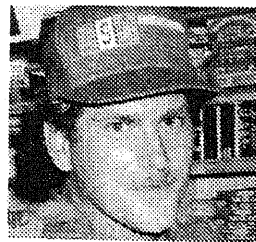

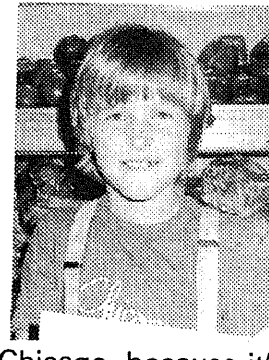

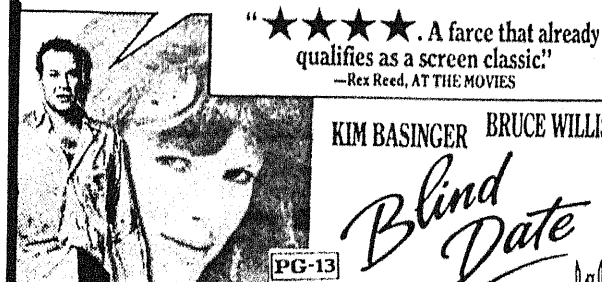

Flag flies
over Co-op
for Valkoun

The flag flying over the Cooperative Elevator Company on Memorial Day will be in honor of Anthony Valkoun, given by John and Dianne Kohr of Pigeon.



Anthony Valkoun

Valkoun was born in Dubno, Russia in 1894. Because of the revolutionary conditions and the growing popularity of the Bolshevik Party (which was to become the All Russian Communist Party in 1918), he left Russia for the United States.

He settled in Cleveland, Ohio and became a butcher. When the U.S. entered World War I, he enlisted in the army on May 25, 1918 and served until May 19, 1919 as an infantryman. One way to entice men into the army was to promise citizenship to aliens, so in July, 1918 while stationed in Georgia, he became a U.S. citizen. Valkoun served in France from July 1918 until April 1919 with the American Expeditionary Force. He was the famous Meuse-Argonne Offensive where 1,200,000 American soldiers fought and one of every 10 were killed or wounded.

He later moved to Caseville and became a farmer. He married Anna Liska and lived there until his death.

The annual June picnic will be conducted at the hall.

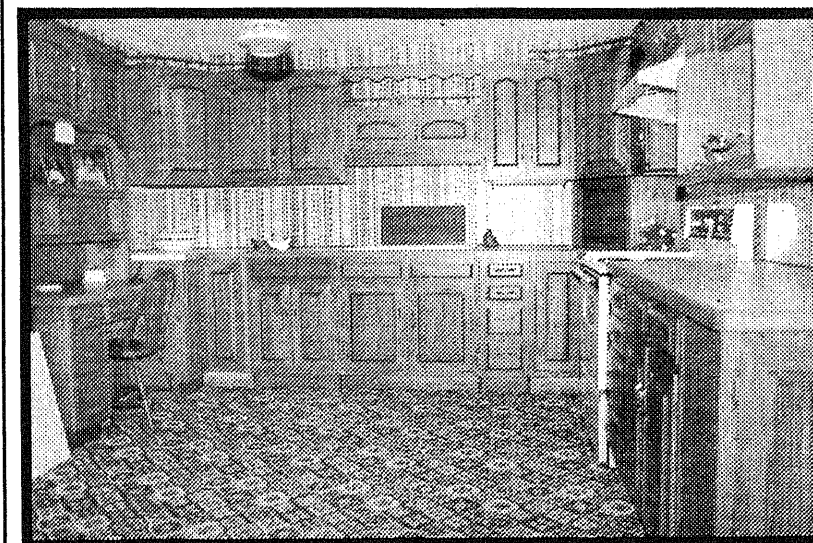

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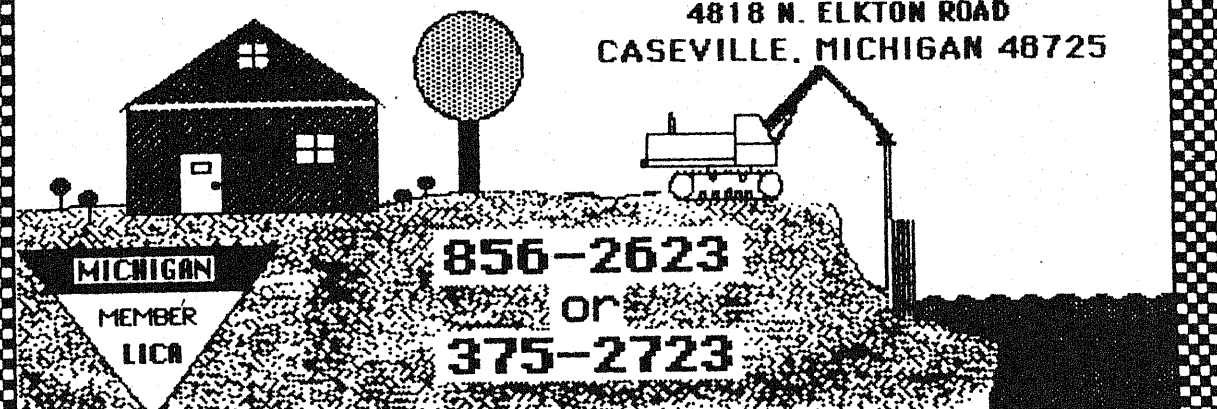
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Memorial Parades in Bay Port, Pigeon

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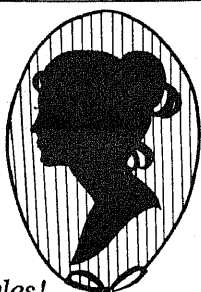
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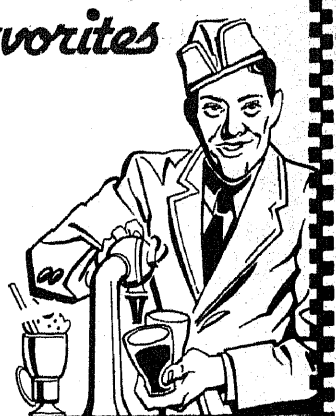
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
