





Thumb Weekly News Round-Up

TOURISM BOOSTERS START

The Thumb Area Tourism and Recreation Council laid the groundwork last week for its plans to market Huron, Tuscola, Sanilac and Lapeer Counties to tourists. In the four-county group's first meeting, officers were elected and bylaws

established for future operations.

Thumb Growth Alliance Manager Carl Osentoski is the Council's new chairman, and Huron City Museum Director Chuck Scheffner is vice chairman of the 21-member group.

Four subcommittees -- marketing, finance, strategic planning and education -- will meet periodically to establish a theme and series of goals to "help promote the Thumb as a travel and recreation area for the state," Osentoski says.

Huron County Council members are Scheffner of Huron Civ.George Beadle of Caseville, Chris Duffey of Port Austin, Bob Brobst of Harbor Beach and Huron County EDC Director Ralph Iden of Bad Axe. The overall group will next meet on Tuesday, Aug. 25, in Marlette.

NEW IMAGE FOR BREWERY

The former Geyer Brothers Brewing Company is being readied for new life as Frankenmuth Brewery, Inc., as \$3 million in renovations continue.

Fred Schumacher, president of the brewery which was sold to Ervin Industries, Ann Arbor, for \$365,000 in May, says the project will provide brewing capacity up to 50,000 barrels a year -- that's 1.5 million gallons of foamy beer. Speciality beers will be produced, including seasonable brews such as Octoberfest beer and Christmas beer.

When renovations are complete, the M-83 Main Street brewery will have picture windows so Frankenmuth passersby can watch operations from the sidewalk,

FAIRGROVE MAN GUILTY

Bryan S. Huizar, 27 of Fairgrove, remains in the Bay County Jail without bond, after he was found guilty last week of sexual assault in an Aug. 17 incident involving a Bangor Township woman in her home.

Huizar faces a maximum penalty of life in prison, following the Bay County Circuit Court jury trial before Judge Eugene Penzien. Huizar has also admitted to at least one prior felony conviction, a larceny in Tuscola County, Bay County officials

No sentencing date was set, pending background reports and reports from the probation department.







This week's topic: Food for Camping

When it comes time for camping, too many people visualize the grub list as a package of hot dogs and a bag of marshmallows. With just a little foresight, preparing food on a camping trip can be an adventure in the culinary world.

For the sake of this article, I would like to divide my camping styles into 2 classes: backpacking, and canoe or boat camping. When it comes to food planning and preparation, I have purposely left out the motor homes, 5th wheels, and trailer houses, and even tent trailers. The reason being is all of these come equipped with refrigerators. gas or electric stoves, ovens, and even microwaves. With a kitchen outfitted in this manner, no special food planning or preparation is necessary.

The backpacker must do the greatest planning when it comes to food for his camping trip. Not only must he select and prepare wholesome and tasty meals, but he must also carry all the food on his back. Colin Fletcher, author of the popular backpacking book, "The Complete Walker", has solved the "what should I cook freeze-dried foods at a camper's disposal. problem" by eating the same 3 meals for breakfast, lunch and supper on every trip. Although this might be carrying it a bit too far, he certainly has mastered his food list.

The food list, or what you are going to eat this trip, is the most important part of the camping trip. Advanced meal planning takes the guess work out of your daily routine, and best of all, you're never stumped for an answer when the kids cry, "What's for supper?" A simple list for the backpacker heading

out for an overnight jaunt may go some-thing like this: Breakfast, Day 1: (you can even label the package this way so there is no mixup on the trail) Western omelet. sourdough biscuits, bacon bar, orange juice and coffee. Lunch, Day 1: chicken stew, cheese and crackers, fruit punch, fudge brownie. Dinner, Day 1: Lasagna, meat bar, pilot bread, lemon pie and tea. Sound kind of fancy? If it does, you haven't visited your favorite backpacking store lately and looked over the array of

Try it sometime and you will be surprised that your backpacking menu is controlled only by your imagination. The canoe camper is faced with a little

different situation. He can, if he chooses, pack the same sort of food that the backpacker buys. But, since weight is not so critical, and a small cooler can be carried quite comfortably in a canoe, this type of camping usually relys more on fresh food. A fishing pole may help supplement the larder, but I have found out long ago it's

camper carries all of his food, and maybe a meal or two extra, just in case. A breakfast of bacon and eggs, fried up in a cast-iron skillet can't be beat for a morning on the river. Topped off with a bubbling coffee pot, it will keep your motor racing, or your paddles dipping, all day

not wise to bank on this. The smart canoe

Lunch can be hearty ham and cheese sandwiches topped with lettuce, and tomatoes, made up at breakfast time so

preparation is at a minimum when you stop for your noontime meal. Apples, oranges or some other type of fruit will top off the sandwich, and you can wash it down with a Coke or your favorite beverage.

Supper should be your biggest meal Perhaps steaks, grilled over a hardwood fire, with potatoes wrapped in foil tossed into the coals. A vegetable, or tossed salad would be a nice accoutrement, and you could end it with a couple of candy bars or some more fruit.

Keeping meals simple, and preparation time to a minimum is essential lest your camping trip becomes a work camp. If your little woman does all the work, she is sure to grumble. I found it's always best to pitch in, or even to take over a couple of the meals by yourself. Tell her to take a walk in the woods, or entertain the kids while you're fixing supper. It does wonders the next time you want to go fishing and the lawn needs mowing.




