



Stamp collecting: A fun, valuable hobby

SWARTZENDRUBER Every day across America, the doorways of Post Offices are darkened by philatelists.

Do these people have an unusual attraction to junk mail? Are they there to scrutinize the wanted

The philatelists (better known as stamp collectors) are probably just there to stamps issued by the U.S. Postal Service.

If the person on your Christmas list "has everything," an inexpensive gift - such as a listing of U.S. stamps, a stamp collection album or even a set of all new stamps issued this year - could launch a new hobby for that individual.

Even if the person receiving a gift of newly issued stamps isn't interested in starting a collection, the gift can always be used to send thank-you notes for the pre-

"Stamp collecting is a cheap, economical, family oriented hobby," says Paul Lang of Caseville.

As one of over 100,000 members of the American Philatelic Society, Lang can attest to the popularity of the

"(Philately) has been big ever since the first stamp was issued," says Lang enthusiastically

The APS was founded in 1886, shortly after the first American postage stamp was issued in 1847. That followed soon after creation of postage stamps in 1840 as part of reforms in the British

HISTORY: Those who are dissatisfied with postal service today can be thankful the postage stamp was invented. Prior to that time people sending letters paid nothing while the recipients paid cash-on-delivery.

At the present time, millions of people take no notice of the small patches of paper which are the objects of great interest of collec-

As happens when any type of object is collected, some varieties are very valuable while others' only value is in the sentiment of the collec-

Supply and demand is what gives particular stamps value, Lang says. When a type of stamp is rare, it usually increases in value, but only if there is a

tremely rare stamps command the top prices at auctions, Lang says. He notes that the most valuable stamp in the world at the present time was discovered by a 10-yard-old British boy in his grandmother's attic.

It is not the first stamp ever issued, but rather a oneof-a-kind stamp now worth over \$1 million

Printing errors on stamps rarely escape detection before sale to the public, so such varieties are also

One sheet of stamps honoring former U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammerskiold slipped through postal inspectors with one color off center. When the buyer refused to return the unique stamps, the Postal Service purposly printed a huge quantity of the stamps with the "error," which devalued

the misprinted stamps. "If you see a mistake on a stamp, be quiet, take it home, then contact a reputable stamp dealer," advises Lang.

MORE THAN FUN: Three factors contribute to the positive impact of stamp collecting, according to Lang -enjoyment, education and in-

The enjoyment provided by the hobby is obvious when the number of amateur and advanced collectors is considered. The educational aspects are less evident, but just as real, he adds. Stamps commemorate im-

portant individuals or events in history. By becoming aware of the history behind particular stamps, colletors expand their base of knowledge

They are usually bought by collectors Lang terms "finicky" who settle for only perfect stamps for their collection. They say "My tastes are simple. I just require the best" Lang observes.

WHERE TO START: The local Post Office is usually a good starting point. On sale there is the reference book, "The Postal Service Guide to U.S. Stamps," which contains color photos of every postage stamp issued in the

A bear too close

I was feeling depressed. The last plane load returning to camp that night had jumped a grizzly on Sunflower Creek, and Doyle, the pilot and owner of the camp, had treated Mike and Charlie to a bird's eye view by buzzing the bear as he beat his retreat into the protection of the willows. Around the supper table that night the talk

I pouted a little, and felt left out. If there was one experience I wanted during my first fishing trip to Alaska, it was to see a grizzly bear. Later that night crawling into bed, my head spun from the bear stories. After falling into a fitful sleep my dream world became filled with fruitless escapes from giant bears, while running on numbfeeling legs, and climbing trees that offered no branches. Sometime in the middle of the night, I was awakened by the furious barking of Nikkie, the camp husky, but I dismissed it as a common occurence and soon fell asleep.

The next morning, Ryan told of a grizzly coming into camp and strolling down the runway. He had heard Nikkie also, but being a permanent resident of this wild and free country, he was able to distinguish the tone of urgency in the dog's voice, and was able to witness the bear from the safety of the cabin. Another missed chance I thought to myself. Would I ever see a grizz-

Three days later, Rudy, Tim, Milan, Jim and I decided to spend the afternoon fishing Sockeyes at the upper reaches of Chelatna Lake. We had flown in from camp earlier that morning and after a robust lunch at the lake lodge, boarded a couple of prams and headed for Coffee Creek which spilled down from the formidable wall of mountains that made up the eastern boundary of Denali National Park.

The trip would only take us about 3 miles from the lodge, and when Jim asked for a rifle, one of the guides mentioned that it wouldn't be necessary for we would be fishing at the mouth of the stream and very near the boats

"If you see a bear," our guide laughed, "just jump in the boat.



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

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
