

Peking Ultimatum Makes Rift Public

Red China bluntly has told the Soviet leadership that Peking intends to form a rival and hostile world Communist movement. It says all hopes for unity have been smashed on the rock of Viet Nam and final division is "inevitable." Pravda, the Soviet Communist party organ, has responded with deep alarm.

Peking made the final break seem imminent by delivering an ultimatum: The Krem-

lin must reverse major domestic and for-eign policies of the British eign policies of the past decade.

Expecting no such reversal, Peking says: "The staunch Marxist-Leninists are left with no alternative but to break with the revisionist leading groups, and the founding and growth of genuinely Marxist-Leninist parties and organizations becomes inevitable.

The statement shows up in the text of a slashing 30,000 word attack on the Kremlin carried both by People's Daily and Red Flag, the two major Chinese Communists journals. Clearly it spells readiness for the final

Political Parties Appeal To MSU For Candidates

IT'S THAT TIME again when the two political parties are looking for candidates to run for public office in the up coming 1966 election, nearly a year from now. This year the MSU campus seems to be a haven for potential candidates.

First, Leroy Augenstein, chairman of the Bio-physics Department, announced that he would seek the Republication nomination for the U.S. Senate if he found enough money and support. Then just recently, President John A. Hannah emphatically denied that he had any intentions of seeking the Republican nomination for that same Senate seat.

HANNAH HAS BEEN asked to run for public office several times in the last few years, but each time has declined to leave MSU for the uncertainty of the political arena. Hannah has served as chairman of the U.S. Civil Rights Commission since its adoption in 1957 and also held a governmental post during the early years of the Eisenhower administration.

Though it doesn't appear that Hannah can be persuaded to run for public office now, it is good to see the political parties interested in obtaining prominent citizens to seek political offices.

Today when national and state prob-

ever, it is necessary to have experienced, capable people in positions of authority and decision. Augenstein has plausibly suggested that it is time to have a scientist in the U.S. Senate, in order to attempt to deal more realistically with the ever increasing scientific perplexities that face the nation and the world today.

BUT AT THE same time, it is difficulty to lure capable administrators and other leading figures from private life and the lucrative benefits it offers. It is indeed a difficult decision to leave private for political life, where the rigors are many and the tangible benefits are often few.

Besides Hannah and Augenstein, there are probably other potential candidates within the University community. Perhaps some of the political scientists, who so carefully watch the political activity of the nation and the world would be prime examples for the parties to appeal to.

The way things are shaping up for Michigan's Senate seat next year, things should be exciting. The nation would do well to seek out the best possible candidates for public office, in terms of ability and potential, not

In the last 10 days the State News has been subjected to considerable criticism on behalf of certain students and faculty members. As is the case with most controversial and emotional issues much of what has circulated around campus was distorted or at best,

At this time, perhaps it would be beneficial to attempt to objectively clarify what the issues were and explain what actually happened from this vantage point.

The case in question involved when, not if, the material relating to the Paul Schiff case would be published. It was a matter of judgment and timing.

After some pondering, it was the opinion of the editor-inchief that the paper should wait until the Faculty Committee on Student Affairs had come to a final decision before publishing the extensive charges and defense of the University and Paul Schiff. In this way, it was hoped that the Faculty Committee could make as objective a decision as possible, without any outside influence.

The key issue in this matter was that the material was published in full as soon as the Faculty Committee decided. But the State News Editorial Board, composed of the managing

editor, campus editor, sports editor and editorial editor, thought it could overrule the editor-in-chief, if it had a clear majority.

As in all newspapers there must be someone who must make the final decision and bear the final responsibility. This is also the structure in government, be it local, state or national.

The editorial board is to the editor, what the cabinet is to the President. For he appoints its members, and also must work with them and rely upon their abilities. But always he must make the final decision and, if he deems it necessary, must overrule his editorial board in exceptional cases.

He must bear final responsibility for what the paper prints or does not print, At MSU, the Student Board of Publications provides the formal check upon the editor, and ultimately he must answer to

Regarding the issue of censorship by the University, every entity related to MSU is under the ultimate jurisdiction of the Board of Trustees, this paper included.

Of course, this authority is delegated, and, in the case of the State News, a general manager supervises the whole operation of the paper, advertising, publication etc. But the fact is, he does not function as a censor, Almost always, he never even sees what goes into the paper until after it is printed.


He does provide help, when help is asked. And he does give advice, when advice is asked. And this is as it should be. For we are still students, still learning the newspaper business. The advice of a professional regarding libel laws, good taste and custom can be invaluable in difficult situations.


But in the case in mention, the editor-in-chief made a difficult decision and stuck by it. He was not censored, nor did he do anything that any editor doesn't have a perfect right to do.

In the future, as in the past, the paper will function, not to please the University, or any segment of the student population, but will attempt to present and interpret the news in the fairest, most equitable way possible.

Gemini VII Launch Looks 'A-OK'

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)--The space agency said today that an electrical problem with a spacecraft power unit was not expected to delay Saturday's Gemini 7 launching.

A spokesman made the statement after engineers wrestled through the night with the trouble. First they installed a new power unit in the spacecraft, discovered it probably would cause the same difficulty, yanked it out and replaced it with the original unit.

Astronauts Frank Berman and James A. Lovell Jr., are to ride Gemini 7 into space for a 14-day endurance mission. Nine days later, Gemini 6 astronauts Walter M. Schirra Jr. and Thomas P. Stafferd are to take off in an attempt to rendezvous within a few feet of Gemini 7.

Refugee Airlift Begins This Week

WASHINGTON (UPI) -- The U.S. airlift of refugees from Cuba is due to begin this week, but it signals no change in American policy toward Fidel Castro's Communist regime.

The airlift, scheduled to go into operation Wednesday, is the first major negotiated agreement between the United States and Cuba since relations were broken off in 1961.

Kasavubu Accepts His Overthrow

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo (UPI)-- Joseph Kasavubu has told the new military regime in the Congo that he accepts his overthrow as president, it was announced today.

The official Congolese press agency published Kasavubu's reply to Gen. Joseph Mobutu after the army chief of staff seized power Thursday and proclaimed himself president for five years.



Government sources Monday predicted the budget trend privately. They said the military buildup in Viet Nam on top of second-year costs of major "Great Society" programs will keep federal spending headed up.

And the federal deficit, which is estimated at \$7 billion or \$8 billion this year, should go down in fiscal 1967 despite the upward pusht of costs in that government year, which starts July 1.

A diminished deficit depends on continued healthy gains in tax collections, fed by the 57-monthold business boom.

This year's receipts now are estimated officially at \$96.5 billion, up \$2 billion from the January estimate. Unofficially, some experts judge that revenues actually will top \$97 billion this year and--if economic growth continues -- will substantially ex-

The disclosure that spending already is passing the \$100-billion mark came Saturday from a White House spokesman in Austin, Tex. The January estimate was \$99.7 billion.

The spokesman gave no word, however, on the outlook for the fiscal 1967 budget. Even such clues as can usually be found in the fall budget review are lacking; the administration is omitting the annual review.

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

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
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Cagers Follow A Tough Act

Coach Duffy Daugherty's team won 10 straight games, earned to 10th. the Big Ten title outright for the first time and received a Rose Bowl bid.



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
