3 Lakers lead '87 Thumb B Academic Team

Three Elkton - Pigeon Bay Port "Laker" Hi School students have placed in the top eight positions of the Thumb B All-Conference Academic Team, as announced jointly today by the eight member schools.

Robert Bannick, Christy Licht and Kathy Clabuesch represent the Laker High Class of 1987 in listing on the area-wide scholars' squad. They were chosen in calculations recognizing grade-point average, ACT testing figures and a scoring system patterned after the statewide one used by the Detroit Free Press in choosing Michigan's top academic scholars each year.

In all, 40 top local students were chosen for First Team, Second Team and Honorable Mention categories. The area-wide listing precedes the naming of most valedictorians, salutatorians, class leaders, scholarship winners

and other recognition. This is the second year high school principals and other school officials from the eight Thumb B Association school districts have chosen top scholars, as a way of recognizing outstanding academic performance.



A proposal of a "pay to play" sports program was suggested by Norm Nelson if the millage fails. The issue will be studied if the cuts take place, Baur said.

BARE BONES: Board member Paul Clabuesch pointed out the six-hour day was the only "frill" that would exist outside the state mandated programs if those cuts would be made. He went on to say that even with those cuts, district expenses would exceed revenues by \$500,000 if no millage increase passed

He predicted the Laker district would run out of money before Christmas and be forced to close the doors until new tax money was received in January

PAST EXPERIENCE: Wes Murdoch of Bay Port was the first of five former Laker Board members to address the Board and a crowd of about 100 people at the meeting. Murdoch noted he is one of two remaining members of the first Board of the consolidated school district

"As far as I'm concerned there's only one way to vote - to support out kids. This is the time we really have to step up and show our courage and our efforts toward the children of the school district," said Murdoch.

Former Laker Board President Merlin Farver also reminded those present, "Someone educated all of us at one time and now it's time to repay that debt.'
