Cambodians Ransack

Officials Discuss Boost To Fall Bus Service Crew Safe U.S., British Embassies

University representatives met with Lansing Suburban Lines officals Wednesday to discuss how campus bus service might be improved next fall quarter.

President John A. Hannah's announcement Friday that student driving on campus will be banned next fall has created a need for expanded service. Students will not be allowed to drive on campus between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m. on class days.

Perimeter lots will be built south of the Cheaspeake and Ohio tracks. An express bus service from the lots to the center of campus has been proposed. New routes to Hagadorn Road and the new east campus dormitory complexes are also in the discussion

"The meeting between MSU and Lansing Suburban Lines was for fact finding only," said Theodore B. Simon, superintendent of physical plant. "Nothing official was decided as to proposed routes or the number of additional buses required."

Lansing Suburban Lines has indicated it would have to buy additional buses if it is to expand MSU service. One high MSU official speculated that the University might have to help the line buy the additional buses through a subsidy.

Secretary Jack Breslin indicated that MSU is also exploring the possibility of operating its own bus service.

Negotiating with the bus company are Theordore B. Simon and Lyle L. Bornor, both of physical plant, and Emery G. Foster, director of dormitories and food services. John Cole, Lansing Suburban Lines manager, is representing the company.

They are scheduled to meet again within the next several weeks. At that time the line will present a proposal on how it will expand MSU service.

Students Blamed For Riot

Chief Promises Compensation

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia P --Thousands of Cambodians sacked the U.S. and British embassies and their information offices Wednesday in a three-hour riot. Blaming volatile students, the neutralist government promised to pay for the damage.

Breaking through police lines, the Cambodian demonstrators hauled down and burned the flag over the U.S. embassy and scattered embassy papers in the streets.

British embassy cars were burned and some U.S. embassy cars were overturned, but al personel of both embassies escaped unhurt. Rioters also wrecked the building of the British council, a private group promoting cultural interests abroad.

He said that cultural pluralism, in which minority groups attempt erences, is nearly non-existent in the United States.

"The public schools, mass communications media and social agencies all pressure minority groups to conform to the cultural patterns of the dominant majority in America.

"These patterns include use of the English language, thriftiness, punctuality, cleanliness and friendliness.

Samora said it is a fact of American life that cultural assimilation does not always guarantee social assimilation. He pointed out that while the Negro may accept white cultural patterns, it does not mean that he is accepted as an equal socially.

The Negro is in a different position from some other minority groups, he said, because strong feelings over the racial issue can overshadow cultural similari-



Good News From NDEA

Good news for students in school "on a shoestring" came this week in the form of an increase in National Defense Education Act loan funds. A bill was passed by Congress raising the loan ceiling for individual colannually

Henry J. Dykema, director of financial aids, said MSU probably will be approved for the full maximum assistance because of its large enrollment. He said this increase "would probably more than double the number of people we can assist."

Depending on the size of individual loans given. Dykema said, the number of recipients will 500 now to between 1,000 and 1.500 next year.

NDEA loans are considered among the best sources of financial aid for students looking for assistance. Interest rates are is only added on after the student has been out of college a year.

Loan recipients who go into teaching have the amount they must return reduced by 10 per cent a year up to five years, as long as they are working as

Dykema said, "I don't know of leges from \$250,000 to \$800,000 any loans that are any better. particularly for someone who is going into teaching."

The increase in the number of NDEA loans available is a reflection of a sensible and practical attitude toward education. The federal government has taken it upon itself to subsidize the education of a large number of students as one of the best means of improving the nation's standing.

The name of the loan system, probably be raised from about part of a larger program of aid to colleges and research projects, indicates its intent. Financial aid to students and colleges is indeed one of the best means of supporting "national defense."

Reaffirms Press

Monday's Supreme Court decision on a libel case against the New York Times reaffirmed the right of citizens and the press to criticize the public actions of governmental officials.

It guarantees the rights of citizens to criticize their officials in print through "editorial advertisements" and protects the newspapers which provide an outlet for public opinion.

In a unanimous decision, the court ruled that an official cannot collect libel damages for critical misstatements about his official conduct unless he can prove "actual malice."

"Actual malice" exists only when false statements are made with the knowledge that they are false or when they are made "with reckless disregard" of their validity.

In this particular case, the decision nullified a \$500,000 libel judgment awarded to a Montgomery, Ala., police commissioner in a suit against the Times and four Negro clergymen. An Alabama county circuit court had awarded the damages for misstatements that appeared in an advertisement in the Times in 1960, criticizing the handling of racial demonstrations in Montgomery.

The police commissioner won the award with the contention that several paragraphs in the advertisement reflected upon him, although it did not criticize anyone by name.

Justice William O. Brennan, Jr., who wrote the court's opinion, pointed out that a federal ruling to protect the Constitution's guarantee of freedom of the press was necessary in view of the Alabama decision.

The court's decision will have little effect in most states, which already protect the right to criti- ciples, concepts and methods of cize public officials.

Island Important To U.S. Defense

On Shuri Hill, Okinawa, known as the site of the deciding battle for Okinawa in World War II, stood the former castle of the kings of the Ryukyu Islands.

The history of the island goes back perhaps to before the coming of Christ. Before 1700, when the island was taken over by China, it had gained no prominence in the Far East. Little progress was made under the Chinese and about 1,100 years ago Japan took the island from the Chinese. The island was first brought to America's attention by Admiral Perry on his trip around the world.

Okinawa is the largest island in the Ryukyu chain of islands. Altogether there are 54 islands, 46 of which are inhabited. The Ryukyuan population of all the islands is about 900,000.

The island itself is 67 miles long and 2 and one-half miles wide at the narrowest part. The 900,000 people on the island are almost equally divided between the local population and the armed forces. The island is the most important military installation in the Far

The economy used to be basically agricultural, but industry is beginning to take a very important part. The island is sub-tropical and usually very warm and humid from April to late October. Winter is generally very comfortable. Crops can be grown the year around, and the average farmer will have four crops yearly.

Sugar cane and rice are basic crops but sweet potatoes, pineapples, oranges and vegetables are also widely grown.

Army Important To Economy

The Army is very important to the economy. There is an agreement to return the islands to Japan, but it is doubtful that this will happen in the forseeable future. The strategic position of the islands is too important.

Much progress has been made in the past 16 years. After the war only four buildings were standing in Naha, the capital city and the island's largest port. Naha now has a population of over 300,000 and is a growing, thriving city. In spite of the rough terrain, roads have been built; farms are everywhere.

Most of the land on the island is under basic interim leases and leases must be renewed every ten years. The Army utilizes about 17,000 acres, about II per cent of all usable land. Much land cannot be profitably farmed. It is said that a farmer with seven eighths of an acre of land, all the work being done by the family, can raise a family of five, have all go to high school and one to college. This is predicated on an average of four crops a year.

The southern islands of Yaeyama and Miyako are the largest next to Okinawa in the Ryukus. They are about 200 miles south and west. The temperature is warmer and crops about the same. They are coming to be popular resort areas.

Off the central coast of Okinawa is the island of legima, where the famous war correspondent Ernie Pyle was killed and is buried. His monument has become almost a shrine, with numerous visitors.

The beaches on the island are quite popular. Kuma, a resort on the west side of the island, is a rest haven for the military and has

World War II Battle Toll High

The battle for Okinawa was one of the most deadly of the entire war. The southern one-third of the island was heavily defended by the Japanese. The northern part, due to its difficult terrain, was left undefended. Shuri Hill, the seat of the university, was the pivotal point in the battle--the hill, underlaid with caves was used as a fortification by the Japanese.

The battle lasted about three weeks. In this time the Japanese suffered casualties of about 110,000 killed and wounded; 8,000 Americans were killed and 12,000 wounded. At Fort Buckner there is a where the complete story of the battle is shown three times daily for visitors.

The island has dual control to a degree. It is under USCAR--United States Civil Administration of the Ryuku Islands and GRI--Government of Ryuku Islands. The GRI has 29 legislators and a chief executive and is patterned to a degree after legislatures in the U.S.A.

There seems to be little unrest on the island. There is an unemployment rate of less than one-half per cent. The average working day is ten hours and most laborers work seven days a week.

The school system is quite adequate. English is taught beginning
