## **EPBP** Board seeks millage hike to offset SEV drop

By RICH SWARTZENDRUBER,

At Monday's regular meeting, Laker School Board decided to ask district voters to approve a 1.5 mills for five years in the June 9 election. That request represents a one-half mill increase, along with renewal of one mill that expired at the end of the 1985 tax year. If approved, the 1.5 mill proposal would expire in 1990.

Superintendent Harry Brunet pointed out State Equalized Valuation (SEV) of farmland in the district will probably drop an average of 10%, representing a \$300,000 decrease in revenue. He said an additional three-quarters of a mill would generate only about \$134,000 to compensate for that loss. The decision by the Board to ask for only a one-half mill increase will result in a bigger bite out of the district's fund equity.

Compare our millage with those of our neighbors, challenged Brunet. He also called passing a millage proposal 'the hardest thing in our profession.'

SEX ED OKAYED: Board approved guidelines for a sex education curriculum for grades 6-12. The program was created by committees representing the elementary, junior high and senior high levels. A film which probably will be shown to sixth grade students was screened at the Board

Elementary Principals Ben Phillips and Lyn Stahl both emphasized parental consent was required for students to view the film. They also encouraged parents to preview the

Brunet suggested the possiblilty of a pilot program this spring to obtain the reactions of a small group of parents and students before instituting the new curriculum district-wide.

INSURANCE WOES: Laker Board learned the district insurance premium was hiked from \$62,000 per year to \$78,000, due to higher contents and facility values. Board approved raising the deductable from \$1,000 to \$5,000 to save five percent of premium costs.

Brunet said the Laker District will further lower its insurance costs by joining with other districts to "pool" claims.

INJUSTICE: Refusal by the Huron Intermediate School District to hire Laker Auto Mechanics Instructor Dave Harmon for the new county skill center drew the wrath of Brunet. Harmon has taught students from schools across the county in the Laker facility for the past eight years

To deny Dave this opportunity is an injustice," Brunet

Harmon, in attendance at the meeting, noted he had the impression he would get the job during the time when support for voter approval of the skill center was sought.

"I guess I more or less worked myself out of job," added Harmon about his work to help turn out a favorable vote on the county skill center.

Board authorized Brunet to sent a letter strongly urging the HISD board to reconsider the matter.

#### STREAMLINE WALLEYE PONDS'

The Greater Saginaw Bay Fishing Consortium wants the state Department of Natural Resources to streamline management of six walleye rearing ponds in or near Saginaw Bay

Consortium members want one biologist to oversee all six ponds -- at Fish Point near Quanicassee, Iosco County, Auburn, Kawkawlin and Au Gres - rather than the present arrangement of three DNR biologists overseeing several. During the past two years, more than 950,000 walleye fingerlings were released into the bay from the ponds.



## We HAD to do something, but...

President Reagan's sudden air attack on port cities in Libya early Monday night is at once a cause for celebration - and also consternation -- for American citizens. Many people rightly feel SOME reaction must be made for terrorist bombings planned, conducted, financed and praised by Libya's Moammar Khadafy. It's just not right that innocent American tourists are blown out of planes to their deaths, or that relaxing U.S. servicemen are blown to bits in a German nightclub.

But is the President's response the right one Can we justify taking "an eye for an eye" and gain needed approval in the rest of the world? Or will we simply be seen as a world giant clubbing a little ant with too big a stick?

More than 30 bombers were sent to make Libya pay a price for its ongoing terrorism. It can probably be expected that future terrorist acts will again be dealt with in such a manner - and the fighting, danger, sorrow and killing goes on and on.

Clearly, something must be done. Nowhere else in the world does a governmental leader openly praise -- and finance -- such senseless activity. And, President Reagan nearly forced himself to do SOMETHING once he had all the boats steaming toward the Libyan coast. It's almost as if he was itching for a fight and simply HAD to have one.

Some people will say such a U.S. reaction is better than no reaction, such as President Carter felt impelled to do when the 53 hostages were seized in Iran. That may be true, but other alternatives exist here and now.

At least one presidential adviser said Libyan

harbors should be mined, as Havana harbor was back in the '60s Cuban missle crisis. That way, no one would be able to use it for economic commerce, to surely hurt Khadafy's government.

The unfortunate sidelight of that action is that the Libyan people are needlessly hurt, too. They haven't got the arms, money, organization or education to work toward Khadafy's overthrow and are caught squarely in the middle. At least with the President's bombings, primary targets were government headquarters.

This is a frustrating time and a potential time bomb of anxiety. Such strikes are giving publicity to a small, deranged band of terrorists -- and it takes the U.S. Air Force, Navy and who knows who else to put them in their place. But, as stated, something has to be done.

Khadafy will not come to his senses, as others may hope. These bombings will continue to make him a hero at home and they'll do nothing but firm up his conviction to keep terrorism on the grow, worldwide.

Maybe the best remedy of all is happening now in Europe. Tourist travel to Egypt, Italy and other countries is down by as much as 90% following such terrorist bombings. Maybe these countries will have to see their own economic pinch hurt even more -- until they come forward to quarantine Khadafy... or annihiliate

Something must be done, but we're just seeing the beginning of trouble, with responses like the President's bombing runs Monday



community, I have been doing a lot of reading and listening on issues relating to the current farm crisis.

Obviously, I am not a farmer. I will never know what the crisis is personally like until I become a farmer. I do not pretend to know everything. But I truly hurt for the hurting.

Nearly three years ago our family moved to Pigeon as directed by our denomination to pastor a church. I had never lived in a farming community before. Unfortunately, no one prepared me for the large cultural shift I had to make in moving here. It is not that one culture is better than the other -just different -- very different.

Some poor folk in the community are still harboring ill feelings because I have been so slow to adjust. Others have dismissed my faux as as typical slowness of city-slickers to learn new ways.

One thing some people did prepare me for prior to moving here was that most farmers like to get together and complain about how bad things are. That bit of information was always accompanied by the advice, "Don't believe a word of it." Even for a city-slicker, it did not take too long to discover

that this advice was not necessarily correct. But my reading this week brought me to an article by a counselor in the farm belt of central Illinois who confirmed that by-and-large farmers really do -- and have for a long time -- like to complain to anyone who will listen about how

This counselor went on to explain that sometimes these complaints were justified and sometimes not. Today these complaints are absolutely justified.

The problem is that the general public has heard farmers complain so much over the good years that any complaining now falls on deaf ears - like the boy who cried wolf so much he could not get anyone to believe him when a wolf actually appeared. Hence, the general public cannot understand why Reagan would fall for the current complaining and offer any kind of federal assistance to farmers.

These are not my observations. These are the observations of one who specializes in crisis counseling with farmers. Further observations he made are worth repeating.

Farmers are usually very private people. They have been reared to be a very independent lot. The seclusion of the work trum in the American work force? Where are our priorities setting adds to the independence and privacy. If a farming family has a problem (e.g. a teenage daughter is pregnant, son is arrested, wife is unfaithful, husband is a drunk, etc.), this VERY private information. The neighbors are not to

Unfortunately, neither is anyone who can help (e.g. the pastor) to know either. Hence, very few farmers ever publicly admit to problems - outside of traditional how bad everyone in farming has it.

The counselor went on to draw some conclusions. He pointed out that the current crisis is aided by the inability of the typical farmer to admit he/she needs help. He points to farmer after farmer who always believed that in times of

In order to be an effective pastor and writer in a farming crisis you just work harder and you will make it. But this is not necessarily true.

There are many aspects to farming that are beyond the farmer's control. Taxation, foreign trade, seed and feed costs, the markets, etc., etc., all add to the obvious uncontrollable factors like the weather which take much of successful farming out of the hands of the hard-working farmer. Working harder does not guarantee success, and many farmers have become disillusioned by it all.

An added factor is seen in the long tradition of family farming. The farm has been handed down generation to generation and the "farm" many times becomes more important than the farmer. This counselor was quick to point out that many farmers should and could be out of a bad farming situation and into a good vocation -- except that the older generation would be heartbroken. So the farmer works for peanuts and drives himself to an early grave.

One point that surprised me greatly was how devisive the slogan "Save the Family Farm" has become. This counselor claims that in many instances the family farm should not be saved for reasons given in the previous paragraph. But saving the "Family Farm" is such a noble American tradition that anyone even thinking of harming such a fine institution as the family farm must hate the flag, motherhood and apple

His final analysis is that if farmers were not so shackled by cultural traditions, family expectations and a stubborn independence that will not admit and learn from failure, then more farmers would by now have sought other employment, thus reducing the product, thus raising the market, thus saving the rest of the farmers from being dragged down with

This is all interesting material and I do not agree with it all But maybe it will free some to take an objective look at what is happening and make a rational life-changing decision for the better . . . whether in farming or not.

My personal position is that it is far better to have too much food than too little. Food is the basis of life. Is it not amazing how those who provide the food for physical life (farmers) and those who provide the food for spiritual and everlasting DEAR EDITOR: life (pastors) are at the lower end of the salary/income specanyway?

Last week Governor James Blanchard signed into law legislation creating the Game and Fish Trust Fund to help boost funding for the state's hunting and fishing

The measure transfers \$8.7 million from existing DNR revenues to establish the trust fund. Future revenues will come from leasing oil and timber rights on state-owned lands, originally paid for with game and fish monies. Only interest on the trust can be used for operating game and fish projects.

## Woods and WATERS

## Spring camping

The State Forest Campground looked deserted as I followed the winding 2-track road back to the river's edge. I wasn't surprised. Springtime in the north woods, with its freezing nights and lingering snow pockets, does little to stir the imagination into sleeping out of doors.

The emptiness only lasted until I round ed the last bend, and there, nestled down by a thick screen of cedars, were 2 tent camps. Where I live, they say you can judge the farming ability of a man by the condition and upkeep of his buildings. That statement could also be used when judging a camper. And with one glance I could readily tell that my new neighbors were, not only experienced, but, enjoyed early season camping as much as I did.

I pulled the truck into a high, level campsite and began the task of putting my weekend home in order. First came the tent. A small, 4-man mountain tent had become my favorite for such outings. It is one of those compact and lightweight backpacking tents that is easy to set up and efficient in all kinds of weather. It is a free-standing tent using an external frame of strong, seamless aluminum tubing which is threaded with shockcords to prevent losing the parts. The tent itself is suspended from the frame by more shockcords that absorb the stress of wind and

rain and keep the tent neat and trim. The tent is made of nylon taffeta. The floor, which extends 12 inches up the sides, is covered with a waterproofing substance that keeps out unwanted moisture, while the roof is breathable to allow perspiration and condensation to escape. The top is fitted with a rain-fly in case of inclement weather, and this extends over the front entrance to create a vestibule for storing gear. My home in the woods measures 7'2' x 8'9" x 58" high. Although it is rated as a 4-man tent, it is much more suited for 1 or 2

Once I had the tent set up I began moving in the furniture. I always lay an old rag rug on the inside of the door. This not only takes away the morning chill from bare feet, but also acts as a shelf to pile up your dirty boots so as not to fill the sleeping quarters with debris. Next come the foam pads. I use 2 of them; a closed cell foam on the bottom, and an open cell foam on top. The closed cell will not act as a conductor for my body heat, and also keeps any unwanted moisture from creeping up into my sleeping bag. I have a couple of different

cooking over a firepit on

sleeping bags, but for this trip I had selected my Polarguard mummy bag. Its formfitting style is perfect for conserving body heat, and the new space-age material used in its construction does not absorb

My light and heat for this spring weekend outing was provided by an alpine candle lantern. It is a simple apparatus used by backpackers to turn a drab evening tent into a cheery, warm, living environment. The lantern collapses into its base when not in use, but after I dug it out and filled it with a large, white candle, I hung it from the ceiling to stand ready at a mo-ment's notice. It is surprising how much heat one of these lanterns can throw, and I prefer them to the smelly and dangerous butane and gasoline alternatives.

The success or failure of early season camping trips depend on your attitude toward the entire situation. Granted, the weather will be anything but balmy, but with a little planning and the basic equipment, you can have a perfect outing in un-

Make sure you have a good tent, sleeping bag, foam pad, some sort of auxiliary heat, plenty of easyto-fix, wholesome, food, and the proper cold weather clothes. Although not necessary, a ready-for-anything attitude does wonders for turning any event into a memorable spring camping experience.




