# breaks prompt business growth

Half of something is better than all of nothing.

That is the rationale behind local governments' grants of tax breaks to industrial and commercial businesses

Since 1977, for example, the Village of Pigeon has agreed to 10 requests for tax abatements from four separate businesses on property initially valued at \$3.557 million.

Due to depreciation, however, this figure has dropped to \$1.356 million, which represents about 9.5% of the village tax

The tax breaks are given by local units of government in an attempt to help businesses hire additional employes and increase the tax base.

NEW BUSINESS: For a period of 12 years, tax abatements mean the businesses pay half only the taxes on new construction or expansion projects. After that period, the

property is taxed at the regular rate.

Huron Casting Inc., the first local enterprise to take advantage of the tax abatement concept, used the tax break to begin operation operations in 1976 with about 25 employes

Since that time, six more abatements have been approved for Huron Casting expansion projects, enabling the local payroll to grow also to 180 workers.

Huron Casting President Leroy Wurst says the tax breaks approved by the village enables the young industrial firm to battle in a worldwide market.

'It's a competitive world. We're com-

peting with foreign sources and foundries," Wurst says. "Every time you build, there are expenses like a ball and chain. The more you can cut off, the easier it is to drag the rest."

High expenses for workman's compensation, property taxes and single business taxes make Michigan "one of the worst places to do business," says Wurst.

Tax abatement is something the state instituted to compensate for some of those

drawbacks, he adds.

VILLAGE SUPPORT: Pigeon Village President Norris Diebel is an enthusiastic supporter of tax abatements.

I think (tax abatements) are real good. The village doesn't lose anything in taxes, and it gets half of anything new," says Diebel.

No business that applied for the tax breaks in Pigeon has been turned down, says the village president
"We encourage people to use the


abatements. If anyone is interested in coming to town, we will work hard to get (abatements) for them," Diebel says.

Pigeon Council members might wonder


if some of the expansion or construction projects would have proceeded without the incentives of tax abatements -- but leaders are reluctant to take the chance of discouraging economic development.

What's the point in bluffing someone? If you don't offer incentives, businesses might go somewhere else," Diebel notes. Dave McCormick, vice president of Mc-

The Detroit system pulls water from lower Lake Huron north of Port Huron for treatment and use in municipa water lines, instead of through drilled wells. The Saginaw water supply system also draws Lake Huron water from a point near Standish, for distribution to Saginaw, parts of Flint and other communities

A regional water system for the Thumb could also include service to Tuscola and Sanilac Counties, says Huron County Economic Development Corp. Director Ralph Iden, who is organizing the meeting. He sees a regional system drawing water from one Lake Huron source, then distributing it via pipelines to participating towns.

## LAKE DEPTH STUDY SET

Scientists will study northern portions of Lake Huron July 21-26 using a battery-powered submarine, to test water quality and view deep-water offshore reefs. Michigan State University zoologist William Cooper says areas near Alpena and Cheboygan will be explored to see why lake trout have been unable to spawn in reefs there.

Final survey data will be reviewed by the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration, which is paying for the first year of this multi-year study, Cooper says. The submarine will use 35-mm cameras and high resolution TV cameras, launched from the 176-foot research vessel Seward Johnson.

Such shortening and reducing of long phrases -- the aforementioned initial-itis -- is common everywhere in the news and it's creeping more and more into our everyday language.

National columnist Russel Baker recently carried such talk to an extreme. Or at least it seems so, initially. He notes:

"Our house current is AC, not DC, but with the AC we can get both AM and FM on the radio. The radio also works without the AC if you put in D batteries. The TV is different.

'First, you plug the TV into the AC and it gives you the VHF. Sometimes you get the UHF, too. The VHF brings you ABC, CBS and NBC, but unless you live in a big city you probably can't get PBS without UHF.

'With the VHF bringing you ABC, CBS and NBC, you learn a lot about GE, GM, IBM and TRW. Also, of course, you can find out what's happening with the USSR, the AFL-CIO, the UN, the UAW, the OAS, NATO, NASA and the Oakland A's.

"That's all right, but for a little more variety you need CATV, which you can also supplement with a VCR. With a VCR you can enjoy the best from L.A., without interruption.

What's more, you can have your choice of G, PG, PG13, R or X. The VCR comes in two alphabets: VHS, which is English, or Beta, which is Greek as in Phi Beta Kappa.

"All this leaves me feeling preety darn queasy, or PDQ..."

Of course, Baker followed such a trend to an extreme. We'd never do such a thing ourselves,

With just a little thought, we've listed more than 20 such cases of "initial-itis" often used right here. In our area and state, we ALL know what 4-H, ASCS, USDA, DHIA, DNR and C of C are, right?

Media-wise, this newspaper's owners refer to it as the P-A. Other papers are known as the DFP, BCT and USA Today, not to mention broadcasting stations WJR, WHNN, WKNX, WNEM, WJRT, CKLW and WEYI.

Local businesses are briefly referred to as the Co-op, TNB, MS, BPSB and NCB (formerly CB). And, never forget those terrible illnesses such as TB, AIDS, M-S and all the rest.

Columnist Baker cites two reasons for such initial-using. He says our expansive technology, science and government have overloaded our language with too many big, hard-to-remember words that we HAVE to shorten them up. Or, he thinks, maybe egghead inventors (who create most of such talk) shorten up such language to keep it usable, to stay "with it."

Both are probably true, but we know another culprit. Headline writers and TV news editors are guilty of initial-itis -- often to make hard-topronounce phrases acceptable in small spaces

Baker says the old mother tongue is anything but A-OK thanks to such initial-itis. But more is certainly to come, instead of less.



I was amused over the back page of last week's paper to see all those people who do not make New Year's resolutions because they would never keep them. Werner Clabusch, how could you?! Of course, don't ask me whether I have the discipline to keep resolutions.

I am sure many of us are simply tired of setting goals only to fall short time after time. No one knows better than a (are you ready for this?) true blue Meeeeeeechigan football fan. For years Michigan football was mediocre at best. The restaurant in the basement of the student union boasted walls of old table tops from years gone by where students carved into wood the entire football schedule with scores for every game.

One year Michigan racked up over 600 points for the season, compared to the opponent's two points. The irony of that season was that the final game was a loss to the University of Chicago by the score of 2 to 0.

But this Michigan football glory was scores of years ago. They were living in the past. The original Rose Bowl (1902) saw Michigan whitewash Stanford 49-0. But since that time the maize and blue saw bowl action only once in the 40s, once in the 50s and once in the 60s, even though they won all of

Enter the age of Bo Schembechler. His first year (1969) saw the upset of #1 ranked Ohio State and I was there (the one with brown socks, if you were watching on television). But just prior to the Rose Bowl that season, Bo suffered a heart attack and his defensive coordinator Jim Young (the guy who coached Army over Illinois on New Year's Eve) took over for the 10 to 3 loss to Southern Cal. The pattern was set.

Bo proceeded to lose his last game of the season year after


