
She is one of an expected 200 units in the area's largest parade, according to Director Roy Lawrence.



Mutual, Pigeon Library make plans

The buildings, located on Nitz Street just east of the present Library structure, were acquired from Mutual Savings and Loan Association. The buildings have been occupied by Michigan Directory Company and Schaaf Plumbing and Heating. Both businesses are presently relocating in Pigeon.

Plans for the future include remodeling the exterior of the buildings to match the present architectural style. An audio-visual room where video tapes can be viewed and an additional, smaller community room are being considered for the additional space, according to Janet Heckman, Library Board member.

Because of the non-profit nature of the Library, Mutual has offered to donate 10% of the purchase price to the public institution, according to spokesmen.

Michigan Sugar announces expansion

Sugar beet producers in the Thumb got a big load of good news late last week when Savannah Foods and Industries, Inc., announced plans for a multi-million dollar expansion and modernization program for the Sebewaing and Croswell beet sugar plants of the Michigan Sugar Company. The Saginaw-based sugar processing company was sold to the Savannah company of Georgia in April.

For Sebewaing the announcement told of plans for the completion of an enlargement program which has been in progress for several years, increasing production by about one-third and in Croswell there will be an expansion and modernization project.

The Sebewaing plant's expansion will mean an increase in sugar production

by nearly 30 million pounds of refined sugar over last year's 100 million pounds, which translates into 135,000 more tons of sugar beets annually, requiring 6,500 more acres of plantings. The Sebewaing plant's 350 growers average 60 acres of beets each.

"This means an estimated value of more than \$4.7 million additional paid to growers each year," said Ernest Flegenheimer, president of Michigan Sugar.

The processing company is one of the major employers in the Sebewaing area, employing 72 full-time staff people and nearly 300 seasonal workers. The gross payroll for the Sebewaing factory totaled more than \$3

million in 1983.
The Sebewaing factory is

the largest facility in the Michigan Sugar Company, with an annual capacity to process more than 400,000 tons of sugar beets and produces about 100 million pounds of refined sugar each year.

The total increase in Michigan Sugar Company's sugar production at Sebewaing and Croswell will be about 50 million pounds, will boost payment to beet growers by nearly \$8 million and insure or lengthen employment at the two facilities.

The Croswell expansion will increase that plant's overall capacity by about 50% over a two-year period, so that Croswell will produce about 75 million pounds of sugar annually. In that district, the expansion will

permit an additional 90,000 tons of beets on about 5,000 more acres for 225 growers.

That will mean an additional \$3.2 million paid to growers. The Croswell facility is the smallest operating beet sugar plant in the U.S. and slices about 1,800 tons per day during the season, o ahnii 55 million pounds of refined sugar each year. The Croswell facility employes 46 full-time and 236 seasonal workers. Michigan Sugar is the major employer in the Croswell community of 2,100 population. "Without major capital expenditures to improve operating effi-ciency, the Croswell factory would have been forced to close permanently, Flegenheimer said, adding,

"If shut down, it would mean a loss of \$2 million in payroll and millions paid annually to area beet growers."

sulating medicament followed by a silver filling we elect to do so, even then hot and cold sensitivity may be

present for a short while. This temporary filling is also

medicated, soothing the nerve and acting as a thermal

insulator to allow complete recovery. At the second ap-

pointment, part of the temporary filling was removed

and the deepest portion, closest to the sensitive center,

left in place to act as an insulator for the metal filling.

CANOEIST SETTING RECORD John Buckley has nearly reached his life's goal -- becoming the first man to canoe across the five Great Lakes within a

The 42-year-old Mt. Pleasant man began his adventure June 25 by paddling across Lake Michigan and Lake Superior. He paddled across Lake Huron Friday, in a 22½-hour journey from Harbor Beach to Goderich, Ont.

That Lake Huron crossing included 12 hours to get across the Saginaw River and Saginaw Bay. He left Saginaw about 4 p.m. last Wednesday, paddled to Bay City and then canoed to Bay Port early Thursday, in his 17-foot-long custom built

He plans to journey across Lake Erie early this week, and his last trip traversing Lake Ontario should be between Toronto and Niagara Falls.

TOO MANY FISH STOCKED?

Michigan officials may be stocking more salmon, lake trout, steelhead and brown trout in Lake Michigan and Lake Huron than is adequate, according to a state Department of Natural Resources Fisheries Division official

Douglas Jester, Jr., says his assessment is based on the amount of forage fish -- which the "salmonids" feed on -- in the lakes. The poundage of forage fish dictates how many pounds of salmonids the lakes will support.

That might mean the present ample salmonid numbers may decline, and fish size may be smaller in the future, too, if too few chubs, smelt, alewives and sculpins remain in the

O-G TO LAYOFF TEACHER Owendale-Gagetown High School English teacher Nancy

Folk has been laid off due to "economics and declining enrollment," in recent action by the Owen-Gage Board of Education. An elementary teacher may also be pink-slipped soon. Supt. Ronald Erickson and a group of Board members went to Lansing last Tuesday to speed up the district's application to borrow \$550,000 in tax anticipation notes, which was turned down last month. The money is needed to pay

salaries and bills until property tax revenues are received The turndown shows a difference of opinion between the

O-G Board and the State Treasurer over the district's financial status. Erickson said the O-G District showed a fund surplus of about \$250,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30 -while the state claims it is \$180,000 in the red because it cannot claim revenues due to from the disputed Goslin territory,

now a part of the Cass City District.

All Board officials were re-elected, including President Ronald Good, Vice President Joseph Warack, Secretary Leona LaFave and Treasurer Jack Brinkman.

FARM BUREAU SAYS "YES"

Two Thumb Area legislators have been endorsed by the Michigan Farm Bureau's AgriPac group. State Rep. Dick Allen (R-Fairgrove) and U.S. Congressman Bob Traxler (D-Bay City) are among 77 candidates receiving the group's primary election endorsements this year. They include 35 Democrats and 42 Republicans who are "friends of agriculture," according to AgriPac.

re you in agreement with 85% of your fellow state residents, who said in a recent Michigan Department of Commerce survey they try to buy products manufactured in our state -- rather than goods made

If they were of equal price and quality, the survey said, Michigan residents would rather buy locally-manufactured items. "People seem to be saying 'Our state is down and out, and we're going to help out,' "notes a state official. "And that's terrific," Jan Hayhow adds.

Part of this local pride and support comes from First Lady Paula Blanchard's volunteerism along these lines. She is seeking to encourage Michigan manufacturers to identify their products as made in the state.
After all, isn't that how most of us feel deep

down inside? Perhaps shopping at a far-away mall is fun (or at least different than shopping in familiar local stores). But don't most of us try to support our local businesses first? Some people may gripe about slightly less selection, slower-revolving inventories and so on -- but deep down, aren't we glad our communities offer such stores or services?

Mrs. Blanchard and Hayhow believe the local business support is a small extension of the "Yes! Michigan" promotion. They may be right. But part of the problem is that about two-thirds of state residents have trouble identifying Michigan-made products.

That's the manufacturers' fault! If locallymade products aren't so identified, how are buyers supposed to know? If you see two identical pairs of shoes, 85% of us may be apt to buy the more-local variety. But that's not possible if we can't identify which is which.

That's the manufacturers' responsibility then! Maybe "Made in Michigan" stickers, applied directly to goods sold here. After all, would such a moniker be helpful for goods sold in Indiana, Ohio -- or South Carolina? Probably not. They should have their own "local pride"

Take time to smell the roses

I had felt the pressure building for the last few days. The symptoms were the same, a nagging pain in the temples, shortness of breath, and a general irritated feeling that left me snapping at the people I came in contact with. I couldn't put my finger on any one event that caused its eruption, but I supposed it to be a number of little instances joining together to form the tight muscles and frazzled nerves. One thing for sure, I needed a break, a change from the humdrum existence I had been carrying on for the past few weeks, a chance to relax without the pressures of day-to-day living, a chance to smell the roses.

Saturday found Betty and Julie, my wife and daughter, heading for a bridal shower in Saginaw. With a whole day to myself I began to sort out the different possibilities. I could hoe the garden, mow the lawn, repair some of the 100 things that always seem to be broken around our house, or -- I could go fishing. In the 1/1000 of a second it took me to make the decision, I was already tossing my rod, waders, fishing vest and Coleman cooler in the back of the wagon, and leaving a note indicating I might be home near midnight, I headed the car northward.

The first feelings of relaxation came at Bay City, a little more pressure was relieved around Standish, the headache began to subside near West Branch, and the kink in my neck was all but gone when I turned off

the expressway at Grayling.
On the way north I had been listening to 102.5's John Doremis expound on the fact that over 10 billion dollars are spent each year on quackery medicine. And most of it deals with calming people's nerves and insulating them from the fast pace life most of us lead, even though it is not by choice.

I followed a paved road for a couple of miles, turned off on a dust-choking side road, and wound the car through a thick pine forest on the way to a fishing access on the river. I felt myself getting excited as I passed through each familiar turn in the road. Nearing the parking spot, I discovered it wasn't the fishing that seemed to be turning me on, but rather the long, relaxing walk through the woods that was necessary before I reached the river. A walk, laden with lunch and fishing gear, which would bring forth a warm rush of perspiration, coupled with a few aching muscles and the every present insect bites. But none of these would matter as they would be overshadowed by the medicinal aspects of the trek. In other words, the psychological part becomes more important than the physical part.

After parking the cr, I donned a long sleeved shirt. Experience told me it would be a welcome companion to ward off the chill of the river air and any mosquitos or black flies I would encounter. I stashed sandwiches, apples and soft drink cans in the back of my fishing vest, strapped my ultra-light waders to the webbing, and donned the wading shoes, which would now serve as hiking boots. I slung my camera around my neck and picking up my soft rod case, headed into the thick stand of spruce and

be sure the trail will not lead you to any steep terrain or through muddy quagmires. Animals (or deer in this case), follow the easy way, sticking to fairly level contours and leading where the going is easy.

I had not gone 10 steps and I was already on my knees. The blueberry bushes covered both sides of the trail, and as I fondled the fragile blossoms, I thought of the luscious berries that would soon take their place.

Not far from the bush that had attracted me was a group of pale violet flowers. Almost hidden in the recess of a rotting stump, this specie which I thought was called Bird's Foot violets, was as pretty as any florist's bouquet. A few steps further were some more flowers, also violets, even though they were white in color. Many people don't know that violets are the most common of woodland flowers and besides growing in all shades of purple, blue and violet, also appear in a white and yellow form. I spent a few more minutes looking and smelling, and then headed down the

The trail lead to a thick growth of seedling pines. I had to bend over to avoid being slapped in the face by the limber limbs of these young trees. As I neared the opening on the far side, I became aware of hundreds of diddle-head ferns growing on both sides of the trail. The lime-green stalks, delicately formed so they rival the intricate carvings of the most expensive Stradivarious, get their name because they look like the turned head of a violin. Once you become aware of them, you can hardly believe how you missed seeing them before.

A snapping noise to my left caused me to freeze. I turned slowly and was met by the piercing start of a whitetail doe. Either had scared her off the trail, or she stepped aside to let me pass. In either case it didn't matter, as I was as unconcerned about her as she was about me. I moved forward and she lowered her head to graze.

A few more yards and some more flowers, trilliums this time. Thousands of blossoms stretching down a slope until they disappeared in the ravine below. More blueberry bushes and a beautiful blue-green lichen almost obliterating the trail I was following. I didn't know the name and secretly wished I had paid closer attention in my college

I was getting close to the river now. The cool breeze wafting upwards indicated the difference in temperature I would find. I was glad I put on the long-sleeved shirt.

I would be fishing soon. The woods, with its blueberry bushes, ferns, violets, trilliums, lichens and wildlife would be behind me. Only the memories would remain, and later I would be glad I had taken time to stop and smell the roses . . .

Thumb area **OUTDOORS**

SUMMER FISHING may

well have hit its peak last week, but Thumb anglers are still in for some exciting sport in the weeks to come. Walleyes have been the big news, and they cooperated with most fishermen both Thursday and Friday. The winds picked up on Saturday and drove most of the small boats from the productive water, but not before many stringers were filled. Great action was reported all along the island chain from Sebewaing to Bay Port, and also near both Big and Little Charity. Lake Trout continue to be hot at Port Austin and Grindstone City. Anglers should remember that the season will end early this year, and lakers will not be legal after Aug. 15.

Perch fishing has been a pleasant surprise this year. After a number of skimpy years, DNR biologists in dicated recent studies show the Bay may be producing as many as eight million perch a year. This level of production is close to the banner years of the '50s and early 60s. Researchers from the University of Michigan are presently analyzing perch stocks in the Saginaw Bay and have tagged 10,000 perch. In order to obtain in formation, the U of M will pay \$1 for the tag and information about how the fish was caught. The tagged fish were released at Tawas, Pinconning, Bay Port and Port Austin.
