.

Classes in music theory and literature, conducting, sight reading and instrumental and choral work were offered to the students.

Each student was placed in a band, orchestra or chorus for instruction. Private and class lessons and ensemble instruction have all been available during the three weeks.

The students have devoted about eight hours a day to their classes and music practice, according to Robert Sidnell, director of the program.

Most of the students at the Youth Music Program are here on scholarships from organizations in their home towns, Sidnell said.

Saturday's concert is free and open to the public.


State Hosts 6th Annual Gymnast Clinic

Texan To Lead Group

Johanos Lauds 100 Musicians For Progress

Donald Johanos, the youngest conductor to appear on campus this summer, will lead the Congress of Strings in its final concert of the summer tonight at 8:15 in Fairchild Theatre.

Johanos, the 34-year-old musical director of the Dallas Symphony Orchestra, has been working with the 100 members of the Congress of Strings in Williams Hall for nearly two weeks.

These young people are extremely talented," he said. "Preparing for the concert has been a great deal of work, but I have found it quite exciting. The improvement between the first rehearsal and today is absolutely amazing."

Johanos said the program for tonight's free concert is "an extremely difficult one." It includes three quite lengthy numbers, Vivaldi's "Concerto in E Minor for Strings," Bartok's "Divertimento for Strings" and Dvorak's "Serenade for Strings in E Major."

A native of Cedar Rapids, Ia., the young conductor has an extensive international background in music. In 1955, he received a Rockefeller Foundation grant through the American Symphony Orchestra League for advanced study in Europe.

"The idea of the grant was to see how the American conductor in a comparatively small community could make the transition between a minor and a major orchestra," Johanos said.

Johanos studied a year under the noted conductor Eugene Ormandy before leaving for Europe. Ormandy was on campus earlier this summer to conduct the Congress of Strings.

During his 16-month stay in Europe under the Rockefeller Grant, Johanos studied under noted European musicians in London, Amsterdam and Salzburg. (continued on page 4)

4-H Show Set Aug. 26 On Campus

Michigan's State 4-H Show, a miniature state fair, will open on campus Aug. 26.

The event is one of the year's highlights for the more than 70,000 state 4-H members. While much of the fair flavor remains in the 4-H Show, the usual carnival atmosphere is replaced by educational activities for exhibitors and delegates.

The show has been held at MSU for the last 20 years. The 4-H finale had its beginnings 48 years ago. The 4-H club program is conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service.

Judging of livestock, conservation, nature, arts and crafts and homemaking exhibits will be held each day.

A tractor operator's contest, an automobile safety event, public speaking elimination and the state dress revue are among the dozens of activities on the week's program.

Dr. Russ Mawby, state 4-H Club leader, emphasizes that the 4-H event is open at no charge to the general public Aug. 26-29.

There will be blue ribbons and special prizes. Members will get many tips through educational tours and meetings.

Citations to 4-H leaders and alumni will highlight the Wednesday evening program. State winners will be announced daily. (continued on page 7)

Copy of Treaty Reaches E. Lansing

An East Lansing woman has received a facsimile of the original nuclear test ban treaty which was initiated in Moscow earlier this month by ambassadors of the United States, Great Britain and the Soviet Union.

Mrs. Joan Lind, 1233 Arbor Drive, received the copy of the treaty from U.S. Senator Philip Hart (D-Michigan) for her services as chairman of the local chapter of the National Com-

mittee for a Sane Nuclear Policy (SANE).

The facsimile bears the signatures of the three negotiators who initiated the first draft of the treaty. They were Averell Harriman of the United States, Andrei Gromyko of the Soviet Union and Lord Hailsham of Great Britain.

Mrs. Lind has been chairman of SANE for two years. She has been active in the group since it was founded here three years ago.

Interest In Clinic Is Cited

About 3,600 new students have attended one of the summer counseling clinics held so far this term, said Thomas A. Goodrich, director of the counseling clinic program.

"We expect about 850 more students will attend one of the three remaining clinics. The counseling clinic program will conclude with the last session on Aug. 27-29."

Goodrich noted that in past years the counseling clinic program has attracted about three-fourths of the incoming freshman and transfer students.

"I expect the percentage of the total number of new students attending a counseling clinic will be somewhat higher this year," Goodrich said.

Two clinics a week have been held throughout the summer. The program began at the start of the summer quarter on June 19. Goodrich said he felt that the orientation program for new students had been quite successful.

Racists Tar, Feather Woman

Los Angeles (UPI) -- A Walnut, Calif., mother of two was in critical condition Monday from second and third-degree burns suffered when she was tarred and feathered and left tied in a burning house.

Mrs. Kathy Harwell told sheriff's deputies that three men entered the vacant house she and a Negro man were cleaning Sunday night. They beat her on the head, tied her up and poured hot tar and spread feathers on her body. Then they set the house ablaze.

Troops Fight Crowd For Body of Dead Monk

HUE CITY, South Viet Nam -- Government troops charged into a crowd of Buddhists Wednesday and forcibly took away the body of a novice Buddhist priest who burned himself to death yesterday in South Viet Nam. At least 25 Buddhists were hurt, five of them seriously, in the grisly battle for possession of the charred body. The 17-year-old novice committed suicide to protest alleged religious discrimination by the government of Roman Catholic Ngo Dinh Diem.

Rioting Breaks Out In Congo

LEOPOLDVILLE -- The former French Congo capital of Brazzaville was the scene of rioting Wednesday.

Reports coming into Leopoldville say that troops with orders to shoot to kill have clashed again with rioting civilians. Details on the latest clashes are scant, but there were unconfirmed reports that five demonstrators were killed and several wounded.

A 24-hour curfew is being enforced, following the burning of the city's central prison and the freeing of its prisoners Tuesday. Troops are patrolling the streets and all telephone communications with the outside world have been cut. The rioters are demanding a delay in the government's plans to outlaw political opposition. They also want union representatives included in the government.

Russia Rejects Disarmament Proposal

GENEVA -- The Soviet negotiator at the 17-nation disarmament conference in Geneva says he cannot accept the United States proposal that both countries discontinue making fissionable materials.

Soviet negotiator Tsarapkin said he had to reject the proposal because it was not a true disarmament measure. Also included in the proposal was a measure providing for the use of uranium stockpiles on peaceful projects.

Move To Block Ouster of Venezuelan Dictator

MIAMI -- Federal attorneys are moving to knock down a Florida state court ruling which postpones the extradition of former Venezuelan dictator Perez Jimenez. Yesterday a state judge ordered Perez held in Miami, pending the appeal of a paternity suit against him. At the same time, a federal court refused to delay extradition despite arguments that Perez faces execution in his homeland.

Castro Regime Captures Raiders

HAVANA -- The Castro regime has announced the capture of two Cuban fishing boats and four so-called "counter-revolutionary" agents, presumably raiders. The boats were said to have been captured off the North Coast.

Summer Vacations On The Way Out?

Nearly All Universities Now Try To Operate Year Around

Editor's Note: This is the conclusion of a two-part series dealing with summer school.

The typical undergraduate of the future may not be able to take his vacation in the summer. Although summer sessions have been instituted by universities throughout the country to meet the pressure of soaring enrollment, most of these schools, including Michigan

State, are far from operating on a full-time basis. Judging from MSU summer enrollment since 1945, the undergraduate since World War II still prefers the traditional summer break in the academic routine to attending classes the year-round.

Between 1945 and 1962, undergraduate enrollment for summer term rose from 4,198 to 5,209. A sharp increase in the number of graduate students accounted for the fact that total summer enrollment nearly doubled in the same period, from 4,840 to 8,998. The two main reasons undergraduates still seem to shy away

from summer school center around financial problems and traditional attitudes toward vacation.

Merrill R. Pierson, assistant University treasurer, said it is true that many students need a term's vacation to make money to finance their education.

"However, this would not really account for the fact that under-graduate summer enrollment has not increased vastly. Students are finding it increasingly difficult to obtain summer jobs. The chances for employment might be better during other terms.

"It would seem the reason might rest more with traditional attitudes toward summer vacation, the fact that students aren't used to the idea of taking their vacations at any other time."

Since the pressures to utilize higher educational facilities to their full capacity are increasing due to expanding enrollment, the day may come when the undergraduate here and elsewhere will be compelled to take his vacation at some time other than summer.

A recent article in the Wall Street Journal quoted Frank L. Kidner, dean of educational relationships for the University of

California at Berkeley, as saying that "the day may be coming when enrollment pressures will become so great we'll have to compel college students to take their vacation in different terms."

The University of California Board of Regents recently authorized a switch to year-round operation for the 1965-'66 school year.

Dean of Students John A. Fuzak said:

"Eventually, I believe MSU students will have to take their vacation at different terms dur-

More Parking Permits



Phone Lecture Fools Dixie Law

Without leaving his comfortable East Lansing home, Journalism Professor Harold R. Jolliffe lectured the other day to students and teachers at Jackson State College in Mississippi.

The lecture was delivered by telephone. The listeners heard it through an amplifier and were able to ask or answer questions through a microphone attached to a phone in the classroom.

Telephone lectures get around a Mississippi law that bars white instructors from teaching in Negro colleges. At Jackson State College, students have been taking a course with Dr. Moses Hadas of Columbia University via a phone hookup that includes three other colleges in the Deep South.

Dr. Jolliffe's book, "Tales from the Greek Drama," has been one of the Jackson texts.

"The class wants to know you intimately, as though they were at an 'author's luncheon'—without the luncheon, of course," a college official wrote Dr. Jolliffe when requesting the telephone talk.

"Instead of your answering questions from the class, the class decision was for hearing you for about 25 minutes talk about yourself and your book."

Dr. Jolliffe's listeners in the Jackson State College classroom included outstanding Negro high school students and teachers from throughout Mississippi, participants in a summer session called Project Enrichment.

Visiting university professors and administrators studying Project Enrichment also assembled for the lecture.

The students have studied the classics, writes a Project En-

richment official, knowing "that as the Greek dramas became real to them the past was speaking to them in the present from a time when the enduring ideals of western civilization were being born."

Working with a prepared text, Canadian born Dr. Jolliffe explained to his telephone audience that his father had been a classical scholar.

The younger Jolliffe taught the classics for several years himself before working for three years on the staff of the Toronto Star, where he inherited duties earlier relinquished by Ernest Hemingway.

After receiving the Ph.D. in classical studies from the University of Chicago, Dr. Jolliffe taught at Ohio University, where he found, he told the Jackson students, that his students enjoyed translations of the Greek dramas as much as they did modern plays.

Dr. Jolliffe joined the Michigan State faculty in 1949 as a professor of journalism but has retained his interest in the classics and a sense of humor about their presentation in modern life.

"Last winter I saw a production of 'Medea' in our Circle Theatre here," he told his Jackson audience. "As Medea was carrying off her two dead sons at the end, one of the dead boys started waving to a friend in the audience."

"Tales from the Greek Drama," issued in 1962 by Chilton, soon will be published in Japan.

Dr. Jolliffe's other publications include "The Basics of Journalism," published in Persian by the government of Afghanistan, where he was Smith-Mundt professor in 1960.

Europe's Farm Potential

Crop Export Drop Seen

The Common Market can and probably will cut into the U.S. export market of fruits and vegetables, according to a United States economist at Michigan State.

Dennis Oldenstadt reports that the Common Market countries have a great production potential.

In fact, they already outproduce the United States in apples, sweet cherries, pears and plums.

"But they lag in canning technology and quality." "The U.S. produces three times more canned fruit than the rest of the world put together. If the Common Market countries take advantage of technological advances, they could greatly strengthen their position in the world market."

share of their export market if the Common Market countries expand their processing industry. They now purchase about one fourth of the total U.S. agricultural exports.

The full impact of the Common Market cannot fully be realized until final decisions are made

as to membership and association. At present, it consists of six full-member western European countries, West Germany, France, Italy, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg. Greece became an associate member last year. But other countries, including England, would like to join.

Hannah's Aide Writes Booklet

Parents lacking a college education who want their children to have one can find help in a new MSU booklet written by T. Harry McKinney, assistant to the president.

McKinney said the booklet was written after an experimental project dealing with college admissions gave him an opportunity to talk with thousands of junior and senior high school students, parents, teachers, counselors and principals.

"Just how this will affect Michigan is difficult to tell. But, as one of the nation's leaders in fruit and vegetable production, the state would probably feel some of the effects of the Common Market."

Michigan ranks first among all of the states in the production of field beans, red tart cherries and cucumber pickles. It's also among the leaders in sugar beets, apples, peaches, pears, grapes, plums, asparagus, cabbage, cantaloupe, celery, cauliflower, onions, strawberries, lettuce, sweet corn and tomatoes.

Michigan and the rest of the United States could lose a big



 "Of course, opportunities for young conductors are different over there. The traditional way for a conductor to rise is through the opera house. There are 80 opera houses in West Germany alone.

 Johanos says he feels that the quality and standards of music in the United States are "second to none."
 "Of course, it is stimulating to go to Europe, but America is coming into her own in the arts. I look to see most of the major

symphonies conducted by native Americans in the future."
 He added that there are "no programs like the Congress of Strings in Europe."
 "This is a marvelous opportunity for these young people, particularly for the ones from small towns who would not have such a chance to learn otherwise."
 Johanos has never been to East Lansing before and has not worked with the Congress of Strings at other universities.
 "I am very impressed with the beauty of the campus," he said, "and also with the facilities here." Johanos took time out from rehearsals Saturday to spend a few hours at the Men's IM Pool.

WSWM Will Revive Radio Dramas In Fall

The old days of radio drama -- remember "Boston Blackie" and "The Green Hornet"? -- will be revived this fall with the help of Michigan State students and faculty.

But the new radio dramas will not be serialized. Instead, plays from the era of Sophocles through modern productions such as "A Man for All Seasons" will be presented on an East Lansing radio station.

On Oct. 6, the first in a series of 39 theatrical productions is scheduled on station WSWM. The shows, all produced and directed by Ken Beachler, Greenville graduate student, are part of a new Sunday format entitled "Studio A," dedicated to the plastic and performing arts.

Discussions of the theater, music and poetry and prose make up the "plastic" portion, while productions of operas, folk music songs and humor segments will comprise the performing arts section. The complete operation will take eight hours each Sunday.

Beachler is working with an educational organization, Awareness, Inc., which promotes the theory that involvement with the arts increases the esthetic sense "which is so necessary for the fulfillment of the possibilities of life."

"This stereo theater section will include masterpieces of world drama," Beachler said.

"And the actors and actresses will all be local people." About 25 persons connected with the university will be included in the casts of these productions, Beachler said. "These people are all participating because of their own personal interest, not under the auspices of the speech department as such." "The productions will provide a creative outlet for actors and actresses. It will give them the

opportunity to do something real in the line of reading." Beachler said the plays are being taped this summer for use in the fall. Once permission is obtained to do a particular play, willing cast members must be found and brought together in Beachler's "portable studio."

"I have two microphones for a stereo setup and take them with me wherever recording must be done. Some will be taped at the radio station, others at theaters throughout the state and the rest at my home."

With the two microphones and other such equipment, the plays take on the quality of a stereophonic recording, including the switching of sound from one speaker to another.

One play, Strindberg's "The Creditors," has already been put on tape. When played back in the studio, the tape gives the impression of actors and actresses moving back and forth on stage.

Beachler expects these productions to be of high quality because of the participants.

"Several of the theater groups involved have already produced some of these shows in their own theaters, so the cast members are familiar with the work."

Beachler said the purpose of this stereo theater is to present more of the arts than simply music to the radio audience. The program schedule is one of the first such plans in the nation, he said, mainly because of the stereo quality of the drama.

MSU Takes Education Beyond Campus

Michigan State is taking education directly to the people. Course work on campus is still important, but many adults cannot take time off to get a University education. To serve this need, the Continuing Education Service (CES) was established in 1948.

ditionally been an important part of MSU's programs, said James C. Totten, Continuing Education Service editor. "Basically it is a projection of University resources to those not regularly enrolled as full-time students."

It may take the form of courses offered for credit or non-credit, conferences, cultural offerings and special educational service projects, he added.

Some of the continuing education are to help people learn to do their jobs better, to help them lead more interesting lives, to help them to use their leisure time more effectively and to help them get advanced degrees.

Off-campus courses are handled through the CES University Extension Department. Dr. Melvin C. Buschman is responsible for coordinating university courses with regional directors in seven centers at Benton Harbor, Grand Rapids, Oakland University, Saginaw, Traverse City, East Lansing and Marquette.

Last year, 583 extension courses were offered for college credit and had an enrollment of 12,145. Another 27 non-credit courses were offered, and they

had 600 enrollments. Also, 46 informal evening college courses drew 1,250 enrollments.

The job of the Continuing Education Information Office is to link MSU's Continuing Education Service to the citizens of Michigan through the news media.

It publicizes the activities of the service and makes people aware of opportunities in adult education.

Besides doing interviews and reporting on conferences, Totten also has charge of arranging press conferences for prominent people. Some of the personalities he has interviewed include such notables as Eleanor Roosevelt, Ezra Taft Benson, Roberta Peters, Gov. Romney, Errol Garner, Vivian Blaine, Al Capp and Pierre Salinger.

many instructors from different university departments, which indicates the campus-wide participation in the extension program," Totten said.

To help solve community problems, the Institute for Community Development was set up in 1958, he indicated. The institute deals with such problems as fringe area growth, recreation and leisure time activities, juvenile delinquency, inter-group relations and citizenship education. Dr. Duane L. Gibson heads Community Development.

Other special CES programs operate through the office of the director, Dr. Howard R. Neville, who also is acting provost. The associate director, Dr. Armand L. Hunter, is now administering these programs.

They include the Cap and Gown Series, which offers cultural enrichment to outlying areas, and the University of the Air, which produces television courses both for credit and for non-credit. Last year these were 128 Cap and Gown Series performances.

Other areas in the Continuing Education Service are the Traffic Safety Center, directed by Gordon H. Sheehy, the Evening College

directed by Robert E. Sharer, and the Office of Community College Cooperation, directed by Dr. Max S. Smith.

To many college students, the most visible sign of Continuing Education Service activities is its University Conferences program. In the 1962-'63 year, 304 conferences were held at Kellogg Center for nearly 44,000 registrants. Another 4,988 people attended 283 other educational meetings. Tunis H. Dekker directs the conference program.

"The ready availability of faculty assistance in planning and helping to conduct the many conferences and special courses has made MSU one of the foremost institutions in the nation in the field of residential adult education," Totten added.

Continuing Education Service also has charge of campus tours. In 1962, 63, about 14,000 guests were shown about the campus.

To go with its education programs, the service has established a research program for continuing education. Its purpose is to help the university increase the effectiveness of the program.

New Job For Trolley

An old streetcar now resting on the corner of two streets in a Washington suburb has not met the fate of most outdated means of transportation. Instead of wasting away in the junk yard, this streetcar is a church.

The transformation began last month with the misfortunes of a minister named the Rev. James A. Kearse.

He recently founded the First Baptist Church in Lanham, Md. He had no church building and planned to deliver his first sermon in an Army surplus tent. A violent rain and wind storm tore the would-be chapel to shreds a week before the service. The Rev. Mr. Kearse consequently preached to his 35 member congregation under an oak tree.

A few days later, when the saddened preacher was driving into Washington, he noticed a streetcar being hauled into a car barn.

Project Peru On Camera

One of the students on "Project Peru" sent a roll of film to St. John's Student Parish "depicting our work better than we can describe it."

Jim Keating is one of the MSU students constructing a Church near Arequipa, Peru. He wrote, "Our Church is coming along well, as you can see from the photos. We also seem to have gotten accustomed to working at this altitude."

Later correspondence from Jane Adams revealed that the men finished the church a week ago. She said a fiesta follows the completion of a new church. In addition to erecting the church, the 21 students have also worked in the hospitals and taught in a parish school.

They will return to the United States next week. Pat McDivitt wrote, "We will all be sad to leave, but also very happy to hit those States again. The people here never stop amazing me with their hospitality and friendliness."

"At that moment I had my revelation," he remembered. "This was the answer from the Lord." The preacher made a phone call to the bus company. He was told that the last 200 streetcars in town had been sold to a radio personality, who had formed a trolley corporation nearby.

"Can you make one of those streetcars into a church?" the minister soon was asking.

One month later, a new church stood on the corner of two streets in Lanham. The undercarriage of the remodeled streetcar was gone. The new Baptist church had been given a coat of off-white paint.

Half of the windows contain stained glass; the other half depict Biblical themes. A custom-made pulpit was installed at one end behind a small organ. The church was wired for heating, air conditioning and a public address system which carries taped organ music through the service.

Lutheran World Federation Church Seeks Closer Tie With Roman Catholics

On hand at the fourth General Assembly of the Lutheran World Federation was the first delegation ever sent by the Vatican to a world Protestant organization.

Saturday the assembly approved creation of a group to further friendly relations with other churches, especially the Roman Catholic church. Time magazine brought up the question: "Is there a weakening in the historic split between Rome and the original Protestant church?"

The move to create a special Lutheran foundation for inter-confessional research was called one of the most important decisions made in the closing work session. The new commission will be independent in its studies but closely related to the World Federation.

Also, an American church leader succeeded another American as president of the Federation. The Rev. Dr. Fredrik A. Schlotz, president of the American Lutheran Church, was elected unanimously to take the place of the outgoing President, the Rev. Dr. Franklin Fry.

The Rev. Dr. Fry said at the assembly: "Lutheran churches are prepared in spirit to reach out to brethren everywhere in a search for the fuller oneness of those who call Christ Lord in the midst of a hostile world."

The assembly will also re-examine Martin Luther's doctrine of justification by faith alone.

About 52 million of the world's 72 million Lutherans are members of the World Federation. Those attending the assembly in Helsinki, Finland, include three Lutheran leaders from East Lansing: the Rev. Theodore Bunden-

thal, pastor of Martin Luther Chapel; the Rev. Walter Wietzke, pastor of University Lutheran Church, and George Bubolz, layman active on national committees.

The 12-day meetings will close next week. The Rev. Mr. Bundenthal and the Rev. Mr. Wietzke will visit areas of personal interest abroad before returning to campus.

The Most Rev. Arthur Lichtenberger, presiding bishop of the Protestant and Episcopal Church, said last week that the ruling has opened the way for an objective study of religion and puts the Christian faith "in proper perspective."

Pilot Turns Christian

The Japanese pilot who dropped the first bomb on Pearl Harbor was in Detroit recently on a different mission.

Captain Mitsuo Fuchida gave the order to attack Pearl Harbor in 1941. Converted to the Christian faith in 1950, he is now touring the world on behalf of the Pocket Testament League.

Fuchida, who sank the battleship Maryland, said his conversion came through a chance meeting with U.S. soldier 13 years ago. He said he was impressed by the enthusiasm of the GI, who had taken part in the bombing of Tokyo and was the author of a missionary pamphlet.

Obtaining a copy of the Bible, Fuchida was most impressed with the passage from the Gospel of Luke telling of the crucifixion of Christ and how he forgave sinners.

Fuchida barely missed the retaliation of the U.S. in 1945. He was in Hiroshima the day before an American atomic bomb nearly wiped the city off the map. But a telephone call from his headquarters took him back to Tokyo.

Now a missionary for peace, Fuchida said, "Today, I do only the things that glorify the Lord Jesus Christ."

Bishop Defines Prayer Ruling

The Supreme Court ruling against the required reading of the Lord's Prayer in public school classes was not "a denial of the Christian faith," according to U.S. bishop.

The Most Rev. Arthur Lichtenberger, presiding bishop of the Protestant and Episcopal Church, said last week that the ruling has opened the way for an objective study of religion and puts the Christian faith "in proper perspective."

New York Priest Killed

A Roman Catholic priest was stabbed to death last week in his sister's home in Manhattan.

The Rev. Fr. Francis McShane of Our Lady of Mount Carmel Church in Elmsford, N.Y., was found by his brother, also a

priest. A knife was lying nearby.

A witness told police she saw the Rev. Fr. McShane get out of a station wagon with a second man. She saw only the second man leave. Police found the stolen car parked near the home.
