Double Present Capacity

3rd Plant To Start In Fall

MSU's new \$9 million power plant, under construction since the summer of 1964, will begin operations in the latter part of October. Located south of the stadium between he Grand Trunk and Cheasapeake and Ohio Railroad tracks, the new plant is the third to be built on the MSU campus.

The first plant on North campus is now obsolete and will be removed following completion of the new building. The second plant, built in 1946 and known as the South Campus plant, is now the Shaw Lane plant and will continue operations.

The new plant will be working at full capacity of 25 thousand kilowatts per hour, doubling the present capacity of the two plants.

MSU normally uses about one-tenth the amount of power used in the City of Lansing.

The old North and Shaw Lane plants will continue working during the initial stages of the new plant's operation to make sure it is working correctly. The North plant will eventually be phased out of operations during the winter

Because all three plants will be in operation at the same time, there will be a need

Theodore Simon, director of the Physical

Plant, said that by having all three plants in operation, there might be a need to hire extra men and to relocate others. The new plant will operate on the steam cycle

and will have larger boilers, a pulverized coal Lansing. fire and larger electrical generators. Joseph Kavanaugh, plant engineer, explained

the production of power in the new plant: -- Coal is delivered by rail, conveyed into the plant, and stored in bunkers. -- Coal is taken to the pulverizers (coal-

smashers) and ground from pieces of one and one-half inches to powder. -- The pulverizers blow the coal into the furnace and it burns in suspension somewhat

like a gas flame. -- The burning coal heats the inside of the

boiler. -- Tubes lining the inside of the boiler are filled with water and this is turned into steam. The steam comes out of the boiler at 900 pounds per square inch at 835 degrees farenheit, thus creating pressure.

--Steam cannot be put directly into the heating system, so is put into turbines and spins the turbine blades.

--When the pressure reaches 100 pounds per square inch in the turbine, the steam is extracted and is sent out to heat the individual

-- As the steam passes through the turbine, electricity is created, therefore becoming a byproduct of the steam cycle.

Temporary Steering Group Set

The Associated Students of MSU has unanimously approved a nine-man Human Relations

Petitioning opens today for a temporary four-man steering committee to represent student government and make tentative plans for the Commission's Human Relations Week in the fall. Petitions are available in 101 Student Services until tomor-

Carl Friberg, president of Inter-Cooperative Council, was appointed chairman of the Commission and of the steering com-

The Student Board Chairman will select seven of the Commission's members from open petitioning in the fall, with the approval of the Board. One Board member and a faculty adviser selected by the Office of the Vice-President ich & warming. fairs will also be on the Com-

mission but will have no vote. Friberg hopes for members representing a cross-section of nationalities and interests.

"Yet we don't want to split the Commission up into so many parts that it can't function," he said. "We need level-headed people who are willing to work through compromise."

He cited four objectives of the new Commission:

-- Educational in the line of human relations. First on the agenda Is Human Relations Week, scheduled for the beginning of fall term. -- A proper channel of grie-

vance for students with complaints in the human relations area. "We will work with Pat Smith's off-campus housing office as much as he wants," Friberg said.

-- Act as a channel of communication between East Lansing and the University. The Commission will meet with the East Lansing Human Relations Commission next week and plans to work closely with it in the future.

-- To coordinate human relation activities between the University and East Lansing. Friberg said he would like

to see the MSU Commission serve a shot-in-the-arm function for the University as well as East

Though the Commission will be a recognized student voice in the area of human relations, "there will be no demonstrating, or anything like that," Friberg said.

"If someone brings in a case, the Commission will take it to the proper authorities," he explained. "For example, if there is a complaint of discrimination in a fraternity, the Commission will refer the case to Inter-Fraternity Council for mediation and conciliation.

"If IFC does nothing, the Student Board can consider the case. but we are not clear yet about the action it can take. If conciliation is unsuccessful, we can say 'shape up or ship out' and recommend that the University take

it off approved housing." The Student Board has no authority over unapproved housing. The Faculty Committee On Student Affairs is now considering

The Missing Complainant

The case of William M. Smith, a former student who filed a complaint of housing discrimination with the Michigan Civil Rights Commission over a year ago, graphically illustrates the need for local open occupancy ordinances.

The complaint was filed against an East Lansing realtor in April, 1964. Attempts at conciliation failed, and a hearing was set for June 21, 1965--15 months after the filing of the

However, Smith has left MSU. The hearing has been adjourned until Smith can be found or forced by court order to appear at a new hearing.

If East Lansing had a local ordinance prohibiting racial discrimination in rentals or sales by a realtor, the case might have been settled while Smith was still here.

The Michigan Civil Rights Commission does not have the staff to speedily handle complaints of housing discrimination from throughout the state. It must be remembered that the Commission is charged with responsibility for investigating every type of racial and religious discrimination.

MSU's Viet Mission Criticized In Book

In 1955, Michigan State undertook a technical advisory mission to the government of South Viet Nam which cost the U.S. government more than \$25 million over a seven-year period.

The MSU assistance was concentrated in the areas of police and public administration. Robert Scigliano and Guy H. Fox, professors of political science, have analyzed the effects of the MSU mission in a new book "Technical Assistance in Viet Nam: The Michigan State University Experience."

Fox and Scigliano state that "no other university has sent so many varied and extensive tasks."

They emphasize that MSU is the only university in the country which "substituted its resources for entire segments of the American economic aid mission abroad.

The authors cite five main weaknesses in the MSU advisory mis-

-- The intimate relationship which the University group in Saigon enjoyed with the Vietnamese leadership was a source of considerable strain between MSU and both American and Vietnamese offi-

--MSU failed to enunciate clear goals in its technical aid, with the result that the American embassy and economic aid mission were able to impose their goals and priorities on the University.

-- The University strayed too far from an educational role, getting itself involved in such unsuitable activities as ordering weapons and equipment for the Vietnamese police and security services and teaching them how to use the weapons.

-- Most of the personnel the University sent to Viet Nam did not come from the MSU campus and were not, in fact, academic personnel at all.

-- The specific campus impact of the Vietnam project was small. Few of the academic personnel who went to Viet Nam returned to the MSU faculty. Probably no new courses were added as a consequence of the project, few students have undertaken graduate study in this area, and the library collection on Vietnam hardly reflects the lengthy involvement of the University in the affairs of that





William Bildner, Kalamazoo, and Terry Weston, Deckerville, spent two days a week for six weeks in Correction Department facilities at Jackson as a MSU social work department field as-

Bildner worked in the Reception-Diagnostic Center (RDC) and Weston was assigned to Southern Michigan Prison (SMP) Treatment Department.

Although physically a part of the prison at Jackson, the RDC is a separate institution. Here, all men receiving felony sentences in Michigan are received for testing and case evaluations.

Bildner worked closely with procedures.

Each new RDC arrival is subjected to a battery of intelligence and psychological tests; he receives a thorough physical examination and he is interviewed extensively by psychologists, vocational counselors and social

The results of their findings are evaluated and a recommendation is made as to the best Corrections Department facility for each man.

"I was pleased to note that it was not a cut- and-dried proposition. The inmate had an opportunity to discuss staff suggestions and if he didn't agree with them staff members discussed their opinions pro and con," Bildner said.

Bildner had the opportunity to observe all phases of the RDC operation. He sat in on counselor's and psychologist's interviews, indoctrination and group therapy sessions and disciplinary court -- where inmates are "tried" for RDC rule infrac-





Get \$600 Undergrad Science Research

To acquaint promising undergraduates with research technique, the biochemistry, psychology, geology, chemistry and botany departments are conducting Undergraduate Research Programs this summer.

These programs, sponsored by the National Science Foundation, provide on-the-job training. Participants work directly with faculty members as apprentices full-time for ten weeks. For the summer's work, each receives

While working on the established research of a staff member, the participant develops research skills most science stuorallation. Besides technique in equipment, he begins to experience in setting up equipment, analyzing data, preparing results for publication and perhaps designing experi-

These departments continue the programs on a part-time basis during the academic year. The National Science Foundation provides the students' salaries, and funds for equipment needed in research. The program is planned and co-ordinated

by the department itself. Erwin Benne, director of the biochemistry program, plans to supplement the student's experience in the lab with lectures in biochemistry and a field trip to Upjohn Co., manufacturers of pharmaceuticles.

The group of 14 students will become acquainted with several research projects being conducted in the department.

Participants in the psychology program, directed by A.M. Barch, will help prepare the results of their summer's work for publication. They will be listed as co-author with the professor who instituted the research.

John Beaman will work with three students in botany. Each will conduct individual research on a particular group of the Aster family. When the research is completed, each will prepare his results for publication.

The participants in William Hinze's geology institute will be doing a great deal of traveling. One will be working in California, and another here at MSU. If funds permit, a third will be studying in Alaska.

Participants in the chemistry program directed by William Reusch already have their work cut out for them. Before acceptance into the program, each outlined his intended research program, and found a professor to work with him.

The eight most promising were chosen by a faculty committee. The students may work either on individual research, or as assistants in the research of a faculty member.

"It's a cultural exchange," he said. "We represent American society in showing what kind of people Americans really are. At the same time we get an impression of foreign peoples and their cultures."



Have you ever wondered what happens to all those punched cards ment, which is rented for about \$20,000 a month. you fill out during registration every term?

Francis B. Martin, director of Data Processing, says that the cards no longer of use are resold for scrap.

"Last year," he said, "we used 25 million punched cards," "Some of the cards are microfilmed," says Martin, "and others are kept for department records. But because the cards are made of high quality paper, we are able to sell them for scrap."

There are 42 different kinds of cards used for registration. They are fed through the various sorters and calculators in the data processing center in the basement of Wells Hall.

The Data Processing Department was established in 1937. It was then called the Tabulating Department and its first function

was to handle the MSU payroll. The first punched card registration was held in the spring of

"Since then," says Martin, "growth has been the result of normal student and faculty growth. We have gone through refinement and expansion of existing procedures and programs, and have introduced new areas and applications."

In 1938 several test scoring machines were installed, Several

Department.

The MSU Computer Laboratory was established in the spring of 1956 as an educational and research center in the areas of numerical analysis, programming, computer application and electronic circuitry.

The first production was run of MISTIC (Michigan State Integral Computer) in 1956. Outside of research in the various programming, which accounts for 80 per cent of the computer usage, projects have ranged from statistical and numerical analysis to design

potential riot." "Demonstrators have an obligation to abide by the law and to inform the police department that they want to demonstrate," Mrs. Beasley added.

She also remarked, however, that "cur involvement with police departments has been whether or not the police officers themselves respect the law and stay within the regulations of their own department."

Only 34 out of 100 citizen complaints against the Detroit Police Department have been dismissed, cited Hanna. Twelve were resolved through conciliation and the rest are now court

cases. Radelet said he was opposed to the citizen review board procedure that is in demand in communities where there is police

Relaig questioner Louis 129 of such an independent agency under the Michigan constitution. "The issue of the plenary power given to the civil rights commission hasn't even been resolved. I question any review board power except to make recommendations regarding issues with racial

overtones." Radelet offered five checkpoints for police departments in the area of complaint procedures: -- Does adequate machinery exist for processing citizen complaints against police? "Adequate implies justice, impartiality, fairness--everything we can do to avoid grounds for charges of 'white-wash,' " he said.

-- All complaints should be appropriately investigated. "No complaint should be regarded as a "crackpot complaint" and ignored," he said.

--Is there "appropriate" feed-back? "I don't mean giving the newspapers complete access to the case, but the citizen is entitled to some report as to the results of the investigation," he

--"In a brick-by-brick building process, create a reputation of integrity in the community so that all segments come to trust the department," he concluded.
