





STATEWIDE TROUT AND SALMON REGULATIONS

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on December 4, 1981, under the authority of Act 165, P.A. 1929, as amended, and Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, ordered that for the period beginning April 1, 1982, and ending March 31, 1984, no person shall take, or attempt to take, any species of trout or salmor from any of the waters of this state except by hook and line during the open seasons prescribed, and within the minimum size limits and maximum possession limits indicated below.

Statewide open seasons on all streams and designated trout lakes shall be from the last Saturday in April through September 30 (longer on waters designated by the Director for extended fishing under Act 165) on all trout and salmon. Statewide open seasons on all other inland lakes and the Great Lakes shall be any time for all trout and salmon. Size limits shall be 8 inches on Lower Peninsula streams, 7 inches on Upper Peninsula streams, and 10 inches on lakes. The daily POSSESSION limit for trout and salmon shall be 5 fish singly or in combination but no more than 3 lake trout or splake, except that an additional 5 brook or brown trout may be taken from streams from the last Saturday in April through September 30 only and no more than 2 lake trout or splake may be taken from Lake Michigan or its tributary streams.

This order amends and supersedes Natural Resources Commission Order CFI-104.82 dated December 4, 1981.

Dennis A. Stein, a former Pigeon resident, has been appointed the Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service Agricultural Agent for Tuscola County, according to Tuscola Extension Director William Bortel. The appointment was effective July 5.

Stein earned his bachelor's degree in ag and natural resources education from MSU in 1978. He was a voc. ed. teacher with the Cassopolis School District from 1978 to 1980. and was in the same position in the Centreville School District when appointed to the Extension post.

He will be responsible for planning, organizing, implementing and evaluating Extension programs in areas of dairy, livestock, related crop production, farm management and marketing. Stein will assist and advise community leaders, ag organizations and associations and will provide appropriate educational programs, Bortel said.

Stein and his wife Brenda will reside in the Caro area. He grew up on the beef-cash crop farm of his parents, Mrs. Lillian Stein and the late Kenneth Stein of S. Caseville Road,

Tickets are available from Huron County Dairy Promotion Committee members or the Huron County Cooperative Extension Service office in Bad Axe at 269-9949, according to Extension Ag Agent Andy Sommers.

Farm prices are down slightly, as the Index of Prices Received by Michigan Farmers for all farm products was 121% of its 1977 base as of June 15, says the Michigan Ag Reporting Service. This was the first decrease since prices started inching upward last November.

The monthly index dropped only slightly from last month,

but is 7% lower than last year's figure.

Meanwhile, the national Index of Prices Paid by Farmers for commodities and services, interest, taxes and farm wage rates for June was 160% of its 1977 base, thanks to higher fuel costs, farm machinery and family living. Lower feed and replacement livestock prices helped keep the figure from rising faster, MARS says.

Corn acreage fell 30% to 2.2 million acres in Michigan, according to MARS estimates. The large drop from last year's acreage total is attributed to a heavy sign-up in the Payment in Kind (PIK) program. All spring seeded crops fell in acreage except sugar beets and summer potatoes, MARS says.

Corn acreage for grain fell 34% from last year. Soybeans fell 14% to 900,000 acres. Dry bean production land is off 32% to 380,000 acres, thanks to low prices and an expected large Navy bean carry-over. Sugar beet plantings at 103,000 acres

Winter wheat seedings at 830,000 acres went up 19%. while wheat for harvest at 700,000 acres should be up 17%, MARS says. Oats at 450,000 acres fell slightly, while harvested acreage for oats is expected to drop 33% since a considerable amount was seeded as a cover crop for PIK.

Alfalfa hay acreage should be up 5%, while all other hay is

The upcoming breakup of American Telephone and Telegraph could lead to higher phone rates and poorer service for farmers, according to Michigan Farm Bureau Ag Economist Robert Craig. He says monthly phone bills are expected to go up at least \$2 as of January -- and he predicts farmers will have more difficulty getting phone repairs and private lines from Michigan Bell and other large companies.


"We're concerned because there's not goig to be as many facilities installed to service farmers," Craig says. "They do thousands and thousands of dollars in business over the phone, so this could be a real problem in the future."

Poultry farmers feel betrayed by the PIK program, experts say, because it is artificially keeping corn prices higher than they normally would be. The program is designed to help grain and cotton farmers - but that means

higher costs for grain buyers such as poultry farmers. Corn prices in fall, 1981 were \$2.40 per bushel and fell to \$2 in September, 1982 -- but have inched upward to the \$3 range this year, thanks mostly to PIK which started this past January. Poultry people complained in a recent Wall Street

Cerone has potential for increasing grain yields and its effect on wheat, oats and barley will be demonstrated on test plots Thursday at the Mid-Michigan Crops and Soils Ag Day near Mt. Pleasant. The grain growth regulator is still in experimental stages.

GOOD NEWS FOR FARMERS

The Michigan House has approved legislation allowing farmers to take advantage of lower vehicle registration rates for farm vehicles used exclusively for farming purposes. House Bill 4581, which I sponsored, now goes to the Senate for final approval. Essentially, it replaces the current \$15

registration fee for all farm vehicles, with two types of registration options. Vehicles used only for farming, such as trucks that never leave the farm premises, should in my opinion be viewed differently than other forms of transportation that use public

A second provision authorizes the Secretary of State to issue a special registration, valid for three or more months, for trucks owned by farmers and used only for farm or personal purposes, and not used for hire by the farm. That registration fee would be one-tenth of the usual fee multiplied by the number of months for which the registration was

SLASH MEDICAID COSTS?

valid, plus a \$2 service charge.

A plan to harness Michigan's runaway Medicaid hospital costs has been introduced into the state House of Representatives. The bill could save the state \$63 million a year, and is similar to a California program which cut that state's Medicaid hospital costs by 14%.

The legislation would require hospitals to bid with the state for Medicaid service contracts. Varying costs of different types of hospital care would be taken into account,

Past attempts to cap medical costs through administrative rules haven't worked. Over the last four years, 1978 to 1982. the per diem cost of hospital care to Medicaid programs has increased by 98%.

We need a radically different concept of hospital cost containment. The Medicaid program is bigger than any welfare program we have, and it is growing faster than any other area of the budget. Philosophically, competition is a clearer and fairer way to limit Medicaid costs than any system of ad-



Choose a car with a clea (untinted) windshield. It is preferrable to use sunglasses for daytime driving when necessar; and get as much light a you can when you drive a

Have your eyes examined more frequently so changes in your visua acuity can be uncovere and corrected. You may be ible to drive a lot longer than you think.

Watching wildlife

One aspect of the outdoors that I never tire of is observing birds, animals, and fish in their natural habitats. Although most of my observations come as added attractions to my hunting and fishing ventures, there are many people who observe wildlife as a full-time hobby. Armed with field guides, binoculars and camera, these addicts stalk the woods in search of rare species, or un-familiar behavior exhibited by the thousands of different forms of life that live there. Although having been trained professionally in biology and having spent a good deal of time in the outdoors, I am no expert when it comes to wildlife. Just when I feel smug about some sort of knowledge that I have acquired, something comes along and wipes the smile right off my face. A couple of examples bears this out.

A few weeks ago while spending sometime at a friend's cottage in the Grayling area, we piled into the car at dusk to see if we could find some deer. A recent law has made it illegal to shine deer, but we planned to only observe those that would appear in the normal lighted area provided by our car's headlights. Taking a back road that follows the Manistee River from its crossing point on M-72 toward the small town of Sharon, we drove slowly, hoping to be rewarded with the sight of some recently dropped fawns. The miles slipped away, and although we spotted loads of bushes that were festooned with blossoms and green berries, indicating a bumper crop of both blueberries and huckleberries, we did not spot one set of flashing eye reflections that

would give away the quarry that we sought.

After checking out a beautiful campground that was a product of the producive C.C.C. days, we swung away from the river and took a sand road that would bring us back to M-72. We had managed to spot a couple of waddling porcupines, who flared their backsides in case we ventured too close, but still no deer.

Then it happened. Off the right edge of the road came the flash that could only indicate the presence of a deer.

There's one," I announced proudly, and at the same time my host's wife was making the same proclamation.

"Where? Where?" everybody seemed to question at once. "Right there," I answered, pointing to the base of a small tree that was just off the edge of the road. The eye flashed again, and

everybody acknowledged the spot where the Just then, as though we were experiencing something straight from the "Twilight Zone," the deer began to fly upward in a

very eratic manner. "It's flying!" I remember myself saying aloud. But as we drew nearer, our flying deer turned out to be a bird. It hopped to a convenient tree branch nearby, and as we

stopped the car, it continued to perch close enough for us to see. "I wonder what kind of bird it is?" I questioned from the back seat. As if hearing my question, and not wanting to embarrass me any longer, it began to sing it's telltale

"Whip-poor-will, whip-poor-will, whip- can't see the fawn for the black pepper

poor-will." The strains, which are so familiar to anyone who visits a woodlot, poured out from the nearby bird. "It's a Whippoorwill," our host proclaimed from the front seat. "We should have

I felt that everyone was staring at Mr. Woods and Waters and wondering why he didn't know the difference between a deer and a Whippoorwill.

"First time that I have ever seen one at night," I mumbled. "Didn't know that their eyes shined like that."

"I didn't know that either," someone else said, and I immediately felt better. Upon returning home, I grabbed my Peterson's Field Guide, and found out that the Whippoorwill is one of the many noc-tural birds and animals that have light-

reflecting eyes. The book explained that any form of life that hunts at night has eyes that gather faint bits of light, and reflects it across the pupils to increase the imagery that is present. In doing this, part of the light escapes and is reflected back at the source, and the eyes appear to be flashing. A new lesson learned. Whippoorwills have eyes that reflect light, and deer don't fly ...

The next day, my pride had yet another set-back. Even though my eyes are beginning to fail, and I am forced to wear bifocals, I still have the ability to spot wildlife more readily than others around me. Or so I

The two couples who were with us that weekend had planned a canoe trip on the Manistee River, and on a beautiful Friday morning, we embarked from a canoe livery on M-72 for a relaxing 12 mile trip downstream. Traffic was very light, and from the start, it was evident that we would be able to spot lots of birds and animals along the banks.

At one particular point, Betty and I were in the lead, and was we rounded the bend, we became aware of the strong smell of black pepper. I stopped the canoe and waited for the others to catch up.
