The Medical Education Committee report will be submitted to the Coordinating Council next month. The Council is made up of the presidents and a member of each governing board from all Michigan institutions of higher

Amid the splendor of an Indian summer afternoon, the pageantry of the 56th MSU-University of Michigan football game unfolded before 101,450 fans Saturday at Ann Arbor.

It was a day of good football, great bands and noisy students. There was color galore, but somehow the day was incomplete. The two most important elements were missing-victory and defeat.

There was no wild cheering on either side

Police Cooperate At Rallies

When MSU students take to the evening trail, such as in last week's giant pep-rally, the Department of Public Safety and the Dean of Student's office are not far behind. Most of the thousands who are marching and having a gay time never realize their presence, and herein lies the secret of their success.

They have learned through years of experience that when it comes to impromtu peprallies, the old maxim of "he who governs least, governs best' is true. Such was not always the case.

In past years large gatherings of students were frowned upon, and police tried to break them up before they got started. This however only succeeded in accelerating the enthusiasm and channeling it into an antipolice demonstration.

Now that police let these student rallies have some lee-

way, they've found out that students aren't bent on destroying things, and that given the chance they'll gladly let a "Beat Michigan" rally substitute for a panty raid.

It is an interesting note that the latter has lost much of its appeal in the last few years. Older students, who used to live in dorms, have been lured off-campus by revised housing rules.

The younger freshmen, not having been exposed to the old ways, are finding that it's much more fun to let the coeds come outside and join in the merrymaking, than to have them locked up behind closed dormitory doors.

Last week's restraint on the part of Campus police went a long way towards proving to students that the police are not there to be killjoys, but simply to protect property and to keep people from getting hurt.

Marriage, Education Compatible

The chancellor of the University of California's new Santa Cruz campus, has ser ved notice that married students won't find his campus a very hospitable place to get an education. He explains that although he isn't opposed to all undergraduate marriages nor will the administration prohibit them, there will be enough obstacles to make those considering marriage think twice.

His reasons are that college students often rush into a marriage that winds up in the divorce courts. "The wife drops out of school to put her husband through," he said. "They grow apart intellectually. Then she gets pregnant and never gets back to class. They wind up in the divorce court."

His solution is to make it hard for students to continue their education if they are married. For example, the Santa Cruz campus will not provide housing for married undergraduates, nor places to park their automobiles, nor will the school make it easy to hold the necessary part-time job while going to school.

The chancellor's plans are extremely short-sighted and are analogous to killing the body to cure the disease. His

During the June 4-6 uprising in Iran, several thousand people who were fighting to free them selves of the Shah's dictator- at 3 a.m. to seize the owners of ship were brutally massacred. The "free press" of the "free world" fully cooperated with the Shah's propaganda agents in calling the patriots "reactionaries opposed to reforms and women's rights." Even the true figure of the victims was never reported. The highest figure ever reported was "several hundred."

Taking advantage of the subsequent terror and shock, plus the state of martial law, parliamentary elections, which have been over-due for three years, were held and rigged when all opposition leaders were in jail. Now we have found out that the court martial prosecutor has asked the death penalty for nine National Front leaders.

It is fair to ask, "What are the lessons gained from the last patriotic uprising and its aftermath?"

The most important lesson was indicated by the complete support of the U.S. government for the Shah while his commandoes were gunning down innocent people in the streets of Tehran.

The United States defended their role in Iran by referring to the Russian menace and the necessity of protecting the free world.

It has not occurred to the American government that they have simply been mesmerized by the Russians, and that the secret weapon the Soviet Union has is the bewilderment, despair and hunger of millions of people-also their oppression by their vile dictators -- of whose existence the United States are scarcely aware.

Your mistakes and your blind protection of the status quo help bind those people to their misery and bewilderment, and, insofar as they find this state intolerable, the United States are intolerably menaced. For if they find their state insufferable, but are too heavily oppressed to change it, the only alternative will be an open revolt. Thus, when eventually they do change their situation--as in Cuba--you are menaced more than ever by the vacuum and hostility that succeeds all violent upheavals. Name Withheld

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


Lou Bobich's kick tied the score and the teams spent the rest of the afternoon in a futile attempt to break the stalemate.


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
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

Propelled by the fleet feet of sophomore Dick Sharkey, an aroused State cross country squad hammered out a convincing 25-33 decision over Wisconsin Saturday for their initial triumph of the '63 season.

The victory, coming on the heels of last week's setback at the hands of Ohio University, evened the harriers dual-meet mark at 1-1.

emn Roman Catholic rite of beatification raised a one-time American frontier priest, John Nepomucene Neumann, to the final step before sainthood Sun-

He was the second American to achieve the state of "beatus" (blessed) this year. Elizabeth Ann Seton, a New York nun, was elevated last March. The ceremony for Neumann, who became a bishop in Philadelphia before his death in 1860, prompted Pope Paul VI to remark:


'Behold, America, too, has its holy ones. Yesterday it was the Blessed Mother Seton who climbed to the altars

"Today it is Bishop Neumann whom we venerate as blessed and who opens up a double vision: that of numerous Americans, heroes of the faith and of charity who are equally deserving to rise upon the altars; and that of a sanctity no longer individual but collective, no longer restrictive to single cases but divided among numerous groups of the faithful, no longer of one but of many -- a sanctity of the people."

they fell into each other's arms and wept and exchanged forgiveness and became fast friends all over again. For three years they drifted in the dinghy, shaking hands


and singing the Cal Tech rouser all the while. Then, at long last, they spied a passing liner and were taken aboard.

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
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

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
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
