Algerian Forces Meet Rebel Opposition

ALGIERS, Algeria (UPI) -- Government forces have seized two gateways to the rebellious Grand Kabylia district in Algeria where opposition factions have defied the authority of strongman Ben Bella's government. Officials say the rebel forces are crumbling. But other reports tell of eight-thousand anti-Ben Bella troops forming a guerrilla band in the mountains.

McNamara And Taylor Remain In South Viet Nam

SAIGON (UPI) -- The United States' two top trouble-shooters in South Viet Nam Monday delayed their scheduled departure from that country for 24 hours. Defense Secretary Robert Mcnamara stayed in Saigon to confer with other members of the mission sent to South Viet Nam by President Kennedy. General Maxwell Taylor flew to a city 30 miles north of Saigon and was told by a top Vietnamese general that victory over the communists could be achieved by 1964 with continued American aid.

Two Arrested In Church Bombing

BIRMINGHAM (UPI) -- Alabama State Police have arrested two white men in connection with the church bombing in Birmingham that killed four Negro girls and possibly other bombings. A city police official has identified the men as R.E. Chambliss and Charles Cagle. Both have been connected with Ku Klux Klan activities in Alabama. The men are being held on an open charge.

Cholera Quarantine In Okinawa

OKINAWA (AP) -- An intensive quarantine operation will begin at Okinawa air and sea ports Monday to prevent the spread of a cholera epidemic to the U.S.-administered islands.

The government of Ryukyus and the U.S. Civil Administration Sunday announced the action after an Okinawan tourist who returned from Japan recently was found to have stayed at a hotel where a confirmed cholera carrier was found. The tourist was placed under observation at Naha General

A U.S. spokesman said three American doctors have been de-

tailed to work in coordination with Ryukyuan officials in carrying out the quarantine operation.

Meanwhile travelers will be prevented from entering or leaving without certification of cholera immunization.

Senator Proposes Force To Return Bosch

WASHINGTON (AP)--Sen. Ernest Gruening, D-Alaska, said today the United States should see to it that deposed Dominican President Juan Bosch is returned to complete his term.

Bosch was reported today aboard a Dominican navy frigate. Informed sources said the ship was headed for the French island of Guadeloupe.

Gruening said in an interview that the United States should intercept the vessel and return Bosch to power. Gruening says he has sent his request to the White House.

"No alternative is possible without disaster, not only to the Dominican Republic, but to the entire Alliance for Progress program and to the prestige of the United States in this hemis-

Hurricane Hits Tobago

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) -- A hurricane hit the island of Tobago today with 100-mile-an-hour fury and continued on toward the Grena-

A bulletin from the weather bureau at San Juan, Puerto Rico, included an "emergency warning" to residents of low-lying areas of Trinidad and the Grenatline Islands to flee to higher ground "before it is too late."

By noon, two hours after the first warning, the "wall of the eye" had reached Tobago, an island of 40,000 population 36 miles north of the coast of Venezuela. Winds of 100 miles an hour raged

By 2 p.m., the eye was directly over the island. With the hurricane came torrential rains and storm tides five to seven feet high.

Gale force winds extended 50 miles to the south of the eye. This would mean that the northern half of Trinidad, with its population of 786,434, was in the gale area. Gales also reached 100 miles to the north and east and 50 miles to the west.

The weather bureau said the eye of the hurricane would reach Grenada by sunset. This island at the lower end of the windward chain has 88,000 population. The Windwards border the eastern end of the Caribbean sea.

First Nuclear-Powered Satellite Up For-5 Years

The first U.S. satellite fully powered in space by a nuclear generator was launched Monday from Vandenberg Air Force Base in California, and described as a "complete success." The generator is designed to provide 25 watts of electrical current for some five years, while orbiting the earth.

Maria Krzywoblocki, mechanical engineering professor, called this a splendid success for the Martin Corp.

Dominican Democracy Falters

The cause of Latin-American democracy and liberalism suffered a jolting setback in the coup which deposed President Juan Bosch of the Dominican Republic.

Bosch is alleged to have been pro-communist by his military opponents. No doubt this extreme rightist element would view the allowing of all political groups to operate as perverted leftism.

Bosch is a highly intelligent person, a former author and professor. Only last February, in accordance with a new constitution, he was elected president. Now, two years after the end of Generalissimo Trujillo's three decade reign of tyranny, the Dominican people are confronted with a government founded on force.

In an effort to build a showcase opposite Cuba, the U.S. poured in extensive aid. But Bosch still had to deal with the ravages left by years of misrule.

With too many of his fellow countrymen pursuing diverse courses of action, he never got the cooperation so necessary to rebuilding the torn Republ

And so the typical Latin-American pattern prevailed last week in Santo Domingo.

Popular Entertainment Backed

For the third year in succession, the Frosh-Soph Council is bringing a popular singing group to the campus. Wednesday the Lettermen will be appearing in the Auditorium.

The University is fortunate in having a superb Lecture-Concert Series. In the course of a year's presentation, series director Wilson Paul manages to encompass the full spectrum of the more classi-

cal arts. But this has always been to the exclusion of most contemporary forms of popular entertainment.

It is encouraging to see the Frosh-Soph Council continuing to act to fill this need.

The Council showed discretion in scheduling the performance early in the term. All too often such programs compete with the more serious pursuits of the student.

Vietnam Furor Analyzed

Two straws in the wind suggest that there may be common ground between the disputing American factions in Saigon.

The first is a fact that has just come to light. Americans who read the report of General Maxwell Taylor following his earlier visit to Saigon, have disclosed that it was not merely a military document. General Taylor is said to have also emphasized the need to broaden the political base of the Diem government.

That was two years ago. Since then, the Diem regime has openly crossed swords with a faction of younger officers in the Vietnamese military who rebelled and wrecked the palace, with the Buddhists, the students and most recently with prominent civilians of all sorts suspected of opposing the regime. These latter were arrested. The political base of the regime is obviously far more narrow than it was when General Taylor criticized it two years ago.

The second hint comes from the columnist Joseph Alsop. He went to South Vietnam ahead of the McNamara-Taylor mission, and strongly denounced the group of American correspondents there who had emphasized rising political opposition to the Ngo family rule. Mr. Alsop remained in Vietnam to swing around and almost adopt their point of view.

He now argues that the Bud-

dist crisis has had the political effect of a "broken mainspring. One result has been to cause President Diem to lose all sureness of touch," he continues. "The other and more important result has been to make all those reports of resentment (against the regime) come true at last. There is real bitterness toward the regime now, and the combination of this with the singular state of affairs in Gia Long Palace certainly raises grave questions about the viability of the Diem regime." He goes on to say that "on any practical calculation, President Diem will either take the needed steps to make his government viable again or strong internal forces will eventually take steps to secure a new government which will be viable."

Mr. Alsop incidentally confirmed the American reporters' judgment that the Buddhists had not been controlled or seriously infiltrated by Communists. President Diem himself blamed unnamed "foreign agitators and adventurers," in his recent letter to U Thant, and did not mention Communists. His spokesmen at the United Nations have referred to Indonesians, Cambodians and some French and Americans.

The progress of the wardepends on both military and political factors and it seems likely that the McNamara-Taylor report will take both into consideration.

Racism Strikes North

ever witnessed. helmeted police, with the aid of nightsticks and fire extinguishers, arrested 10 youths, forcibly restrained scores of others, and lic given up all pretense of hour battle in which four policefinally dispersed the unruly mob.

Police personally escorted many of the marching youths to the southeast area of the city, where most of the Negroes live. Later that night, amid cries of "This isn't Alabama," and "I'll die for my freedom," a group of nearly 150 Negroes gathered to protest what they termed the "rank discrimination" that exists in Jackson.

The city, of course, was both shocked and humiliated by the outbursts. Regrettably, and perhaps unjustifiably, it focussed national attention upon the city as one where serious and deeply disturbing racial undercurrents are brewing.

Dazed Jacksonians awoke the next morning asking themselves whether it was Jackson, Michigan or Mississippi they were living in. School officials' reaction was swift, and in light of what had happened, predictable. Any student caught fighting, carrying concealed weapons or in any way inciting a disturbance, faced immediate expulsion. If any previous record of the student indicated habitual trouble-making. the expulsion was to be permanent and irrevocable.

Yet concerned citizens are still asking themselves what triggered the violence. How did the deepening national crisis reach its climax for this relatively uneventful little town in Michigan? The Negroes' struggle for equality, the laborious and often violent road toward integration of the races, has been a forward march that has revealed its inexorable progress after this critical summer of sporadic violence, frustration and discord in cities, both North and South, across the country.

Boston, Cambridge, Birmingham, Detroit, Chicago, Atlanta, New York, Oxford -- all have experienced essentially the same trouble as Jackson. Yet the real significance of the riot in Jackson may lie in the fact that other small towns throughout the nation, just like Jackson, may be in for the same, and quite possibly worse, unless more progress

up and admit the fact the better. lacksonians might do well to realize that they are not the first town or the first generation to experience racial violence. Harper's Ferry, Little Rock, bloody Kansas, Birmingham, the Detroit riots of the forties, even Alward Lake--what generation has not known racial discord?

For from the year 1619 when a Dutch ship dropped anchor in the Harbor at Jamestown with its cargo of "20 Negars" to swap for food, not a single segment in the fabric of American life was to go untouched by the black thread introduced into the nation's social and cultural loom that day at Jamestown.

Dazed Northerners might do well to consider from an historical perspective the Negroes struggle for equality, if they are genuinely concerned about avoiding future trouble. Dred Scott, Medgar Evers, John Brown, Martin Luther King, Marcus Garvey, Roy Wilkins -- how many names has the "Negro question" thrust into national prominence? Jackson surely is not the first to find trouble in its own back yard.

Lynch laws, Mr. Interlocutor, literacy tests, underground railroads, freedom rides, jazz, Black Muslims, Ku Klux Klan, sit-ins-what man, woman or child in all the land can say he has escaped the influence of the Negro in his midst?

Rather than sweeping under the rug all notions that racial vio-lence could erupt "in our town," Northern towns and cities across the country might do well to begin admitting this possibility--and begin doing something about it.

New Prof Doing Ag Research

Sverker Persson, formerinstructor at Sweden's Royal College of Agriculture, recently joined the MSU agricultural engineering department.

Presently, he is teaching advanced courses in farm power and

Under grants from the Detroit Arsenal, Persson is conducting research in soil dynamics. He is also coordinating statewide experiments in soil strength and farm machinery traction.

After graduation from the Junior College of Kristianstad in 1940, Persson earned his masters from Chalmers Institute of Technology in Gothenburg.

He came to the United States on a Kellogg fellowship which enabled him to earn his doctorate at MSU in 1960. At that time he made a special study of ways to improve tractor construction and performance.

Returning to Sweden, Persson continued his work with traction and grain combines.

He came to the United States again because he felt a Swedish tendency toward economical rather than technical research in agricultural engineering limited opportunities in his field. 
