Thumb Ag Day Cass City Dec.

The annual "Thumb Ag Day" is scheduled for Saturday, Dec. 1 at Cass City High School. The event provides a setting in which over 100 agribusinesses ranging from farm computer systems to feed, seed and fertilizer suppliers have the opportunity to meet and talk with their farm clients.

During the morning, visitors will have an opportunity to participate in seminars including such topics as: the 1985 Farm Bill,

pricing, farm chemical safety and Crop-O-Rama for Youth. The seminars are scheduled for 10 a.m.-12

A speaker from Schnittker Schnittker Washington, D.C., will speak in the afternoon on current and future farm policy.

The program is sponsored by the Huron, SanilaC And Tuscola County Cooperative Extension Services.

Bay funding okayed

A supplemental appropriations bill benefiting projects throughout Huron and Tuscola counties was recently approved, according to State Representative Dick Allen (R-Fairgrove). Funds approved will be channeled through the Department of Natural Resources from the Kammer land Trust Fund. Allen says.

About \$250,000 of the Kammer Trust Fund will be used to develop a marina and public park at Sebewaing, and an additional \$300,000 will be used for the Huron Shoreline Preservation Pro-

Many state game areas in the Thumb area will also receive funds from the supplemental appropriations package. Those game areas include Fish Point Wildlife Area, Quanicasse State Game Area, Wild Fowl Bay Game Area, Murphy Lake State Game Area, as well as game and wildlife areas in Deford, Vassar, Cass City, Gagetown and Rush Lake, Allen says.

Also included in the supplimental bill are funds for waterways public access sites. Huron County will receive money for Lake Huron and Saginaw Bay access sites.

Progress-Advance News Policy:

Beginning in early 1983, The Progress-Advance has cooperated in publishing a listing of pertinent county and local record news. This includes listing of all marriage applications, divorces, assumed names, warranty deeds and probate court actions each week, as they are filed.

Since Jan. 1, 1984, The Progress-Advance has compiled listings of all adjudged District Court and Circuit Court decisions involving local persons as available.

Since staffing does not allow full-time surveillance of the courts in our coverage area, our policy has been to report judgements of guilt or pleadings of guilt as cases are concluded. Hence, names of persons who are judged innocent of their charges are not reported.

The only exception to this modified news policy is any charge of murder, which is reported as a person is arrested and appears at his or her determination hearing.

Our news policy will continue in all matters of local importance, with bias against or favoritism toward none.

ROSS GETS 20-30 YEARS

Ralph C. Ross was sentenced to 20 to 30 years in Jackson Prison Friday for his part in the Jan. 22 murder of Jerry Western of Bad Axe. Ross, a Caseville farmer and health spa operator, was a prime witness against Ellen J. Western in her trial on charges she helped plot the murder of her hus-

Jude M. Richard Knoblock did not follow Huron County Prosecutor Karl Kraus' recommendation to sentence Ross to 10 years in jail, as part of Ross' plea bargain. He had originally been charged with first-degree murder and conspiracy for helping Mrs. Western find a gunman to kill her husband, but Ross later pled guilty to second-degree murder.

Ross said he wanted it known he did not threaten Michael Bieri or his family, as had been claimed in some testimony during the trial. Bieri was found guilty Nov. 9 of accepting

*4000 as the trigger man in the slaying.

Ross noted he has "dedicated" his life to helping poor people, and told Judge Knoblock he would like a second chance to pick up where he had left off (before the murder and trial). He has served as a Caseville area business leader and has played Santa Claus for many years.

But Judge Knoblock noted Jerry Western didn't get a second chance, and said Ross, 52, probably won't see freedom

Sentencing for Ellen Jane Western, 39 of Bad Axe, is scheduled next Friday, Nov. 30. She was convicted of firstdegree murder and conspiracy by a St. Clair County jury last month. She is expected to receive a life sentence with no chance for parole, as did Bieri, 39 of Elkton, after his trial ending Sept. 6 in Tuscola County.

SKILL CENTER APPROVED

Huron County voters last week approved a 1.49-mill request to establish a local skill center, by 670 votes, 2887 to 2217 ballots. This marked the first time in three votes the lifetime millage was approved.

It will allow construction of a 26-room skill center educational building, with 60,000 square feet of size, in a five-mile area surrounding Bad Axe. Similar votes in 1973 and 1974 were turned down by voters. This makes the county eligible for up to \$1.3 million in state grants to construct the building, to be opened for the start of the 1986-87 school year.

MANY GIFTS HELPED ALLEN

Newly re-elected State Representative Dick Allen (R-Fairgrove) received \$20 or more from 68 citizens plus donations from political action committees and private corporations, in his bid to retain his 77th District Seat in the Nov. 6 General Election.

Contributions received by Aug. 31 totaled \$7096, according to the Capital News Service. Of that amount, \$1700 was received after the Primary Election. Some Allen contributors included the Michigan Milke Producers, Huron County Republicans, Thumb Area Republican Caucus, Michigan Farm Bureau PAC, Great Lakes Sugar Beet Growers PAC, Michigan Funeral Directors' Association PAC, Michigan Beer and Wine Wholesaler's Association, Michigan Doctor's PAC and others.

Both the Huron Intermediate School District and the Owendale-Gagetown School Distric should be able to levy recently-passed millages yet in 1984, thanks to late action by the State House and Senate.

In the past, any district which conducted millage elections after Sept. 15 could not levy that millage until the following year. Last week's successful 1.49-mill passage for the Huron Intermediate's Skill Center and the recently renewed Owen-Gage millage -- plus 14 other millages in the state -- can be

As we see it editorially

Many things make us thankful!

ome people may not find much to be thankful for personally in the justannounced expansion at Pigeon Manufacturing Company. But the impact of the firm's \$1 million expansion -- with its 25 new jobs -fulfills a major need in the community.

It's at times such as this Thanksgiving week when such things should be considered.

On the surface, any and all communities should be grateful that a company will be adding more stamping presses and creating new jobs. Nearly all communities WOULD be grateful for such news.

But looking more closely at the issue, the fact that such companies continue in business in our state is somewhat miraculous on its own.

Company President Tony Barclae made certain reporters at last week's ground-breaking ceremony realized how proud he was of General Manager Clarence Schadd and the entire 50-member labor force, at Pigeon's oldest continous factory. Barclae said the workers "have done a great job here."

But his related comment hints at what really might have happened. Barclae said he was happy jobs could be retained here, plus said he was grateful expansion could be possible. JOB RETENTION. Those are the key words.

As in any business, one of Pigeon Manufacturing's options was to close the plant. Neighbors or grumblers may think "that'll never happen here" or may believe "they've got too much invested to ever stop work here." Don't you believe it.

A very viable option to the company's longrange planners was to close smaller, lessefficient plants -- in favor of newer facilities, perhaps closer to Detroit or other auto assembly cities. Barclae made no pretense that such a possibility had not been considered here. Through the bleak, dark recession days of the

early 1980s, similar companies he controls expanded into vacant manufacturing towns in Ohio which lavished gifts of tax incentives, lowinterest loans and other reasons to move there.

Just because Pigeon Manufacturing has "always" been in Pigeon didn't mean that would necessarily continue. But continue -- and expand -- they will.

After opening in the early 1950s, the company has been known for the quality of its products and the stability of its workforce. That's one advantage small towns such as Pigeon can of-

It's never been a large profit-maker, but the nine new stamping presses being added will nearly double the potential material output. Imagine Pigeon without Pigeon Manufacturing. Besides the other three elements of residential recreational and commercial qualities of life, Pigeon would have a tremendous void -- industrial -- to detract from being a complete, and good, community.

Thanksgiving is a perfect time to express thanks to business owners -- and others -- who make investments each day in this area. For the stronger each local element is, the better off the entire community will remain



Roses and Thorns Manipulation or serious

area, so you need not waste time guessing whom I am talking A lady called me one day in desperate need of help. She had no sooner sat down in my office when she said, "You're lucky I made it down here to your office because I almost committed suicide!" I felt like responding "Why does that make me so lucky?" but fortunately wisdom was the better part of me

This lady had some very deep problems which you do not need to know. Suffice it to say that each time she came into the office the first words to roll off her tongue were how fortunate I was that she made it to this session without killing herself. After the third time I went to my desk, picked up the phone and started dialing. She immediately wanted to know what I was doing. So I mentioned that I was calling her family doctor to have her committed to the psychiatric ward of a ocal hospital. She protested vigorously

I then shared with her that there are two qualities every counselor needs to have above all else. First, is a great love for people. And second is the ability to realize when I have manipulation. "If I leave my spouse, he/she will commit reached the limits of my ability to help the counselee, and to refer that counselee on to others who can take the healing process to completion. I had reached my limits with this woman. Her constant suicidal tendencies were beyond my expertise to handle

She then offered that these tendencies were not that bad to warrant psychiatric hospitalization. I replied as to how she knew her tendencies were not that serious. She then admitted what everyone sort of knew all along - suicide was her ultimate manipulation to get people to do what she wanted.

Suicide for many is the "grown-up" version of a tantrum. Please do not think I am sluffing something off as unimportant. Any type of suicidal talk or action is always serious. But there are some insights to understand.

Children are taught early in life what works and what does not in getting what they want. A friend of mine was visiting a couple one day where both husband and wife were totally deaf. They had a child who was perfectly normal. When my friend entered the front door, he found that child throwing a Class A tantrum on the floor - rolling around, kicking the furniture, jumping, running, hitting himself - all of which went on without one sound. And why not? Why should that child scream and use other things to make noise? The deaf parents could not hear a thing!

Children tend to develop things that work. If security (time with parents, physical touching by parents, encouragement and other positive comments, etc.) is lacking, a child finds confirmation of his worth by demanding attention. Such tan. . . . Next week, the serious suicide.

trums either work (gain the desired result) or they do not. If they do, then the child is becoming programmed to continue this line of behavior. Little tantrums lead to bigger ones when the little ones do not work anymore.

The classic married couple begin the road to suicide by doing little things that cause doubt as to the security of the marriage. The marriage's security is then tested by making comments of frustration in hopes a soothing blanket of security will bring the frustration back to health. If not, then further actions of frustration are offered - the "silent treatment," new interests outside the home, emotional outbursts, etc. Comments such as "You don't care anymore!" are quickly followed by actions to prove this correct. Deep depressions Overtures of despair. Talk of ending it all.

My goodness, if the spouse cannot respond to the idea of ending it all, then what is left to get that spouse to respond? Usually the offer of suicide gains the desired attention. The spouse who has been unfaithful or the home situation that has been unacceptable or the frustrations of life that have been

unbearable are now receiving top priority by all concerned We call such behavior "passive aggressive." The person is very aggressive, but not in the direction of the problem Manipulator is another word for passive aggressive. I know of many cases where a passive aggressive person has driven his/her spouse up a wall and then whenever that spouse comes to the decision that enough is enough and it is time to terminate this relationship, that spouse is manipulated back into the relationship by suicide -- in many cases, the ultimate suicide on me and I will have to live with that the rest of my

In reality, all suicides are a CALL FOR HELP! The individual has reached a point where hope is shattered and termination is more appealing than suffering. Some suicides are genuine desires to end life. Other suicides are desires to continue life, but life the way I want it! The latter is what we have been talking about.

A manipulation suicide will go as far as it needs to. If the offer of suicide no longer works, then small attempts are tried. but always when people are around to stop the suicide. If that does not work, then a risk is taken to attempt suicide without people around, then immediately call them to get the stomach pumped out or to bandage the wrists or whatever. If that does not work, then the final manipulation is to actually die with the satisfaction that the other has to live with this

Such a person needs help to experience security enough to let go of having to run everything and everyone in order to eniov life. A rule of thumb in identifying a manipulation suicide is to ask, "How, when and where" when a person offers suicide. If the person can immediately tell you how, when and where he/she will commit suicide, call your doctor immediately! If the person hesitates at all, then manipulation is most likely the motive. The situation with manipulation is still serious and almost as immediate, so do not sit on it but



WALLEYE AND SAUGER SIZE LIMIT

Under the authority of Section 1 of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, being Section 300.1 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, the Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on August 10, 1984, ordered that the walleye and sauger size limit shall be 15 inches on all waters, including the Great Lakes and connecting waters, except Lake Sogebic, Big Manistique Lake, Lake Erie, Lake St. Clair and the Detroit and St. Clair rivers for a period of five years beginning January 1, 1985, through March 31, 1990. This order supersedes the previous order entitled "Walleye and Sauger Size .imit", CFI-115.82.

The annual Official Tree Lighting Ceremony kicking off Pigeon's holiday season wouldn't be complete without turning on the huge evergreen tree in the center of town!


