

They did it again, those hard-working Bay Port folks who put on the seventh annual Bay Port Fish Sandwich Day Sunday.

Exact figures aren't tallied yet, but officials say they had 6338 fish fillets ready for the event and even added 40 more pounds of fish before running out late Sunday, for about another 180 pieces. "I know we were right up there, near the 6000 figure," Chamber of Commerce President Glenn Henne said Monday. "Everybody's very happy about it.

Long-time fishman Henry Engelhard said he's confident that sales went well beyond the 6000-piece goal. And, his wife Edna adds, 525 dozen buns (6300) were purchased and used. Workers said they saw more first-timers -- those who had never been to Fish Sandwich Day before -- than ever, and told of a carload of visitors from Grosse Point who arrived at 10:15 a.m., nearly an hour before serving was to start.


Some people from Troy,

Farmington Hills and other towns heard about Fish Sandwich Day on WJR Radio, Detroit, and drove out of their way to take part — including a carload of Alaskans, traveling in Michigan.

Lines of ticket-buyers moved quickly, with 10

minutes about the longest wait.

A total of 1000 sandwiches were sold the first year, 1978, leaders say, and that grew to 4200 by 1982. Last year's sales total of 5200 was easily surpassed this year, they add—and next year's event should draw even more, they

TRACTOR DRIVER ESCAPES INJURY: Mark A. Trost, 11 of Pigeon was treated for minor injuries and released after the tractor he was driving was struck by a car eastbound on Weale Road about 10:20 p.m. last Tuesday night.

Huron County Sheriff's Deputies said Trost was knocked off the tractor when a car driven by Richard Kern, 42 of Bay Port, struck the rear of the tractor's trailer, which had been disconnected when this photo was taken soon after the accident.

Deputies said Kern saw the trailer moments before the crash, and said an oncoming car prevented him from swerving to avoid the trailer. Both the trailer and

tractor tipped on impact.

Deputies said the tractor and trailer had no lights, reflectors or slow-moving vehicle signs on its rear. Young Trost had been working on his father's nearby farm and was returning home when the accident occurred. He was taken to Scheurer Hospital, Pigeon, for treatment and was later released.

# Thumb Weekly News Round-Up

SEBEWAING MAN DIES 22-year-old Army Specialist 4th Class Jeffery Thaut of Sebe-

waing died early July 29, from injuries he received in a twocar head-on collision near Fort Riley, Kan. His car collided with an auto driven by William Evans, 24, who with his family was listed in stable condition after the 1:58 a.m. accident. a 1980 graduate of Unionville-Sebewaing Area High School, thaut attended SVSC for two years. Funeral services were conducted Friday in Sebewaing.

BEAN CROP GETS SOME RAIN Thumb Area bean growers gave a partial sigh of relief

Monday, when a small amount of moisture helped rejuvenate the growth of dry bean crops.

Area experts say they expect a small navy bean crop this year, thanks to heavy rains early in planting - and now followed by recent dry spells.

Tuscola County Ag Agent William Bortel says present bean conditions are the worst he's seen in his 15 years in Caro. Many fields required replanting after spring rains killed justplanted fields. "Fifty percent of the replanted beans are not growing because there's no water," Bortel says.

John McGill of the Michigan Bean Shippers Association says he expects this year's crop to be better than average, but says he'd prefer more rain soon. Monday's sprinkling may help somewhat, but more is needed.

Local experts say beans should average about 1000 pounds per acre when harvested, down from last year's 1300-lb. range -- and slower than the normal 1250-lb. average.

FROM RAILS TO TRAILS?
The abandoned Grand Trunk Railway's right-of-way bet-

ween Imlay City and Caseville could become a recreation trail, irrigation pipeline artery or have other uses, following a meeting last week.

Economic Development Corporation (EDC) directors from Huron, Tuscola and Lapeer Counties discussed turning the stone pathway into a 60-mile-long trail for bicyclists and horse riders, but no firm idea is available whether or not Grand Trunk plans to sell the right-of-way -- or if funding to build the trail is available.

Huron County EDC Director Ralph Iden says such a trail would be "one more component in our incoming (tourist) dollar." He said crushed limestone from the Wallace Stone Plant near Bay Port is a paving alternative to the moreexpensive asphalt.

Pigeon area farmer Virgil Bouck said some Pigeon area buildings, Gogola said. farmers are working to obtain the right-of-way between fresh water for irrigation. He says farmers would prefer the strip would not be used for recreation.

Marlette planned to process dry beans this fall, putting more than 100 people to work. "The farmers have no place to send their crops," he said. "They send them to Ohio and Indiana because this state has no canneries."

But Sanilac commissioners voted against selling \$300,000 in industrial revenue bonds to help purchase the 65-year-old plant, now closed. Commissioners said no guarantees were shown of raising more than \$1.5 million needed to open and

Rate requests always seem to be double what he utility actually needs.

Consumers is seeking \$472 million a year for 15 years from customers, charging them for: nearly \$4 billion in construction costs for the abandoned plant; \$472 million to be returned to certain stockholders as dividends; \$1.5 billion in federal and state income taxes already paid while the project was being built, and \$1.6 billion for interst on bank loans and construction bond payments.

Thistles come in two colors - yellow and purple. Earlier we had the delicate pink of wild roses along the road and later there is the deep golden hue of the sneezin' weed - goldenrod. The dark brown cattails stand tall in the ditches, keeping watch over all.

One of the boys just said, "You know it's Fair Week - it's raining this morning." Doesn't it always? For the first time in about ten years we don't have anyone from this household exhibiting livestock at the Fair. It's kind of nice not to have to rush out there every morning with feed and bedding. Raising an animal to show is good experience for a youngster. This mother feels she has had enough experience in that line. Just ask the boys about my experience. They gleefully will relate about cattle getting out when no one else is home, a steer knocking me down in the manure, one breaking loose and touring the midway, a rabbit disappearing from his Fair cage and then showing up in the pig pen. Oh well, have fun at

You probably can't blame Consumers for trying to get all it can, since uncertain future costs and escalating expenses forced the construction cancellation. Now, in retrospect, the company wants to say, "We want to get every penny back which we tried to invest for the good of the state." Selling off the equipment already installed probably would earn 10 cents on the dollar or less, so there's not much salvagable here.

But should the public be asked to shoulder the entire bill for an idea which wasn't bad at the time -- but which failed?

Suppose you plant mushrooms because mushroom prices seem high. Then your crop is wiped out or never grows, or prices tumble. Who takes the loss? You do, directly, because you didn't plan adequately. What about a small business which orders 100 dozen handball racquets? Since only four (or so) people play handball in your town, who absorbs the surplus for your store? The government won't step in

Why should the government do so for Consumers Power? We don't see a good reason

why it should. Experts say this rate-setting case will take more than a year. No doubt some compromise will be reached, but it shouldn't involve more than \$1 or \$2 billion from customers. The only thing Consumers' customers did was fail to closely monitor excessive cost overruns, poor planning and even worse construction flaws.

You or I wouldn't get reimbursed for such errors. Why should Consumers Power?

# Fishing tales

Every time I pick up an outdoor magazine or the outdoor section of a newspaper, I'm met by the sickening smiles of successful outdoorsmen. Each story is filled with the famous "fish with every cast" routine, and 'record-size bucks'' with each pull of the trigger. Any outdoor activity, worth its salt, is bound to have thousands of "unsuccessful" but interesting yarns concerning people and events that surround their sport, and fishing is no exception. With more than 50 million anglers beating the water to a froth each year, it is only natural that many great tales are lost for want of a witness at he actual event or a compassionate listening ear when the story is retold. Such was the case with a father and son who were two of the 150 contestants in the recent Sebewaing Sportsmen's Club's Walleye Fishing

The father laid on his tale of woe as he filled his car with gas last week.

'Well," he started, "I guess the fish dinner I ate at the conclusion of the Walleye rnament cost me about a 100 bucks.'

I could only fish on Friday," he continues, 'so, we took off good and early; about 4:00 a.m. wanted to make sure we got on the hot spots before the other fishermen beat us to it. Was a little dark going out the river channel and we had to use the spotlight to check on the buoys. Guess we drifted a little too far to the north, because the first thing I know, the prop is going bumpity, bumpity, bump on the rocks. Looks like I'm going to need a new one, costs about \$75. If I total that to the \$15 entry fee, and maybe \$10 for gas and a couple of lures I lost, yep, that fish dinner cost me about \$100."

"Get any fish?" I questioned."
"Sure," he replied, "two 10 inchers we had to throw back and a good-sized Sheephead."

"But," he continues, "if we kept track of all the cost involved in fishing, our fish would be \$50 per pound, wouldn't it?"

"Right on," I agreed.
Earlier that week, I had encountered his son as I was leaving church. As soon as the last hymn was sung, he clamped me on the shoulder and said, "You want to hear a good fish story." 


