


July 4th marks our country's 210th anniversary. How do you plan to celebrate or observe this July 4th and the Statue of Liberty dedication?





Highlights of the week-long event included a mock world of politics where students could run for state and county offices and participated in voter registration, political campaigns, party conventions, rallies, primaries and general elections.

FB supports soybean vote

CARO -- Michigan Farm Bureau's executive committee and boards of directors in 2 counties have voted to support the Michigan Soybean Promotion Committee's request in the June 30-July 12 referendum for soybean growers. The proposal is consistent with Farm Bureau policy, said Tuscola County FB President Barry Hedley of Unionville, as it provides for a producer referendum and a refund of assessment.

The ballot will include 2 questions, Hedley said. One will ask growers if they want the Soybean Promotion and Development Program to continue, and the 2nd will offer the option of continuing the program, but increasing the checkoff to one cent per bushel, an increase from one-half cent per bushel.

Rural ROUND-UP

PORK VOTE: Huron County pork producers are voting July 7 through 11 to help choose individuals for appointment to an industry promotion and research group.

The U.S. Agriculture Department Secretary will select candidates receiving the highest number of votes from each state to serve on the National Pork Producers Delegate Body, consisting of 165 members -- responsible for administering the pork order.

Co-op Extension Area Livestock Agent Gary Weber says voting will take place in the Extension Office, 104 County Building, Bad Axe, from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. for pork producers. Votes will be counted July 15, at the USDA's Ag Stabilization and Conservation Service office in Bad Axe.

150TH & AG: Agriculture was highly visible at the Michigan Sesquicentennial kick-off parade in Lansing June 14.

On display were many items, including the world's largest blueberry muffin (four feet in diameter, weighing 975 lbs., containing 195 lbs. of blueberries, and taking 7 1/2 hours to bake).

A "Taste Michigan" group of booths featured food samples, including Farm Bureau affiliate Michigan Ag Cooperative Marketing Association giving away ice cream sundaes -- and more than 100 gallons of ice cream were topped with 540 lbs. of strawberries and more than 100 pounds of cherries.

The parade through downtown Lansing featured agriculture, too, with a six-horse hitch pulling a huge basket overflowing with Michigan-grown commodities and the "Say Yes! to Michigan farm products" signs. Plus, a "sheep to shawl" demonstration was featured, as were petting zoos with baby goats, sheep, chickens, geese, rabbits, horses and cows.

This is just the beginning of the 18-month 150th celebration. To learn more about agriculture's role in the sesquicentennial, contact the Sesquicentennial Commission office in Lansing at 482-1987.

SHEEP DOGS: Have you ever tried Baa-B-Q Lamb and Sheep Dogs (lamb brat-wurst)?

Both foods will be featured this Friday and Saturday at the '86 Thumb Area Lamb and Fiber Affair, at the Huron Community Fairgrounds south of Bad Axe.

Booths featuring and selling natural fiber products, sheep equipment plus spinning and weaving items will be offered, according to Extension Ag Agent Jim LeCureux. Admission is free.

Featured will be a "Crittter to Creation" demonstration, showing the full circle of wool. A sheep will be sheared, the fleece carded and spun and woven into a shawl. Demonstrations and seminars will also be

featured, as will a Junior Showmanship Contest, Jackpot Lamb Show for 4-H and FFA members and other events.

The Lamb and Fiber Affair is presented by the Thumb Sheep Breeders, Thumb Fiber Friends, Northern Angora Goat Ranchers Cooperative, American Sheep Producers Council and the Extension Service.

AGRI SALES BUYS: Agri Sales, Inc. -- which operates 19 country elevators in the

Thumb and Central Michigan -- has purchased the 2.6-million bushel grain terminal at Grand Ledge, west of Lansing. David Nicewicz will remain as elevator manager, and the facility will operate in Agri Sales' Minor Walton Bean Division.

Agri Sales, based in Saginaw, also has unit train loading terminals at Gilford and Battle Creek, plus five dry edible bean elevators in North Dakota and Minnesota, plus a seed processing plant in Idaho.

FOSDICK NAMED: Steve Fosdick of Elkton has been elected to the Board of Directors of the Michigan Grain Elevator and Processing Society (GEAPS), for 1986.

Fosdick, of Co-op Elevator Company's Elkton Plant, is one of four Board members voted into office recently. GEAPS is an international education technical society for persons interested in safe, efficient grain handling.

WASTE MEET: MSU's Cooperative Extension Service will offer a series of training programs statewide, to inform community leaders about solid waste disposal options.

The training sessions will begin next spring in eight locations, with dates to be announced. The meetings are for government officials, private industry people and civic leaders to learn about solid waste composting, recycling and incineration programs.

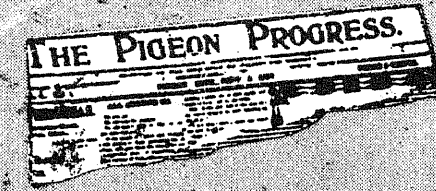

JULY 4, 1935

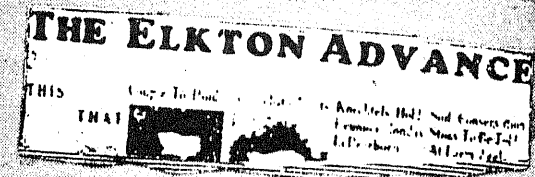

Mitin joined State Farm in 1977. He has been a Millionaire Club member three times.

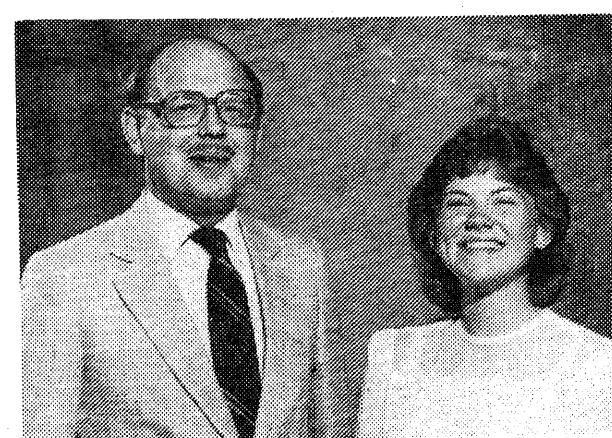

The award, presented June 16 at College Week on the Michigan State University campus, honors an Extension volunteer for outstanding service to the Cooperative Extension Service's Home Economics program area.

Mrs. Warren has been a Cooperative Extension Service volunteer since 1978, when she began serving as a 4-H leader in Lapeer County.

She has taught at "Learn and Lead," an Extension Home Economics statewide leadership conference, for three years.

Mrs. Warren is married to James Warren and has two children, Jennifer, 15 and Jim, 17. She says she enjoys her volunteer work immensely, estimating that she spends about 20 hours per week in various volunteer activities.

She says that much of the credit for the award goes to her children and husband, whose support makes her participation possible.

SHARING THE BAD NEWS
One of the greatest dilemmas in medical care is whether or not to inform a patient of his or her terminal diagnosis. Physicians, in general, display a terrible reluctance to share the bad news. Often, the patient's family and the doctor will conspire to protect the patient from what will be too overwhelming a revelation.
This approach is being seriously questioned and re-examined. To begin with, most dying patients don't need to be told they are dying. They are somehow aware of their condition. Then there is the matter of the patient's right to know. Whose life is it anyway?
As for the impact on the patient, this too is being questioned. There may be a few individuals who would truly prefer not to be aware of having a fatal illness; or who, if told, would be adversely affected. On the other hand, the anxiety of NOT knowing, for many people, is harder than the truth.




