Expected Enrollment Topped By 1,600--27,669 Register

This year's campus enrollment hit an all-time record figure of 27,669 topping the estimated figure of 26,000 by more than 1,600.

Registrar Horace C. King released the total Thursday. Enrollment continues to grow in most divisions at Michigan State, he said. The total compares to last year's campus enrollment of 25,014.

"The additional students were accommodated because classroom space was changed to fit them in and because all departments gave us excellent cooperation."

Total resident credit enrollment is 29,094 compared to 26,472 for last year. This figure includes the campus total and totals at the seven resident centers around the state.

Resident center totals are 1,425, down 33 from last year. Resident centers are located in Benton Harbor, Grand Rapids, Traverse City, Pontiac, Saginaw, Marquette and the South Central Office here on campus. Many of the courses offered at the resident centers are afternoon and evening classes for credit.

Oakland University, MSU's affiliate near Pontiac, recorded 1,481, which is up from 1,255 in 1962.

Credit extension course students numbered 963. This figure compares to 1,098 for 1962. Credit extension courses are offered to off-campus students not enrolled in the resident

Both the resident center program and the credit extension program are taught by MSU instructors who travel over the state to teach in the program.

Of the students studying on the East Lansing campus, about 13,500 live in Michigan State's 34 residence halls. Some 10 per cent or 1,300 students are living three to a room. Most of the overassignment is in the men's dormi-

"In general, I would say registration in the Intramural

Building went smoothly, but the overall effect will not be known until the assistant deans for student affairs and the registrar's staff appraise all factors," said Registrar Horace

Early registration of freshmen and graduate students made registration much easier than in the past. The plan may be extended to include more students in the future.

The registrar said class lists were distributed to instructors before 8 a.m. Thursday. The Data Processing Department worked until 6:30 a.m. before all the work was completed,

The development followed reports that a group of American businessmen have been meeting in Canada with a Soviet delegation to discuss a wheat deal. Earlier, Russian officials signed a half-billion dollar wheat deal with Canada to fill gaps left by crop failures in Russia.

Two Men, Body, Found in Gulf

ST. PETERSBURG, Florida-Two men, one of them incoherent, and the body of a pregnant woman have been found floating in the Gulf of Mexico, some 80 miles Southwest of St. Petersburg.

The Coast Guard said the three were aboard a 38-foot pleasure boat, the "Ev-Ann" which disappeared in the stormy gulf

Hurricane Approaching Hispaniola

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico-Hurricane Edith was last reported moving toward the island of Hispaniola with winds of 100 miles an hour. Gale warnings were sent out for southern Haiti and the southwestern Dominican Republic, and Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands have warned against possible floods.

Pope's Nephew Marries

BRESCIA, Italy, -A nephew of Pope Paul VI and an Italian countess were married Thursday at Capodimonte near this northern city. The Pontiff sent a personal message and his apostolic blessing to Giovanni Bosco Montini, an engineer, and Countess Marzia Provaglio.

NORTH ANDOVER, Mass. -A Cessna 310 plane with two men aboard flew over the Lawrence Municipal Airport Tnursday burning up gasoline before attempting a landing with a damaged link in the front wheel.

Airport Manager Melvin S. Kirkman was in touch with the pilot, James Jackson, by radio. He estimated the plane, which was in the air about an hour shortly before 11:30 a.m., nad enough fuel for three or four hours.

Gals Save Day In Rent Delay


"Honey, did you pay the rent?" About four or five students living in married housing asked their wives that question during registration. They were held up during registration for not paying their rent on time.

After consulting with the "better half," the students found their rent had been paid. They were permitted to continue registration after explaining the situation to registration officials.

Paul Rumpsa, University Business Office, explained that rent cards are pulled out of a file when rent is paid. Those left after the rent deadline show to the office staff those married students who have not paid.

It seems that through a clerical error, cards for four or five married students who had paid, were not pulled. It doesn't happen





I cannot prove the existence of God. The Bible does not have all the answers. It has value only when it is viewed in the light of history and ancient cultures.

This column is entitled, "Faith on Campus." To have faith means to believe in something you cannot prove. Yet I do not term this blind, any more than I do Jesus' statement, "Blessed are they who have not seen and yet have believed." It is nonsense to expect to see everything before we can admit

it exists. I cannot see truth, love or happiness, but I know they exist. What makes us think we are so special that God will peek from behind the clouds in a human form and say "see and believe." Smokers Puff Death Rate

DETROIT UPI--The direct of a six-year cancer prevention study says the risk of lung cancer from pipe or cigar smoking is extremely small.

Doctor E. Cuyler Hammond who made the study for the American Cancer Society said in Detroit Wednesday night that there are at least 12 known causes of

He said cigarettes were on the list, plus coal soot, arsenic, pure nickel dust, radioactive material and asbestos dust.

Hammond noted that lung cancer does not occur in people who breathe pure air.

He said--"If you live and work in uncontaminated conditions, your chances of getting lung cancer are practically you smoke cigarettes."

A person who satokes one pack a day has a death rate roughly 80 per cent higher than nonsmokers, with variations depend-

He added that at 40, those who smoke two or more packs of cigarettes a day have a death rate about three times that of non-

He also said smoking increases the frequency of heart disease.



Spartans, Edge Ready for Opener

NC Quarterback Fully Recovered

When a group of farm boys from Michigan Agricultural College decided to play a game of football against Lansing High School back in 1896, they really started something.

Only a few curious spectators watched the birth of MSU football that autumn afternoon, but 65,000 fans are expected to be on hand tomorrow at 1:30 p.m. in Spartan Stadium for the season opener against the North Carolina Tar Heels.

Sixty-seven years have passed since that first contest, which the Aggles won 10-0, and tomorrow's match marks the 555th in Spartan grid history.

The year should prove to be an interesting one since the schedule includes such distinguished foes as Southern California, Michigan, Northwestern, Wisconsm, Purdue, and Notre Dame.

North Carolina has been given the "dark horse" label in most grid circles, but some experts feel they have the potential to develop into a national power.

MSU coach Duffy Daugherty is aware that the Carolinians could pack a wallop. "We're looking forward to a real good game," he said. "They have an experienced team and had one of the nation's best passing attacks toward the end of last season.

The Tar Heel squad boasts 29 monogram winners including quarterback Junior Edge, eighth among the nation's passers last year, and end Bob Lacey who ranked number seven in the country in pass receiving.

Edge completed 19 of 27 passes in Carolina's 38-6 loss to MSU last season, and the effort accounted for 244 yards. Lacey snared 10 of the aerials, and one of them was good for a touchdown. Lacey, Edge, and left halfback Ken Willard led the Tar Heels

to an 11-7 win over Virginia in the opener last week. The Tar Heel quarterback injured during last week's opening day victory over Virginia, is reported back in condition and has been working out since Tuesday.

Adams recently returned from a two-year assignment with Radio Free Europe, a privately financed organization that beams radio broadcasts into the five Russian satellite countries.

He served as director of research on communist countries and as a member of Radio Free Europe's policy board.

Adams credits the organization with a direct influence on the social and political changes that have occurred in eastern Europe since the Hungarian revoit o. 1936.
