

Pastor Gerhard Struck and his wife, Charlotte, are in the process of moving from their Elkton residence to a new house in Frankenmuth.

Struck, who will celebrate his 75th birthday on July 7, is retiring from the active ministry. He was ordained on Nov. 18, 1934 in Manitowoc, Wisconsin and served in Colorado, Dowagiac, Mich. and Bay City, before moving to the Thumb. He has been pastor of the Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church in Elkton for the last 15½ years.

"I've never been any place in the ministry as long as I've been in Elkton," notes Struck. He says he has enjoyed his years in Elkton and adds, "They've been a really nice group."

Struck says he and his wife are looking forward to some time off, as they haven't taken a vacation in four years. He notes that he still will do some preaching to replace vacationing pastors, or filling in as a vacancy pastor for congregations changing ministers.

The new Frankenmuth location will be closer to their two children and four grandchildren. Their son David lives in Grand Blanc, and their daughter and her family live in Frankenmuth.

The new pastor at Trinity will be Paul D. Schleis, a recent graduate of Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary. He and his wife, Denise, plan to arrive July 14 and his installation is scheduled for July 24.

Approximately 8,000 persons attended the opening Communion service and over 5,600 were in attendance at the daily sessions of the biennial Lutheran Women's Missionary League convention in Detroit on June 20 to 23.

The Rev. Ralph Bohman, president of the Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod was the speaker at the opening service. Administering communion to the worshippers were 120 Michigan pastors. Special music was provided by a 300 voice choir composed of women from all over the United States and Canada.

A mission goal of \$720,000 was set for the next biennium. Recipients will be Wartburg Lutheran Home for the Aging, Brooklyn, N.Y.; Shione, Japan; library books for colleges in Hong Kong and Selma, Alabama; support for two overseas missionaries; Portals of Prayer Telephone Ministry; Makah Lutheran Church (Indian) Neah Bay, Washington; New Mission, Anchorage, Alaska; Ministry to International Students in U.S. and Canada; Urban Teacher Counseling Training in New York and New Jersey; Korean Church site; Hispanic Ministry; Young Adult Ministry and Lutheran Outreach, Ft. Wayne, Ind.

One of the featured speakers was Kathryn Koob one of the former hostages in Iran. Other speakers were Dr. Edward Westcott, executive secretary for the LCMS Board for Missions; the Rev. Terrance Borchard from Pupua, New Guinea and the Rev. Daniel Mattson of Nigeria.



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
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Camping in America is fast becoming little more than the relocation of all our modern conveniences from our home to the chosen site of our vacation. A trip to any campground this summer will find miniature cities made up of a vast array of motor homes, fifth wheels and travel trailers that are equipped with refrigerators, gas ranges, hot water heaters, electric lights, bathrooms (with showers), microwaves, TVs, stereos and countless other comforts designed to insulate the camper from the very things that he goes on vacation to experience.

I must be a wierdo, but when I chose to spend time in the out of doors, I like to leave as much of the plastic world as possible behind, and become more attuned with the natural environment. I'm not professing that we run around the woods naked, eating roots and berries, and sleeping in caves, but I am saying that it is hard to appreciate nature when you are munching a frozen TV dinner fresh from the microwave while "Three's Company" is drowning out the sound of raindrops falling on your aluminum roof.

If you would like to experience the natural out of doors at its finest, and do it inexpensively, think about backpacking. It is certainly nothing new, for if we return in history, the earliest people that roamed America were essentially backpackers. The Indians first, and the frontiersmen who followed, were at home, and very comfortable, with a few belongings rolled in some sort of convenient package and hoisted to their shoulders.

A popular misconception is that backpacking is only for the strong and hardy. Nothing could be further from the truth. Walking, the main form of transportation when backpacking, is something that is done by everybody, everyday. It takes no special training or lessons to walk, and doctors are beginning to realize that it is every bit as healthful as jogging, and you don't experience as many injuries.

So, where do you begin? First, remember, you can backpack anywhere that you like. Throughout our beautiful state, you can find plenty of unspoiled and practically uninhabited land. With your pack, you can fish, hike, photograph, or anything else you like, for almost as long as you want, and have a glorious and totally different adventure you will never forget.

Some of the popular places are Isle Royal in the northwestern part of Lake Superior. The island, 45 miles long, and about 10 miles wide, is a mecca for the hiking fraternity. Reachable by boat or seaplane, it has hundreds of miles of trails for all types of backpackers, novice to advance.

The Porcupine Mountain State Park near Ontonagon in the western part of the UP, is another great area for the hiker. If the UP is too far for you to travel, you can find good wilderness trails in the Pigeon River State Forest near Vanderbilt. Many other areas, too numerous to mention exist for the adventuresome backpacker, and your choice is only limited by your imagination.

How do you get started? Your first piece of equipment should be a pack. There are really only two satisfactory types. One, is the alpine type, which is a softpack that sometimes has an internal support frame of

aluminum or plastic. Smaller, this type hugs the back and makes steep climbing easier. Their downfall is their size that limits how much you can carry. The second type is the framed backpack. This model has an external frame of aluminum or magnesium tubing that is covered with nylon webbing to keep it away from your back. Attached to the frame is a carrying bag that is made up of a large pouch plus numerous small pockets that allow you to carry large heavy loads. Anyone who is planning on hiking some distance, or will stay away from civilization for more than a couple of days, would do well to have such a pack. You can pay anywhere from \$15 to \$150, but your best bet might be to rent one or borrow one from a friend until you are sure you will like this type of camping.

Once you have obtained a pack, the rest of your equipment is pretty much the same as used in any other camping situation. Although, serious backpackers are very conscious of weight, on a short trip you can

use the sleeping bag you already own, supplemented with a sleeping pad or air mattress. If you must go out and purchase one, look for down or Hollowfill as an insulating material. My personal choice is goose down, and a bag that I bought for +30, 15 years ago weighs just 16 ounces and has kept me warm and dry in a variety of extreme conditions.

If you are a squeamish individual, you may want to take a tent along to sleep in. They are good to keep out rain, insects and numerous creepy, crawly things that crawl around at night. If it is not raining, it's exciting to sleep out under the stars, and should some moisture fall, you can always carry a lightweight poncho that can be supported between a couple of trees to provide the necessary protection needed.

Many backpacking areas are beginning to frown on open fires. The constant quest for wood, plus the danger and unsightly remains of a campfire have a tendency to damage our fragile wilderness. Most dedicated backpackers carry their own fire in the form of backpacking stoves. Lightweight and inexpensive, these hot burning little dandies make out-door cooking a delight. Most boil a quart of water in five minutes and will burn hours on a pint of white gas. The best, and also the cheapest is the Peak 1 by Coleman. Even if you don't backpack, this is a handy little item to have in any camping situation.

Easily prepared an inexpensive food can be readily found in your local supermarket. No need to buy freeze-dried food or other expensive substitutes. Just use your imagination and remember that you carry everything that you eat.

Normal camping clothes will do just fine. Take a sweater along for the chilly evenings, and don't forget some sort of rain gear. As far as footwear goes, stay away from the heavy expensive hiking boots. They will be a bugger to carry and their lug soles damage the trails. Instead, put on a pair of sneakers or tennis shoes used for other outdoor sports.

It is my contention that in order for man to increase his awareness of the out of doors, he must have contact with it. What better way than putting your freedom on your back.





Some fish were taken in the Harbor Beach area. Walleyes keep on being elusive. Dedicated fishermen have had moderate success this spring, but the warm weather of the last couple of weeks, has made it difficult to find fish. Best bets seem to be off Lone Tree Island in the Sebawaing area, and near Duck Island.

This weekend, the DNR emptied the walleye rearing ponds located at Fish Point. Thousands of the small fingerlings were released in the Bay. Experts hope that the constant planting, coupled with the access of both food and cover, will raise the walleye population in Saginaw Bay to a point that will rival the Lake Erie Fishery.

Bass fishing has been extra good during the last week. The marsh area that runs between Sebawaing and Bay Port is literally loaded with these scrappy fighters.

Perch have been active in the Charity Islands region. Boats brought back good catches throughout the weekend. The fish were run-

ning in the 7" to 9" category and will make some lucky fishermen an excellent meal. Those fishermen who have discovered the fun in catching catfish with hook and line have been experiencing great fishing during the spring and early summer. Big 'cats' roam the shallows at night, and are just waiting to

tear into a gob of nightcrawlers lying on the bottom.

First reports are out on the 1983 duck season. While not finalized, it looks like the opener will be on the first of October. The point system will be in effect again this year, with the Black Duck moving up to the 100 point category.




