a household word in Hoosierland before the end of the season. Spartan fans realize that Saturday's contest with the Indiana Hoosiers may determine the fate of the squad for the rest of the season.

With a win, loss, and tie in three games, MSU has reached the point when it's time to go either up or down.

There are still six contests remaining on the schedule and five are Big Ten games. The other is a non-conference tilt with Notre Dame which will do nothing to alleviate the tensions of lateseason competition.

With the Big Ten race wide-open this year, each one of the re-

maining five conference outings promises to be crucial.

After the Indiana game, Northwestern, a pre-season Big Ten favorite will be the MSU opposition. MSU has lost the game following the Indiana contest for the past five years.

There will be no relief for the rest of the campaign with Wisconsin, Purdue, Notre Dame, and Illinois supplying the opposition.

The Spartans will cope with the situation with a team plagued by injuries that have been partially offset with some pleasant

The fate of the Spartans may well rest in the hands of injured performers Dewey Lincoln, Ron Rubick, Steve Mellinger, Don Japinga, and Matt Snorton.

It will also hinge on the ability of Steve Juday, Harry Ammon, Roger Lopes, and Dick Gordon, who have come out of nowhere to aid the MSU cause so far this season.

The road ahead is long. It looks difficult --- but interesting.




Indiana has gone to the air several times, but their opponents have subdued the Hoosiers with the same weapon.

The Nittany Lions have split in their first two outings, routing Pittsburgh 19-46 in their opener, but bowing to Cornell last Saturday 25-30.


Teams Iry For Brass Spittoon

The football series with Indiana dates back to 1922 when the Hooisers nipped MSU 14-6, although the game did not become an annual affair until 1950 with the introduction of the "Old Brass

The trophy was initiated by the junior and senior classes and the student council of State and was accepted by the Indiana University Student Senate. The spittoon came from one of Michigan's oldest trading posts and is believed to be over 100 years old.

Since the trophy's initiation, the Hooisers have been able to win only one game while the Spartans have reeled off 12 vic-

physical condition today than they were ten years ago. These are the feelings of Spartan defensive secondary coach Vince Carillot. "Players are much smarter today, too," he added. He said he thinks this is a result of more rigid college entrance requirements.

The New York born, former East Lansing High football coach, said he thinks that the basis of a good college grid team is recruiting. Carillot said that to-day, "even in the Ivy League," recruiters are fighting over good football talent. "It used to be that we only had to recruit against Michigan, but now we run into competition from Notre Dame, Yale, Illinois, Iowa, Northwestern and Alabama," Carillot commented.

When asked why there are so few undefeated teams remaining after only 4 weeks, he replied that it all goes back to recruiting. "The teams are better overall because of stronger recruit-ing." He added that the three

Football players are in better key states for getting football type of defense which makes a players are Michigan, Ohio and quarterback great. "About two years ago every team seemed to have a great fullback. The offense was 'four yards and a cloud of. dust.' The defense geared itself for the offense. The offense changed to a more wide open game and so the quarterbacks play a prominent role."

Coach Carillot is completely against the new substitution rule. He is strongly in favor of free substitution. "The game is for the players," he said. "The more players you can get to participate the better it is for the players. The substitution rule is not enjoyable to the players, coaches or to the spectators." He added that 87-92% of the college coaches are in favor of the free substitution rule.

Commenting on the future of MSU football, he said "if we can recruit the best players from Michigan (75% of the squad is from the state) we will continue to have good teams."

All avenues lead to a collision course today as Michigan State's underfeated soccer team wends its way to Ohio for a clash with unbeaten Akron University.

Spartan booters, with four victories under their belts can expect the toughest assignment to date. Akron, a five game winner with a home field advantage, will be out to avenge last year's 6-4 overtime defeat to State.

"They have pretty much the same team which we had to go into overtime to beat," MSU Coach Gene Kenney said. "We were down 4-1 going into the fourth quarter and tied it up in the last 30 minutes of play.

Akron is led by tow-time All-American Pete Millich at inside left. According to Kenney, "he's a very fine ballplayer who really sparks his team.'

The most impressive Zip win this season was s 6-1 upset over Pitt, quarter finalist in the NCAA last year.

"We're going down there to win," said Kenney. "But we'll have to play really good ball.

"We have a few injuries which might hurt us," the MSU head man cautioned. "Goalie Charlie Dedich, linesmen George Janes and Karl Thiele and defenseman George Rendon have been hindered by leg ailments.

"They've been unable to work



Spartan sailors placed second, six points behind winning Ohio State, at the Big Ten Championship Regatta, held at Bloom-


