#### Russians Back Down To British

BERLIN (AP) -- The Russians finally backed down after nine hours and permitted a British convoy to continue westward when its commander rejected a Soviet demand that 28 men leave vehicles for a head count. There was no delay when the convoy reached the other end of the 110 mile Autobahn and entered West

In Washington, some officials are changing their minds that last week's detention of two U.S. convoys was "misunderstanding" in view of Wednesday's stoppage of the British group.

#### Algeria Claims Victory Over Morocco

ALGIERS R -- The Algerian government is claiming a major victory over Moroccan forces in the three days of border fighting in the Sahara desert. At the same time there are reports that anti-government Berber guerrillas are returning in the rear of the Algerina army from the hills to which they recently moved.

#### 125th American Dies In Viet Nam

SAIGON R -- A U.S. military spokesman says an army sergeant became the 125th American to die fighting Red guerrillas in Viet Nam when he was struck by fragments of a thrown grenade.

#### 5th U.S. Soldier Defects

BERLIN (UPI)- The East German news agency claims a noncommissioned officer from the U.S. Army's 6th Rocket Battalion in West Berlin has defected across the border and asked for political asylum. The news agency says G.I. Frank Barton was the fifth U.S. soldier to have defected in the last week.

#### Flora Death Toll Rises

PORT AU PRINCE P--Haitian officials said Wednesday the death toll from the recent hurricane Flora in Haiti has reached 5,000 and may climb higher when surveyors complete their study of the interior.

Relief work continues, with U.S. Navy helicopter pilots flying in food and medical supplies.

#### Progress Made For Multi-Nation Nuclear Force

WASHINGTON R--President Kennedy was told Wednesday by the Secretary-General of NATO, Dirk Stikker, that some progress is being made toward creating a multi-nation nuclear naval

Stikker said he had a very useful talk with Kennedy, including a long discussion of military problems and the proposed naval

He told newsmen after his White House visit that some technical problems, in the fields of language, law, and even cooking food for crews of different nationalities, still have to be worked out.

#### Nationalist China Opposes Red's Admission To U.N.

UNITED NATIONS (A) -- Nationalist China has warned against the seating of Red China in the U.N. General Assembly. The chairman of the Nationalist delegation says if Communist China joins the assembly she would try to wreck it.

#### Air Force Halves Speed Record

ENGLAND P--Three U.S. Air Force officers hustled a B58 bomber across an Artic path from Japan to Britain nonstop Wednesday in record-halving time of 8 hours and 35 minutes.

The Delta-Winged Convair jet covered the 8,028 miles between

Tokyo and London at an average speed of 938 m.p.h. The Hustler's normal maximum is about 1,325 m.p.h., but the plane had to slow down five times to be refueled by aerial tankers stationed along its route for this longest supersonic flight in

## **OK Atom** Ban In Space

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. P --A resolution calling on all countries to bar nuclear weapons from outer space won unanimous adoption Wednesday in the U.N. General Assembly's main political committee. It was slated for final approval in the Ill-nation assembly itself today.

The Soviet Union and the United States, which had stated their intentions not to station atomic weapons in space, sponsored the resolution with the 15 countries that participated in the Geneva disarmament negotiations.

An MSU professor who worked on the project which developed the first atomic bomb during World War II called the proposal before the United Nations to ban nuclear weapons in outer space "a new step toward freeing the world from fear of nuclear war."

Richard Schlegel, professor of physics, was a member of the team of U.S. scientists at the University of Chicago who developed the original atomic bomb first used at Hiroshima in 1945.

He says recent international developments beginning with the nuclear test ban treaty signed last summer are "the first encouraging news in international affairs for a long while."

The resolution outlawing the orbiting of nuclear weapons in outer space was approved unanimously Wednesday by the main political committee of the U.N. General Assembly. Sponsored by the United States, the Soviet Union and 15 other countries, it is expected to be approved by the Ill-member General Assembly

Schlegel said the nature of twice. the proposal would make it easy to detect any cheating. "It is extremely encouraging that this proposal was sponsored by both major world powers."

"Many of us hope the nuclear test ban treaty and this new agreement will lead to a flood of restrictions on nuclear weapons which will eventually end in disarmament," he added.

## Britain Power Fight Nears End

nvite Mme. Nhu To MSU

LONDON, (AP) -- The grim struggle for control of Britain's Conservative government narrowed Wednesday night into a race between two commoners -- Richard Austen Butler and Reginald Maudling. Butler, 60, is regarded as middleroad and Maudling, 46, more to the liberal side.

The prolonged drama over who will succeed the stricken Harold Macmillan as Prime Minister neared its climax with a firm decision authoritatively forecast for Friday.

"The resignation of Prime Minister Macmillian has thrown the Conservative Party into a quandry shortly before the said Bruce Smith, professor of political science, who has just returned from England.

Resigning mainly for the good of the party, Macmillian stated in a letter read before the House of Commons, "It is now clear that, whatever may have been my previous feelings, it will not be possible for me to carry the physical burden of leading the party in the next general elections."

Smith believes that the real issues at the party conference will be whether to elect Butler or Ian Maclead, leader of the House of Commons and Co-chairman of the party, both powerful political positions.

"Butler," said Professor Smith, "represents the hardcore Conservative wing of the party, while Macleod represents the younger set and is more imaginative, more "Consequently, Macleod is more likely to defeat Harold

Wilson, the progressive, popular leader of the Labor Party. "Another factor to consider in the coming elections is the rapidly rising Liberal Party; they are energetic and

have a popular leader in Joe Grimmond," said Smith. Politically non-existent since the 1920's the Liberal Party has experienced a rapid rise in popularity in recent years, mostly at the expense of the Conservative Party. In the past by-elections the Liberals have been taking enough votes away from the Conservative Party to give the Labor candidate a victory. It is possible, though not likely, that this is what will happen in the general elections.

There is no doubt but that one of the main contributing factors in the election will be the social program of each party. "Labor has much more of a social program than the Conservatives do, and the Liberals are still sitting on the fence," Smith said.

Macleod, if elected, maybe able to force the party to adopt a more progressive social program. Butler, however, would probably allow the situation to remain as it is.

However, the choice may be made in the end by Macmillian. For if the party cannot break the deadlock and elect a leader, the Queen has the perogative to call on Macmillian for advice and then appoint a Prime Minister. This is how Macmillian got the job, and this is how he may leave it.

## Speech Sunday **Possible**

Two Michigan State students drove to the east coast Tuesday to invite Madame Ngo Dinh Nhu to speak on campus.

Jack Naiman, president of the International Relations Club, and Albert Bui, son of Viet Nam's minister of the interior, and a graduate student in political science described their trip as "a mission to convince Madame Nhu that people were interested in hearing her and that she would get a fair chance to state her position."

If Madame Nhu accepts the invitation she will speak on campus this Sunday, Naiman said. Her acceptance is subject to her voice holding out, as she has recently suffered from laryngitis, he

"We should know by today whether or not Madame Nhu will be able to accept the engagement," said Wesley R. Fishel, political science professor and advisor to the International Relations Club.

"We told Madame Nhu that she could expect an audience of six to eight thousand and complete news coverage on all media for the Midwest area," Naiman

Naiman said that he called Monday night and contacted Madame Nhu's UN observer and first secretary. The advisor indicated Madame Nhu's willingness to speak if public interest in the Mid west warranted it,

according to Naiman. This conversation took place before the Harvard and Princeton demonstrations which followed Madame Nhu's speeches there,

"I may not sympathize with her views," Naiman said, "but I believe she has a right to

be heard" For security reasons, Madame

Nhu and her staff occupy a complete floor of a wing of the Barclay Hotel in New York City, Naiman said. "When we arrived, we found

the place guarded by police and security agents," he said. "We found the secretaries very, very wary of whom they admitted.'

The corridors were crowded with newsmen, Naiman said.

"Madame Nhu was very unaffected and not at all torn between two peoples as popularly portrayed," he said. "She merely wants to communicate."

## Just Be 'Nice'

I have my own private proof that all the recent agitation for enactment of open-occupancy legizlation at both the municipal and state levels has not and never will help to raise the living standards of Negroes. Positive steps to desegregate what are now all-white neighborhoods can best be made by individual Negro home-buyers by concentrating on being nice. A majority of white owners have indicated many, many times that they are willing to sell and live next door to intelligent and responsible Negroes who comply with cherished norms and standards.

in the resulting decline in property values wherever such integration occurs. The fear that a Negro will not "keep up the property is all that makes the average home owner reluctant to sell his house to a Negro--in deference to the neighbors. This basic contention on the part of home owners can be re-

A chief objection to integrating all-white neighborhoods lies

futed by the individual Negro even before it is proved to be either right or wrong. The Negro can do this by buying a 20 year supply of house paint and weed killer and then showing the receipt to the present owner.

If all prospective Negro home-buyers do this en masse, then white home owners will be aware of their good intentions, apprehensions will cease to exist, and the home improvement and gardening businesses will flourish.

Many Caucasians do not mind living next door to Negroes who are "nice." It should then be the goal of every Negro in the market for a house to strive for "niceness." Negroes should not only act and be "nice," but should also talk "nice," wear "nice" clothes, see "nice" movies, read "nice" books, and train their children to be "nice." After adding a sufficient amount of points to the NQ (Niceness Quotient), a Negro should have little trouble in buying the house of his choice.

Closely related to being "nice" is having the right income and the right profession. Unfortunately, there are just so many Ralph Bunches to go around; thus, most homeowners are not too demanding along these lines. A Negro should, however, be able to display a law degree and a break-down of his assets and liabilities to the cautious seller. There is a catch, however. The discreet Negro makes certain the potential seller and his potentialneighbors do not earn less than he.


And in confirming the extent of his intelligence, he should not present IQ test results that would cause charges of "uppitiness" to be hurled at him.

In addition to presenting the above-mentioned credentials, the reasonable and intelligent Negro home-buyer allays fears and doubts as to his acceptance of the cherished values of his neighbors. He does this by showing to the realtor, the seller, and to the potential neighbors, his and his wife's marriage certificate and the birth certificates of each of his children. Business is

Thus, it is here proven that open-occupancy bills are unessential to the Negro in his quest for better housing. The Negro can best serve the cause of integration by complying with the standards set by white homeowners.

Support for this view is given by an important public official. Last summer this famous governor strolled in a Freedom March through all-white suburbs in which reside many professionals with and without high IQ's Shortly after the march the governor told a crowd of Negroes and Caucasians who had come to see the Vice President of the United States, that members of minority groups should not force the "majority" to give them rights. He added that rights must be earned and deserved.

The governor was right. After all, the "majority" did get
