Are Judiciary Hearings Unbiased?

Editor's Note: This is the second of a three-part series on student judiciary.

Does every student charged with violating a University regulation receive a fair and unbiased hearing from student judiciary? A case last term involving five students caught at an off-campus drinking party resulted in contradictory stories from Chief Justice Frazier D. Alexander and two of the students involved.

The case was unusual for the following reasons: 1. Most of the accused students were upperclassmen who admitted knowing several judiciary members. Several of the men were fraternity brothers of a justice. Another had been dating a justice. Another justice was a close friend of the co-ed who had dated one

of the defendants. The students had "connections" of some type with nearly every judiciary member.

2. Two hearings were held. Information about the verdict was "leaked" to students by several justices after the first hearing. out there was going to be another hearing. The following day, Alexander asked that a new hearing be called. The result was suspension for two students and probation for three hearing. A close friend of mine was allied with one of the justices others. Alexander told a State News reporter that one student had been given a lighter penalty the second time. Two students said they get us all off easy. received stiffer penalties than the information leak indicated.

3. At least two of the students admitted talking to the justices over 21 is wrong any more than we do.' before the second hearing was concluded.



SEC Sets A Fine Example



Desire For Power **Motivates France**

To revive the power and glory that once was France. That seems to have been the purpose for the largest move by French President Charles De Gaulle -- recognition of the Communist Chinese govern-

The specific objective of this power play was to improve France's position as a balance wheel between the two major powers, the United States and the Soviet Union

France's interest in the Far East has historical significance. She wants to resume the position of leadership she enjoyed in the Orient before her colonies there became independent. She especially wants

Whatever De Gaulle has gained from recognition of Red China, at least it has cost him nothing, neither a franc nor a man.

One Possible Error

However, there is one small monkeywrench which may foul up the machinery of the general's clever plan. It's spelled Nationalist

De Gaulle was gambling that Nationalist China would break off diplomatic relations with France when recognition of Red China was announced. Neither of the two Chinas will admit that there are two Chinas, and the idea is especially distasteful to the Nationalists.

Under considerable pressure from the United States, the Nationalist government has maintained its relations with France, Loud objections have been voiced in Taiwan to France's move, but the government is sitting tight.

So, De Gaulle has two Chinas on his hands. It will be interesting to see how he handles them.

Effects Of Recognition

How has French recognition effected the position of Communist

It is unlikely that other nations will follow the French example. Still, Communist China can't be kept in the shadows much longer.

This is a power which has to be reckoned with eventually. Red China's status in the developing nations has been improved with French recognition. Therefore, the Soviet Union will have to handle its Chinese ally in a different manner.

Red China finds herself closer to her goals in Asia. Recognition makes weakening the U.S. position in Viet Nam, Taiwan and Japan

Listing other factors that tend to create problems - but are not necessarily the fault of the United States - Wilson felt the difference in the minimum wage U.S. style, \$1.25 per hour, and Panamanian style, 40 cents, was a chief contributor.

Much of the anti-American sentiment might be traced to the fact that everyone can't work for the Panama Canal Co. And those that can't, and who therefore find that the United States isn't doing them any good, want the United States to get out.

UN Membership Closer

United Nations membership for Communist China may still be a long way off, but French recognition brings her closer to it. Thus far, the United States has taken no official action, other than mild protest on France's move. But, as Wesley R. Fishel, professor of political science, has said, "this situation presents a challenge to the United States to devise a more imaginative and forwardlooking Asian policy, especially if we want to maintain a leadership role in the East."



WASHINGTON (A)-Washington warily eyed the new South Viet information, and an assessment of the situation in South Viet Saigon junta by Maj. Gen. Nguyen Khanh were described as still incomplete and reflecting confusion.

Nonetheless, the consensus in U.S. quarters was that the coup will have an impairing effect on the war effort. Just how much damage has been done remains undertermined.

Some U.S. authorities feel that the greatest harm from the coup comes from the atmosphere of political instability it created. Strong, stable and popularly supported government is needed for successful prosecution of a tough guerrilla war, but one coup tends to breed another.

Some believe the new coup was less disruptive than that of last November, when the military deposed and killed President Ngo Dinh Diem and his brother. This time the overthrow was bloodless, quick and did not pull fighting forces off anti-guerrilla posts in the field.

Phillips denied that U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge was informed in advance of Khanh's coup, or that the United States expected it. He said there are always rumors of coups in Saigon, but advance information on this one was not given to the United

Faith On Campus -----

Peace Through **Jesus Christ**

We are living in a day when men and women across this nation and throughout the world are searching for peace. Many are looking to wealth, probably still more are looking to a church or religious cult, and perhaps some think they will find peace and security by attaining a college degree which will allow them a good position in the world. Man may search until his knowledge and energy are exhausted but his search will be in vain until he realizes exactly what the need of his heart is. In order to discover this need we

must look to the Bible. Before going further I wish to explain that I believe the Bible does not merely contain the Word of God but that it is the Word of God. I believe that it was verbally inspired by Him in its entirety. The Bible says, "Wherefore as by one man sin entered into the

world and death by sin, and so death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned". (Romans 5:12). Men are lacking peace in their hearts because they are at enmity with God. Because of his sinful nature, man is separated from God, and until he becomes reconciled to God through Jesus Christ, he will not know real peace. So then the real problem is a spiritual one and cannot be solved

by material means. God has provided redemption for the sin of the world. Although the weather bureau claims the groundhog has been right only 28% of the time during the last 60 years, faithful members of groundhog clubs assert the woodchuck has been at least more accurate than the weather bureau.



NY Starts Birth Control Action

Aids Welfare Recipients

NEW YORK A-There is a slowly, but steadily developing trend in t.e United States to provide birth control services to welfare recipients at public expense.

Only last week, New York became the 10th state to adopt such a program. The District of Columbia soon will follow suit. Many city and county governments offer similar service.

The trend, however, has not developed without controversy. The argument frequently advanced for

state-paid birth control information and devices for the needy is this:

A woman who gives birth while receiving welface assistance not only adds one more person to the relief rolls, but also contributes to conditions slowing her family's return to self-sufficiency.
