TRUCK DESTROYED: Up to \$15,000 in damage was reported last Tuesday evening, when this truck owned by Elmer Maust of Pigeon caught fire while unloading brush and loose wood resulting from the previous week's tornado.

Maust said Pigeon River Mennonite Church youth group members, as part of the Mennonite Disaster Service volunteer effort, were cleaning damage from a house in Bay Port. The truck was driven to a disposal site on Filion Road owned by Bob Baur, where a fire was

The truck attempted to unload the debris, but the contents caught fire. The cab was completely destroyed, the metal box floor buckled and box sides warped, Maust said. Winsor Firemen answered the call about 6:45 p.m.

Pigeon Council gets good budget news

Pigeon's general fund budget is in healthy condition, following the recent audit report by CPA John Walsh to the Pigeon Village Council.

The general fund ended the 1983-84 year with \$69,213 in additional revenue, compared with budget figures.

For the year, general fund revenue projects were for \$250,770 while actual income was \$303,454 -- for a surplus of \$52,684. Expenses were lower than expected, too, and had been budgeted at \$215,765. Actual expenses totaled \$199,236, for a surplus of \$16,529 - resulting in the \$69,213 overall total, Walsh

The village's beginning fund balance last March 1 was \$143,847. That has increased to \$240,565 as of Feb. 28, 1984. Most budgets are in good shape, except smaller but continuing losses in sewer and water funds. Walsh and Village Supt. Bob Brown, Jr., recommended a thorough review and streamlining of budget pro-cedures and systems.

COMPUTERS COMING: Along that line, Brown was directed to seek information

on acquiring or leasing a business computer for the village. A search committee of Council members Fred Orr, John Schaefer and Jim Armbruster will work with him in considering systems and software available, Please turn to Page 19

CCC elects new president; expands its goals

Ardyth Courtney-Marston has been re-elected president of the Concerned Citizens of Caseville, following last Thursday's resigna-tion of Dolores Bieri as the group's leader.

Nearly 50 persons attended the CCC's meeting in the Caseville Township Hall. Mrs. Bieri said she is resigning as president to remove any possible conflicts or criticism against her husband, Ron Bieri, who is a Republican candidate for Caseville Township Supervisor in the Aug. 7 Primary Election.

He and several other CCC members are opposing incumbent township officials Supervisor James Reeves, Clerk Wallace Hart and Trustees Wayne Anderson and Michael Power -- who are targets of a recall election expected about mid-September.

The CCC gathered about 300 signatures against each of the four incumbents in Huron County's first recall election in recent history, because of the officials' support for the proposed airport

Officials criticized the CCC following a disputed May 24 meeting, when some persons were ejected from the CCC public meeting because they were known supporters of the airport.

Two of the four CCC candidates for township offices named at that meeting have since changed their minds and did not file nominating petitions. Ron Bieri was a last-minute candidate for supervisor, as he had originally planned to run for a trustee post. New CCC

President Courtney-Marston encouraged people at the meeting to support the recall move-ment. A list of other township needs was discussed, including increased police protection, more fire protection, new township zoning and other safety and business concerns. Bumper stickers supporting the recall are also available.

Courtney-Marston is the wife of D. Charles Marston, a retired lawyer who has been providing legal services for the CCC as a member since its beginning.

WHEN IT BEGAN: The CCC started activity last fall, begun by several neighbors of the proposed \$1.1 million Caseville Township Airport located in the two-mile area between Crescent Beach, Caseville and Dunn Roads and M-25. The neighbors didn't want such a general aviation (small plane) airport near their lands, and felt township taxpayers should not pay for such a facility.

Township officials assured those residents that the airport would bring investments and jobs to the Caseville area, and reminded the CCC that no township funding for the airport is possible without a vote of township taxpayers. At least \$1.05 million in state and federal funding has been earmarked for the airport, Township Caseville Aeronautics Commission Chairman Lowell Kraft says. The facility is in the top

four for state funding in 1984-85, he says.

The required local portion of funding is available from landing fees, rentals and county or regional sources, Kraft says. A total of 385 acres of land has already been acquired, enough to begin the airport.

CCC leaders, however, said they believe the township will spend funds on the airport, when it is built. They sought a township vote on the project, but three legal opinions received by the Caseville Township Board said such a vote isn't possible. Voting would not be binding either, since no local funds are involved and since the project begun in 1980 is under federal aviation funding guidelines.

The CCC plans its next meeting in the Caseville Township Hall at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, July 19. The public is invited to attend.







Thumb Weekly News Round-Up

NO REDISTRICTING EFFECT Last week's state Supreme Court decision to throw out the 1983 legislative redistricting plan will have little impact on Thumb Area, experts agree.

The Democratic-backed plan, approved late last year by the state House and Senate when the party controlled both houses, was rejected by the high court because it is in violation of the Michigan Constitution.

State Rep. Dick Allen (R-Fairgrove) now serves all of Huron and Tuscola counties. He had traded several Tuscola townships with State Rep. Keith Muxlow (R-Brown City) in he 1983 redistricting plan.

Allen's 77th District again adds Tuscola, Fremont and Dayton Townships plus Frankenmuth. The 1983 redistricting plan had given Allen nine townships in northern Sanilac County, when he had lost the Tuscola County areas he has now regained.

Muxlow now serves all of Sanilac County, plus portions of northern St. Clair County.

WATER DAMAGE CONTINUES Experts are still determining crop damage totals following

nearly five inches of rainfall last Sunday and Monday. Up to one-quarter of the Thumb's bean crop may have been jeapardized in the heavy rains, which flooded fields last week. Fast-growing varieties such as Seafarers (85-day growing season) must be used if fields are to be replanted starting a race to beat fall rains and frost.

If fields must be replanted, farmers have only a week to do so, observers say. Losses of up to 60% of crops were reported in Bay County and elsewhere.

BROTHER, SISTER CHARGED

A 27-yer-old Vassar man and his 24-year-old Caro sister are in the Tuscola County jail, charged with first-degree murder

in the 1976 death of Robin Adams, 17, of Caro. Melvin Garza and Melba Norene Garza were arrested last week and charged in the murder of the babysitter, whose body has not been found. No bond was allowed. Preliminary exams are scheduled Aug. 7.


U.S. will stop growing...

recent story in USA Today says our nation's population will stop growing -- in 100 years. That sounds a long ways distant, but it really isn't. Quoting a Census Bureau study, experts say the number of immigrants plus births will equal the number of deaths nationally by the year 2082 (or sooner).

At that time, our population should be about 311 million -- up from 236 million today. We're still growing at the rate of 2.2 million people a

Most of our land's growth will be in the next 50 years, with a slowing growth rate thereafter. Growth stoppage could happen sooner than the year 2082, because our actual fertility rates are now lower than the 1.9 children per woman that the Census Bureau uses in its projections.

We'll never again reach the 4.2 million births of 1960, for instance, because of a decline in the female population of childbearing age, the study says.

America's favorite sports?

Some time ago, when I taught conservation in the high school classroom, I tried to impress upon my students the important effects the out-of-doors would have on their lives. We all know everyone needs water and air to sustain immediate life, and the land we live on must be cared for in order to continue supplying us with necessary food, but few realize the important recreational benefits that are derived from the out-of

I always managed to excite my colleagues in the teacher's lounge by announcing thoughts on the inclusion of backpacking, fly fishing and canoeing classes in the school's curriculum. They listened politely, rolled their eyes, and then pelted me with coffee cups as I sought the refuge of the door. Even the administration thought it was a joke, and went on record stating that any time I could get 2,000 people to attend a Friday night fly fishing contest, they would consider placing it in the extra curricular activities along with football and basketball. Licking my wounds, I relegated myself, and my outdoor activities, to their proper position in school and the sports world - dead

I still hung tenaciously to my convictions. I would constantly argue that, in adult life, more people go hunting than played the tuba, or more people fish than play baseball,

but no one listened This year I came across an interesting survey compiled by the U.S. News and World Report magazine. Using information supplied by the professional athletic clubs and leagues, college athletic attendances, U.S. Department of Interior and the American Fishing Tackle Manufacturer's Association, the magazine produced a statistical ranking of America's favorite

pastime. However, it is closely followed by three outdoor sports -- bicycling, 70 million participants, camping, 60 million par ticipants and fishing, 59 million participants. Each of them exceeds auto racng, which has the highest turnout (51 million) of any of the spectator sports. Thoroughbred racing has 50 million ticket buying spectators, major league baseball 44 million, college football 36 million and college basketball 31 million. NFL football is well down the list at 14 million and NBA basketball at 10 million. In comparison there are 38 million boaters and 20 million

Why then are fishing and other outdoor sports less visible on the American sport scene than some of the so-called jock

"Three reasons," said Sam Waltz, a spokesman for the DuPont Company's Stren' fishing line

"First, where's the final score? There really isn't any in fishing or hunting that compares to what a sports-minded public likes in football, baseball or basketball There are some major tournaments and tournament fishing circuits which resemble pro golf and tennis tours, but they've yet to command the attention of the establishment sports press."

'Second, competition among hunters and anglers isn't really the essence of the sport. Relaxation, enjoyment of the outdoors, a time to be with friends are all cited in surveys as the most important reasons people hunt and fish." Even fishing for food ranks in surveys above reasons that might suggest competitive fishing.'

Finally, while there are skills and techniques to be mastered in fishing to make one a first-class championship competitive angler, it is not wrapped in the mystique of skill and strategy of some sports, like golf or

"You don't have to achieve some high level of proficiency - or even a minimal level -- to enjoy fishing as recreation. You just don't have to be an athlete," added

Then why do so many people go hunting, fishing and camping? I think that there are several reasons.

Hunting and fishing as recreation return immense psychic dividends. Competitive sports, on the other hand, tend to be so physical they are an extension of a demanding work day or work week. Fishing doesn't have to be. The opportunity it provides in the outdoors to be with friends, to look at the horizon, or down a beautiful river and think, heals the weary spirit after a

Another reason for the popularity of outsports is our kinship with a rural, agrarian county. Most American boys grew up with a shotgun or fishing pole in his hand. This coupled with the fact that most major American population centers have historically grown up on or near the water, leaves nearly every American living within convenient distanct to fishable waters.

No matter which way you look at it, outdoor sports are popular to the people. And the future today for those outdoor sports is brighter than it has ever been. People are camping, hunting and fishing more and en-




