The Elkton-Pigeon-Bay Port Lakers will face stiff competition this Saturday, Nov. 7 when they meet Detroit Country Day on their home turf at 2 p.m.



HOW TO GET THERE: Laker buses will be taking students to the Country Day game Saturday. Those interested in driving may pick up maps at the Laker High School office any time

Country Day's football field is located at the school's main campus just west of Royal Oak in Beverley Hills. It's on the southwest corner of Lahser Road and 13 Mile, one mile east of Telegraph (M-24).

To get there, take I-75 south to Square Lake Road, travel west about two miles to southbound Telegraph Road (M-24) (Watch for "southbound" signs).

Follow Telegraph south to 13 Mile, turn left (east) to the corner of Lahser and 13 Mile. Ample parking is located at the field.

At a public hearing last Thursday, a group of about 45 residents reacted favorably to details of a proposed sewage treatment system for Caseville.

William Potter, PE of Wolverine Engineers and Surveyors, Inc. reported on the project report that is required for Environmental Protection Agency approval.

The report outlines problems with septic systems in the Caseville area and lists several options for types of sewer sytems that could be installed and cost estimates for each.

THE PROBLEM: Potter said investigations of Huron County Health Department records and a survey in the Caseville indicate problems with 200 of the 712 business and residence locations, which represents 28% of the village, Potter says.

He cites problems such as slow drainage, odors from drainage fields, standing water over drainage fields and con-

tamination of storm sewers with sewage as evidence of the

need for a municipal sewage system in Caseville.

He adds that inclusion of septic systems on Beadle Island raised the rate of failed and problem sewage systems to 33% in the village.

'Most of the septic systems on Beadle Island are at or very near the lake level. Which means that the treatment you usually get in a septic system by waste water filtering through soil until it reaches the ground water table doesn't happen because the ground water table is right there.

"The waste water that flows through the drain field gets virtually no treatment before it reached the ground water table." Potter says.

THE RESPONSE: He pointed out Caseville village and Michigan Department of Natural Resources officials reachthat the Michigan Water ''mutual agreement'' Resources Commission should issue an "Order of Determination" (which is similar to a court order) which directs the village to solve their sewage disposal problems by December of 1992.

That action raises Caseville on the priority list of applicants for federal government grants under the EPA Clean

Water Act. The exact share of the project which would be paid by a federal grant would depend on what portion of the village would qualify for funds and other factors. Federal funds would pay for 55% of the parts of the system which qualify if the Caseville grant application was accepted.

THE SOLUTION: Four different types of treatment facilities were outlined in the report as options for wastewater treat-

Mechanical: This system would involve a mechanical facility to filter and chlorinate the water. It would not require much land but would require a costly facility and more labor to

Irrigation lagoons: This option would require more land but little labor in the form of lagoons in which bacteria would treat the wastewater. The treated water would be used to irrigate adjacent farmland, which would have to be leased over a long period.

River discharge lagoons: This option would be similar to the other lagoon system. The difference would be discharge into Pigeon River rather than use of spray irrigation.

Pressure system: This system would be buried at less than the up to push sewage from private septic tanks to one of two

The liquid would be injected into a seepage bed. Each private septic tank in town would have to be pumped every

THE COST: Potter estimated construction costs of each option at \$4.218 million for the mechanical system, \$4.427 million for the lagoons with spray irrigation, \$4.189 million for the lagoons with river discharge and \$4.767 million for the pressure system.

The engineering firm recommends the option of the lagoons with river discharge based on lower construction and the fact that the village will also own the land which would actually increase in value while other options would depreciate.

HOW FINANCING IS POSSIBLE: Potter gave several possibilities for financing the lagoon option, based on different portions of federal funding.

If 80% of the sewage system qualified for federal funds, the federal share would be about \$1.87 million compared to \$2.3 million to be raised locally. The local amount would break down to about \$2,500 per residence or \$57 per quarter for 20 years based on 6% interest.

If only the the treatment works qualified for the federal

funding, the federal share would be \$766,000 and the local share would be \$3.4 million. Tht would raise each resident's share to \$3,400 or about \$81 per quarter for 20 years.

A third possibility would be if no federal funds were authorized. In that case each residence share would be \$6,300 or about \$100 per quarter for 20 years. Potter said he doesn's expect that to happen, and such a situation would be considered a hardship and qualify for other government assistance.

He also noted that fees would likely be adjusted for commercial or industrial firms in the village as well as owners of vacant.

Several considerations for rate adjustment could include: a tap in fee; a use fee based on the amount of waste water entering the sewage system from each hoop-up and a fee for each frontage foot of property in the village.

PRIME LOCATION?: The best area pinpointed in the report for location of the three lagoons would be just south of Caseville. URGENT NEED: Potter pointed out Caseville wants to move

swiftly on the matter in an attempt to obtain a federal grant as soon as possible. At the present time, the EPA Clean Water Act grant program is scheduled to end in two years.

HELPING NEIGHBORS: Because some Caseville Township residents who live near the village might want to hook into the system at a later date, extra capacity will be built into the lagoon system. Potter said a reserve capacity of 15% above the Caseville population projection for the year 2010 will be





THUMB PRISON SITE AGAIN?

Several Tuscola County leaders are proposing the county again get in the running to house the 612-bed medium security regional state prison being opposed by Saginaw

Tuscola Commissioner Michael Green (R-Mayville) is a leader in the new attitude toward locating the prison in the Caro Area, already home to the minimum-security Camp Tuscola. If Saginaw County's Tittabawassee Township residents keep fighting over locating the \$42 million prison near Freeland, "we might stand a chance of getting it again," said Tuscola Commissioner William Worth (R-Millington).

State officials have plans to build such a prison in the area composed of Huron, Tuscola, Sanilac, Bay, Saginaw and Midland Counties. First site choice was near Freeland, but that has moved to another location due to opposition, and the second spot is now under review.

"In spite of concerns being raised, we've made the determination to focus in on the Pierce Road site in Freeland. says state Corrections Department Deputy Directory James Curran, "We can no longer let the situation go where other people determine what our schedule and timing is.

VETERANS' HOME FOR THUMB? State Sen. James Barcia (D-Bay City) has introduced

legislation seeking a feasibility study to determine the need for a veterans' nursing home in the Thumb.

Sen. Barcia says 48,650 veterans are living in the five county Thumb Area of Huron, Tuscola, Sanilac, Bay and Saginaw Counties. About 40% of that group served in World War II and are growing closer to the age when they'll need extended medical care - and Michigan's only veterans' long term facilities are in Grand Rapids and Marquette.

He said Clifford Bates of Sebewaing and former State Sen Alvin DeGrow of Pigeon approached him with the idea of a veterans' long-term facility in the Thumb. Bates is a member of the board of managers overseeing the Marquette and Grand Rapids facilities. Marquette houses 192 patients and Grand Rapids 700. A Thumb facility would be in between, planners say.

Construction would be financed with state and federal funds, and annual operating costs of about \$3 million would be paid by the state, Sen. Barcia says. The legislation was referred to the Senate Committee on Local Government and Veterans. If approved, the study would be presented to the Legislature by March 1, 1988, after preparation by the Michigan Veterans Trust Fund.

JORDAN COLLEGE GROWING Plans have been announced to double the size of Jordan College's Thumb campus, as it is relocated to a new 12,000-sq.

ft. building in Cass City during the next year. Thumb Campus Dean Jerry White says the 200 students now taking college classes in a leased building on Rescue Road southwest of Bad Axe could move into a new facility by August. It will feature a library to be used by the public, as well as Jordan students, he says. And, the prime five-acre

Today, 26 drivers in 30 trucks make 4500 package deliveries daily, according to Manager Jack Baker. Also, a full-time clerk, full-time mechanic and 15 part-time loaders handle the volume in the new facility at 6254 Division Street.

WATER MEETING SET NOV. 10

THANKS FOR AID: Friday night, Lakers appreciated the talent on the Pirate squad for two reasons



November-December issue of the Michigan Natural My heart raced as I peeked out the office window and watched a large flock of geese treading back and forth over a field of cut corn across the road. The rain that fell in a drizzle most of the morning had intensified slightly by mid-afternoon and, by the sound of the drumming on the hallway skylight, had turned into a sleet-like mix ture. The clock on the wall still indicated an hour left in the work day, but my goose hunting brain had begun making mental

calculations for the evening hunt.
On my way home where I would pick up my gear and change clothes I passed the field I had been hunting this season. The corn was still standing, although now under dark laden skies. The rye field, soon to be plowed under, glistened a vivid green in the fading afternoon light. But what really caught my attention was the small really caught my attention was the small flock of Canadas hovering over the rye patch, wings cupped and feet outstretched. Instinctively, my foot exerted a little more pressure on the gas pedal.

The lane was much too muddy to chance the company of the company

driving my pickup a little nearer the cornfield, so I parked beside the barn and hoisted a packboard full of decoys to my shoulders and began the long, trudge to my

By the time I reached my hunting site, the geese I had spotted earlier were gone, but other flocks craned their necks and honked unmercifully as the decoy spread began to take shape. At one point, when I lifted my head to take a breather, I was startled by a couple of Mallards who were bent on landing among their larger cousins. It turned out they were the startled ones, and they beat a hasty retreat when I made a grab for the gun.

With the decoys set, I retreated to the first row of standing corn and rigged the wiregrass blind I had left behind the night before. The blind was simple, woven in a piece of fishnet, it measured 4 feet by 8 feet. Propped against the rigid cornstalks and wrapped around on the upwind side, the blind not only concealed me from incoming birds but also offered a little protection from the biting wind which was wicked tonight. A 5-gallon pail, also left the night before, became my seat and I soon was nestled in the L-shaped structure and began the task of scanning the skies.

First, I looked toward the northwest. That was the direction of the Bay, and during storms, like the one descending now. the geese fled the wild water and searched for protective feeding sites inland. The sky

was void of birds in the northwest. Next I focused on the northeast. Here. geese from the farmland were constantly moving from field to field looking for the succulent kernels of corn left by the pickers. The sky was void of birds in the

northeast. It was silly to look for birds in the southern skies, for with the strong southwest winds, all incoming birds had to approach the decoys from a northerly direction. This allowed them the braking power needed for a landing, and it also directed them right over my blind. I sneaked a peek to the north and all I got was a face full of

For the next 2 hours there wasn't a goose in the sky. I recalled an old saying that compared policemen and combat soldiers. It is said that both their jobs entail endless hours of boredom punctuated by a few seconds of sheer terror. Perhaps the saying should also include goose hunters.

The rain had now turned to snow and I dug my head closer to my chest trying to escape the probing, icy crystals slashing at the back of my parka. The noise it produced sounded almost like the chatter of

geese. Or was that geese?

I was instantly alert. Through the din that only an October sleet storm can make in a standing cornfield, came the unmis-takable honking of a flock of geese. I blew a couple of responds through the hollow, wooden tube hanging around my neck and chanced a peek skyward.

About 25 geese were zeroed in on my decoys and by the looks of their outstretched necks and cupped wings their minds were made up. Just then another clamor across, and peeking through the slats of the blind I caught a glimpse of 7 more birds hovering over my decoys.

As I slowly brought up my shotgun, a thought ran through my mind. Like the policeman and combat soldier, my hours of boredom were over, but unlike them, instead of terror, my few seconds would be






