Three days of old-fashioned good times and family fun are nearly ready to roll as Sebewaing prepares the 24th annual Michigan Sugar Festival, scheduled for Friday through Sunday, June 17-19.

From the sidewalk sales at 9 a.m., Friday, to the traditional Farmers vs. Merchants baseball game on Sunday evening, the entire weekend is packed with activities for children of all ages.

ON FRIDAY, French Pastry Chef Philippe Vandorne will be on hand to judge a Best Apple Pie Baking Contest, and square dancers will shuffle to the cadence of caller Finn Burk. News 5 Weatherman Mike Hoffman plans to broadcast directly from the Sugar Festival at 6:15 p.m.

Coronation of the "Sweetest Girl in the World" will take place on Friday evening, after what has come to be a tremendously popular event, the third annual Lip Sync Contest. The 1988 Sugar Queen will receive a \$500 US Savings Bond, reign over remaining Festival activities and represent Michigan Sugar Company throughout the next year.

SATURDAY MORNING, bright and early, runners will lace up for the four-mile Sugar Festival Road Race, followed at mid-morning by a block-long bed race. Firemen begin dishing up their famous chicken barbecue just before noon, and after lunch, visitors and hometown residents alike will sit back to watch the 24th annual Michigan Sugar Festival Parade.

Children again have the limelight with a kiddie tractor pedal pull in the late afternoon, and just before the dinner hour, 10-year-old Michael Burgett, Sebewaing's "Littlest Engineer," hopes to open his already famous train caboose.

Music and sand are the major ingredients for a beach party that night, with DJ Bryce Wilson spinning hits from the 50s, 60s and 70s.

SUNDAY begins with a community worship service, featuring guest speaker Ray Clendenan, executive director of Teen Ranch. Afternoon activities consist of baseball and basketball games, ranging from a little girls' Pigtail League to a grudge match between City Gals and Country Gals.



## A 1988 Memorial Day Memory Former P.O.W. will never forget...

When Otis Fritz of Elkton receives his Bronze Medal from the federal government in the coming months, it will be an occasion he has waited for over the past 48 years.

A World War II veteran and former Prisoner of War (P.O.W.) for 27 months, Fritz is the recipient of three medals, and has just learned that he has the Army's second highest medal of honor — the Bronze Medal — coming to him.

In addition to that coveted honor, Fritz earned the Good Conduct Medal, the American Defense Service ribbon and the European African Medal in his 52 months of service.

PAINFUL MEMORIES: While Fritz harbors no grudges towards the United States that had sent him to war as a 26-year-old Elkton native

then working in Detroit, his voice today speaks roughly of the Germans who captured him for over two years and killed many of his war buddies.

"With a last name like 'Fritz,' they treated me pretty rotten," said Fritz of his captivity which spanned years of 1942 to 1945.

He and his unit were in North Africa holding up the weakest spot when the Germans marched through and captured the unit.

Fritz and the other captives were kept in barbed wire entanglements with trained guard dogs at a prison camp located about 55 kilometers south of Berlin along the Rural River.

SOME DIED: Several of his fellow prisoners died, mostly of malnutrition, and Fritz himself plummeted from a

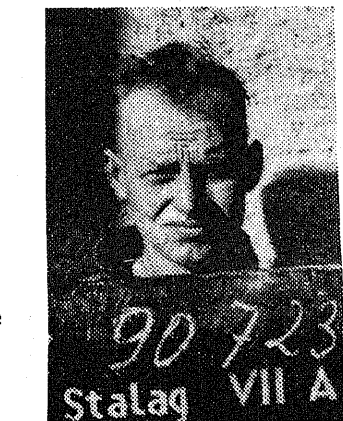
robust 193 lbs. down to a skeletal 117 lbs.

The malnutrition took its toll, and Fritz lost almost all of his hair in addition to losing nearly half his body weight.

At the end of the war when the Germans left, the Russians liberated the P.O.W.'s, including Fritz — and one of his first acts as a free man was to raid the German camp offices. There, he found his P.O.W. records and a German photograph taken of him.

"It's the only one in the

state that I know of," says Fritz, talking about his P.O.W. picture, which is published with this story.

GOING HOME: The newly-freed captives had to endure a 100-mile forest march, then were flown to France before returning to the United States.

"While being taken by train after our liberation, we saw where the millions of Jews were exterminated at Auschwitz," says Fritz.

STILL PROUD: While the horrors of war were real and an everyday occurrence, Fritz says he feels good about what he did in the war. "I didn't do it for myself," he says. "I did it for you, and you and you," he says of his fellow countrymen.

Fritz considers himself very patriotic and is espe-

cially appreciative of local Veterans of Foreign Wars posts, as well as former Huron County Veterans' Affairs Director Jack Smith's efforts on his behalf.

### TWO SCHOLARS LEAD STATE'S '88 ACADEMIC STUDENTS

Marc Babich of Caro High and Margaret Rummel of Frankenmuth High are two of the top 50 students honored Sunday in the sixth annual Academic All-Stars, as co-sponsored by the Michigan Association of Secondary School Principals and the Detroit Free Press.

Babich, son of Gene and Deanna Babich of Caro, plans to study engineering and later work for NASA. Miss Rummel, daughter of John and Mary (Scheurer) Rummel of Frankenmuth, plans to enroll at the University of Michigan in pre-medicine. She is the granddaughter of Clara Scheurer and the late Dr. Clare A. Scheurer of Pigeon and Walter and Margretta Rummel of Sebewaing.

Other area students receiving Honorable Mention recognition include: CLASS C — Carol Hast of Unionville-Sebewaing Area High, Troy Rapson of Bad Axe High, Mark Gracey of Cass City High, Linda Nilsen of Harbor Beach High.

CLASS B — Ann McNew of Vassar High, and CLASS D — Eric Thuemmel of North Huron High.

### NEW RADIO STATION OK'ED

A group of Pigeon business people have earned a construction permit from the Federal Communications Commission to build an FM radio station to serve the Standish and western Saginaw Bay area.

Agri-Valley Communications, Inc., 7585 W. Pigeon Road, was approved to build a 3000-watt station on the 96.9 mhz frequency. Agri-Valley owners are listed as John Eichler, Edwin Eichler, Neal Eichler, all of Pigeon, and James Christner of Elkton and Karl Leppien of Alma.

Edwin Eichler said this week the process of seeking the new station allocation began late in 1985. Construction will likely take up to 18 months, at a cost of up to \$250,000 and target date for start-up is October, 1989.

"We hope to serve the local Standish community," Eichler said, "and to sell Bay City and Saginaw businesses on the idea they should be advertising there."

He said the new station's signal should be able to be received in part of the Thumb Area, directly across Saginaw Bay.

### 120-STORE MALL PLANNED

Thumb Area residents will have a new shopping destination by spring, 1990, as plans have been announced for a 120-store mall just north of Port Huron. The 600,000 sq. ft. mall will be built on a 77-acre site at the corner of Kewadin Road and M-25, and will likely feature three large department stores — including a J.C. Penney anchor store.

General Growth Development, Inc., in partnership with JCP Realty, Inc., a Penney subsidiary, have announced the mall plans.

Port Huron's mall is smaller than the 900,000 sq. ft. Fashion Square Mall at Saginaw, but features more businesses than the 100 at Fashion Square, developers say. Port Huron traditionally has had one of the strongest downtown shopping areas in Michigan, and previous mall plans have never materialized.

### TUSCOLA MISSES PATROLS

Residents of Tuscola County are finding response times slower following last Saturday's ending of road patrols by Sheriff Paul Berry's department, in a county budget-cutting move.

Tuscola's 13 patrol officers were laid off after county voters defeated a property tax increase request in April. That resulted in \$266,000 in spending cuts, including \$210,000 from the sheriff's road patrol budget.

Now, only one Michigan State Police car will be patrolling county roads on six of seven nights each week, officials say, in addition to patrolling done by village, township or city police. Ten state police troopers are stationed at the Caro post.

At least two two-man sheriff's cars were on duty each night, and up to four one-man cars patrolled each day before the funding cut. Tuscola residents will again vote on the tax increase request in August.

### COURT PROCEEDINGS

In Tuscola County Circuit Court, Judge Patrick Joslyn recently heard these pleas and made determinations on:

■ David J. Seibel, 34 of Gagetown, pled guilty to operating while under the influence of liquor, third offense. He was sentenced to one year in the Tuscola County Jail, ordered to pay \$500 in fines and attorney's costs and loses his driver's license for five years, plus must participate in treatment programs.

■ Robert A. McIntosh, 19 of Owendale, pled nolo contendere to a charge of larceny from a motor vehicle, following an incident involving theft of a radio from a vehicle at a Caro auto dealer's lot; sentenced to one year's delayed sentence plus must pay costs of \$100 and attorney's fees, plus serve 100 hours of community service.

In 73rd District Court, First Division (Huron County), Judge John Schubel heard these pleas and made these determinations recently:

■ Patty Jo Bock, 26 of Elkton, pled guilty to impaired driving; ordered to pay \$450 in fines and costs and loses driver's license for three months.

■ Terry F. Schember, 26 of Elkton, pled guilty to impaired driving; ordered to pay \$450 in fines and costs and loses driver's license for three months.

■ Eugene K. Kady II, 24 of Gagetown, pled guilty to impaired driving; ordered to pay \$450 in fines and costs and loses driver's license for three months.

## Cigarettes, cocaine can't be compared

Surgeon General C. Everett Koop is known as a man of great conviction, intelligence, dedication and hard work. He has carried forth his personal beliefs through public demonstrations, speeches and interviews on topics such as AIDS, drug abuse, personal health — and now, smoking. Unfortunately, this learned man is off-base and unrealistic in his recent assault on smoking.

Now, smoking in any form should not be encouraged. It is a repulsive, damaging and deadly habit which has absolutely NO redeeming qualities.

Surgeon Gen. Koop announced this past week that the nicotine in tobacco products is similar to heroin and cocaine — saying all are physiologically addicting substances. Dr. Koop, along with U.S. Health and Human Services Secretary Otis Bowen say a warning label on the addictive nature of tobacco should be rotated with other health warnings on cigarette packages.

And, the experts say, treatment for tobacco addiction should be made more readily available to more people — when third-party payers (insurance companies) would pay for treatment to smoking, as they now help pay for treatment of addiction to alcohol and illicit drugs.

Finally, Dr. Koop says tobacco products should not be sold through vending machines, where children can purchase them. He believes tobacco sales should be as closely regulated as alcoholic beverages.

Dr. Koop is a highly-principled man who has properly predicted trends and needs of the American people for many years. But is cigarette smoking as addictive as is cocaine, as he now says? While we're not experts, we don't think so.

Nicotine is a powerful, domineering substance, to be sure. It should not be consum-

ed by anyone, young or old, but merely saying so won't make it happen.

After the gun lobby, the defense lobby and the education lobby, the tobacco boosters are one of our nation's most powerful pressure organizations. The small number of farmers who raise tobacco — with plenty of U.S. governmental subsidies, by the way — carry a big stick and wave huge influence in the nation's capital.

Much as we all should, we AREN'T going to stop growing tobacco and selling its products.

How many people have truly turned away from smoking because of those little warnings printed on the side of a cigarette package? Not many, we think.

So, rotating a new "addiction" message among those others on the side of the packages won't do anything — other than give the "anti-smokers" cause for an imaginary celebration.

Should insurance plans pay for treatment of addiction to cigarettes? Now that indeed is a good idea. The focus of many medical plans (at least in advertisements) has been on "wellness" — taking care of people BEFORE they get sick. It's like a garage advertising preventative maintenance for your car before it breaks down.

That's all well and good. So, if a smoker can be weaned off cigarettes, thereby reducing possible future health problems, isn't that to the insurer's good, as well as the person him or herself? Of course. Helping people stop smoking is an improvement which insurers should help pay for.

And, stopping the sale of cigarettes from vending machines would be fine with us, too. That process alone would turn some people into non-smokers, since access would be more difficult. And, requiring a person to walk up to a counter and seemingly prove his or her age before being able to buy cigarettes would keep children out of the buying phase.

(Actually, all those unused vending machines could probably sell condoms to prevent AIDS and social diseases, if Surgeon Gen. Koop has his way with another of his "pet peeves.")

But, are cigarettes as dangerous as heroin or cocaine? Oh, come on now, Mr. Surgeon General. Dangerous, yes. But millions of smokers have STOPPED this habit and millions more have never started.

Heroin, cocaine and cigarettes all share the same misery and definition: they're bad, bad, bad for you. But they're not in the same league, for starters, as far as dependence and danger go. But Dr. Koop knew more headlines would be received with such comparisons, and that would get more people talking about these topics important to him.

So, in this way, he's succeeded — even though it's been through deception and a form of fraud. Let's hope the American public will see the need for less smoking on their own, with few theatrics involved.

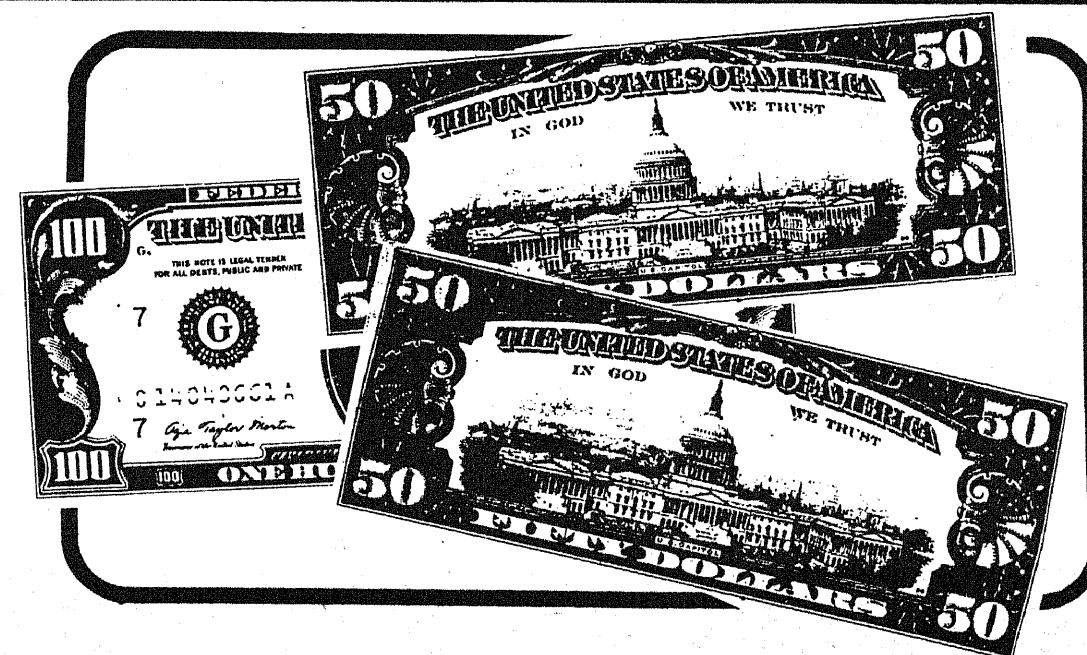

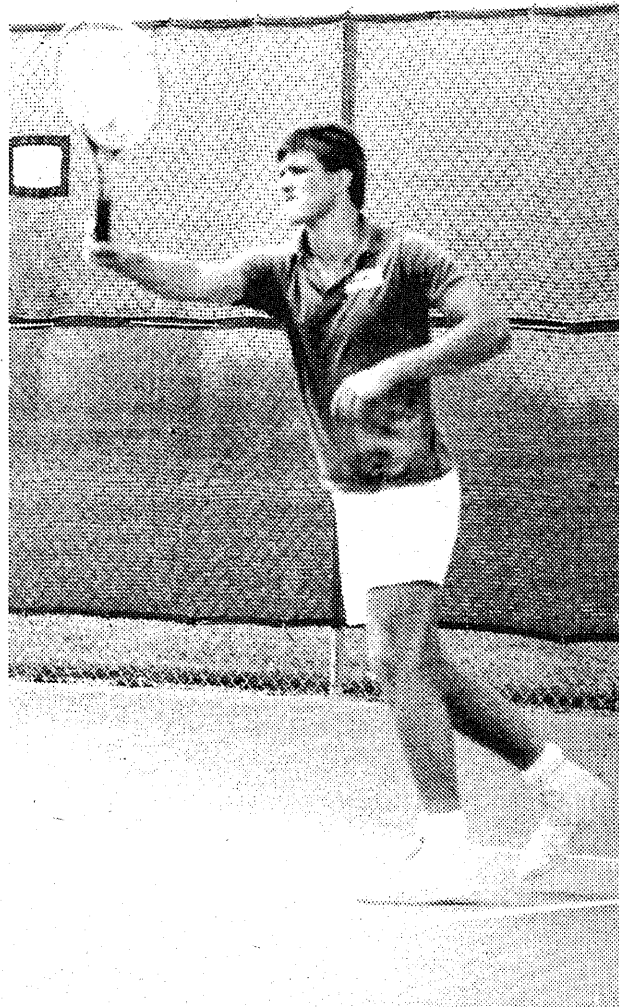
Jay Anthes and Dan Bivens easily handled Duke Finkbeiner and Steve Kurshy of Sandusky 6-4, 6-1.

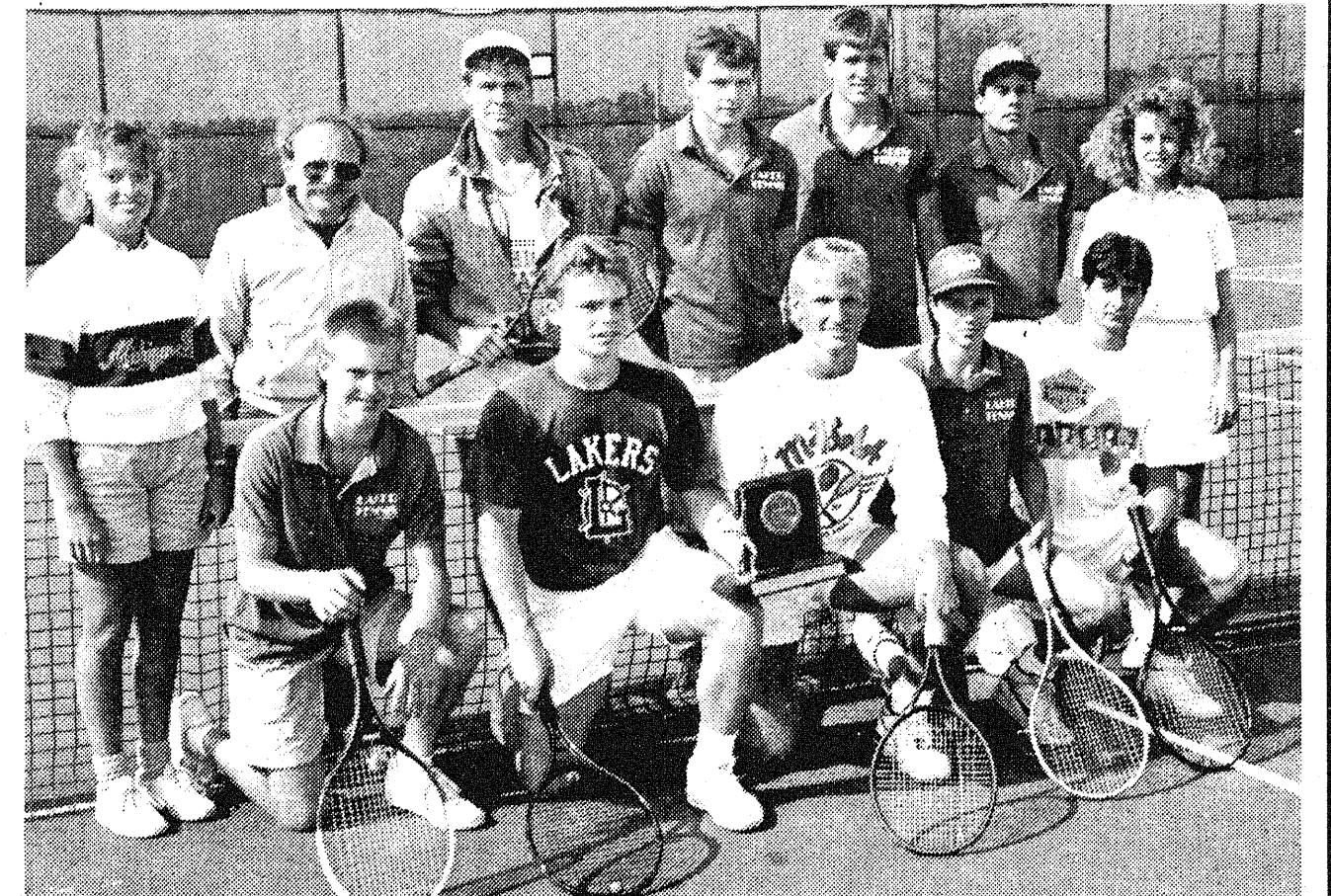

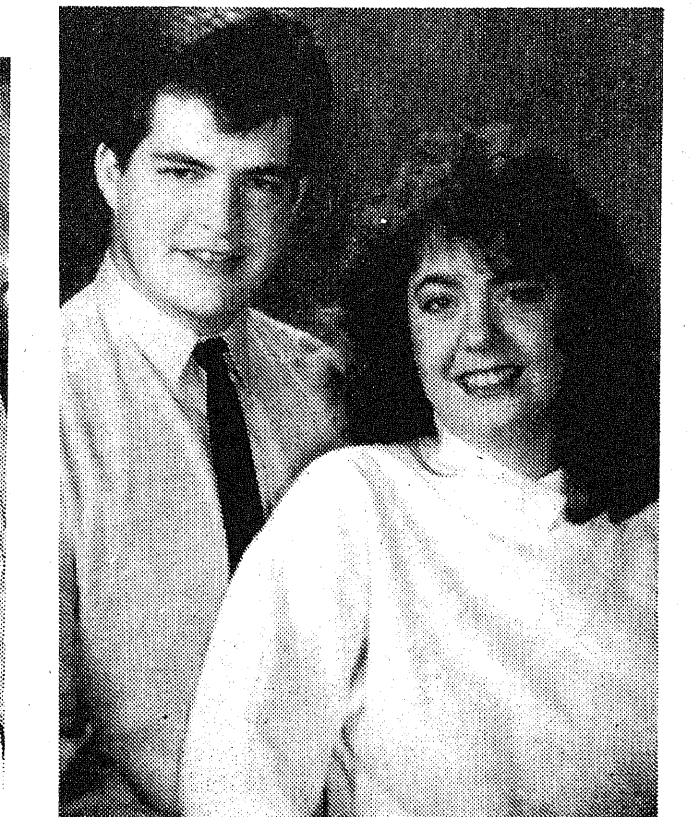

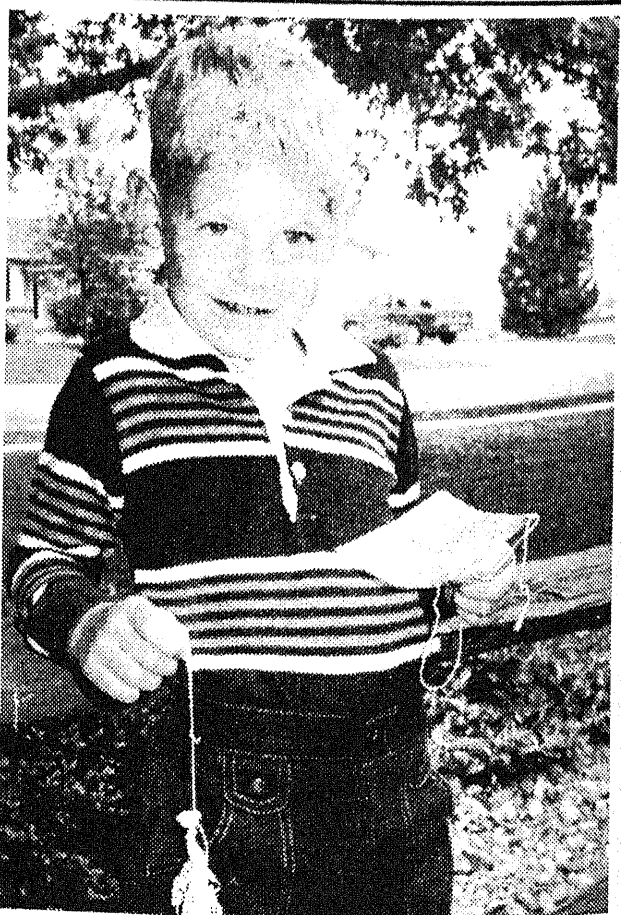

### Help world's poor through 'Trickle Up'

Local residents Don and Viola Voelker have supplied The Progress-Advance with information about an interesting way to put resources directly into the hands of desperately poor people in the Third World — through the unique efforts of "Trickle Up," a "mom and pop-type" foreign aid program that puts small donations directly to work.

A New York couple, Glen and Mildred Leet, began the grant program after he saw

first-hand what typically happens to large aid programs, which are supposed to "trickle down" and benefit the poor. As a community development director with the United Nations for 36 years, he saw that very little of the money "trickles down" to the poor.

"Trickle Up" funds do just that, going directly to the unemployed people at the grass roots.

The typical grant is \$100, paid in two installments of

\$50 each. Since 1979 when the Leets started the program, more than 4,000 entrepreneurs in 90 developing nations have received the mini-grants.

"Trickle Up" doesn't undertake a formal fund-raising effort. It goes by word of mouth and people hear about the program and donate. The Voelkers say that donations may be sent to 54 Riverside Drive, PHE, New York, NY 10024.

## Woods & Waters

### Pickin' and a grinnin'

It started out as a Trout fishing trip. I had every intention of spending this beautiful Saturday in May knee-deep in the North Branch. I had even donned my waders and fly vest, tucked my rod under arm and proceeded down the faint footpath that would lead me to a special little hole that usually held a willing Trout or 2.

Everything was going well until I came to a fallen tree lying across the path. It was an old Elm. Probably dead on the stump for a few years, and weakened with age it succumbed to the first violent storm. I should have stepped over the thickest part of the trunk. By the looks of things everybody else passing this way had done just that. But, being a lazy sort I walked parallel down the length looking for an easier route.

I finally found what I was looking for, turned and lifted my foot to step over the smaller limb when my eyes caught a glimpse of something that made me freeze in mid-air. I sucked in a couple of breaths to help relax my body, slowly placed my foot back on the ground; and bent a little lower to examine the object of my attention.

I was right, it was a morel.

Before I could control myself I had flung my flyrod down, ripped off the flyvest and assumed a position that it some circles is known as "doing the mushroom squat." From this vantage point more than a dozen of these delicious springtime treats leaped into view.

Within the next several minutes I had gathered all of the spongy-topped fungus in sight, and after I couldn't see anymore of them I still poked under leaf and around stumps hoping to rediscover another mess or 2.

However, it was apparent that my bonanza had played out so I picked up my flyvest, unzipped the pouch in the back panel and stuffed it full of morels. I looked at my watch, secretly hoping it was lunchtime so I could head back to my campsite and fry up a batch, but found the morning was still young. I moved up the path, found my pool empty of other fishermen and after hanging up my vest to protect the morels, stepped into the water to do battle with the fish.

Later that night, I sliced the deeply-

pitted mushrooms and fried them in butter. They went well with the hamburger I had thoughtfully packed.

Although there are hundreds of mushroom varieties, when someone mentions the word everybody thinks of morels. Many feel the reason they are so popular is because they are easy to identify. The true morel is a deeply-pitted, hollowtop fungus that is attached at its base to a hollow stem. There are many other mushrooms with folds or gnarled caps that bear a resemblance to the morel, but the difference is that they are attached only at the top, like an umbrella. Once you find a morel and you want to make sure it is a morel, all you have to do is split it lengthwise. Not only will that show you where it is attached to the stem, but you can also knock out the millipedes which love to hide inside.

Maybe you like that extra protein, but I don't.

Morels are a May mushroom. Seldom seen before the 1st of May, they are usually all gone by June 1. They range in color from a creamy-white to a nearly-pitch black, but they all have an irregularly-spaced pitted cap, a light-colored stalk and a hollow interior. And, oh yes, they taste heavenly.

Eating morels is the easy part. Finding them can be just a little tougher. Don't rely on friends telling you where they are, for they're going to keep that secret for themselves. Best you develop your own technique.

Start by looking for trees. Morels like Beech and Red Maple forests. If you find some dead Elms within the Beech and Maples, all the better. And if some of the trees have been knocked down within the past couple of years, get down and start looking.

Timing is very important also. Morels usually pop up after a couple of good, warm spring rains. They usually appear in conjunction with the first spears of asparagus, or when May apples and lilacs are starting to bloom. Any of these signs are good time to begin your search.

As a matter of fact, anytime is a good time to look for morels, even when you're Trout fishing .....

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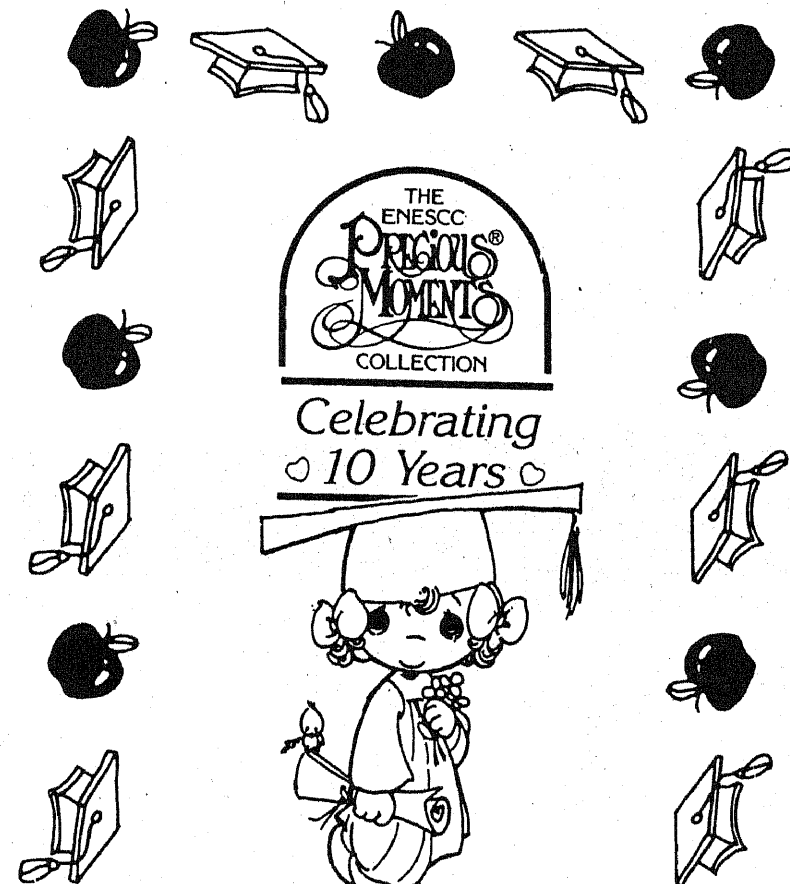

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# Outlook for tourism summer '88 in the Thumb: GREAT!

According to the calendar, summer officially begins on Tuesday, June 21.

But here in the Thumb, summer unofficially begins with the Perch Festival in Caseville and gets into full swing with the Memorial Day weekend.

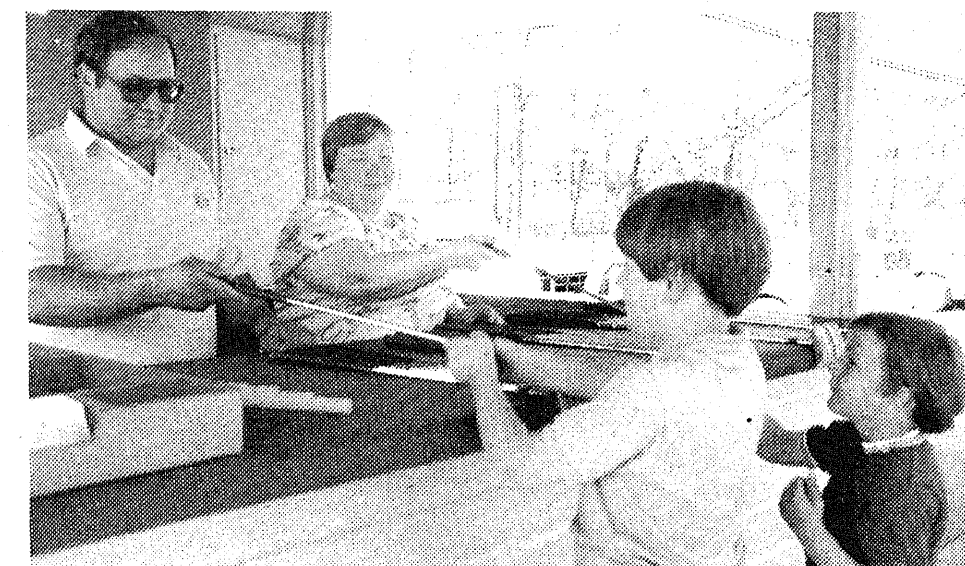
Thousands of tourists will flock to the beautiful beaches and campgrounds by the lake, bringing with them boats, camping gear, fishing rods, and greenbacks — that precious commodity which lives on long after the beaches are empty.

**SIGNS POINT UP:** This summer's tourist season is expected to be about four percent above a year ago in Michigan, according to AAA Michigan — and experts say that food and hotel costs should see only a slight increase.

AAA Michigan says motorists should log a record 865 million miles this weekend, and gas prices should stay constant.

**ECONOMIC PREDICTION — "GREAT:"** Locally, Huron Economic Development Corporation Director Carl Osentoski says that the summer season should be "great."

"I fully anticipate that with all the attention being focused on the Thumb and Huron County that we should be right in the thick of things" for the tourist season. Osentoski says the EDC is currently taking a much more aggressive approach to marketing the Thumb as a vacation area, working with the

Michigan Travel Bureau to gain access to mailing lists of potential visitors.

"The Travel Bureau tells us we have the natural resources here, but we need more hotel rooms to house visitors. We've got the attractions, but nowhere to put up the numbers of people we'd like to see," says Osentoski.

**MORE SAY "YES:"** Other local promoters and business people agree this summer should be a winner.

Terry Sheehan, manager of Sleeper State Park near Caseville, reports the park is fully booked for both the Memorial Day and Fourth of July weekends.

"We've been booked up for Memorial Day for almost a month now. Our reservations are running quite a bit above last year for the entire summer. I'd say it's going to be a very busy summer for us."

Other local innkeepers echo that statement, such as Peggy Pittenger, manager of the Bella Vista Inn, who reports the Memorial Day weekend will find the Bella Vista nearly full, and completely full for the Fourth of July.

"Business has picked up quite a bit. We've had a full house on quite a few weekends already. The summer's looking pretty good to me," says Pittenger.

And Dave Lewis, manager of the Caseville Resort, reports all the Resort's cabins are full for the weekend as are the boat slips. "We've had lots of calls about the party boat. I expect it will be booked full before too long," Lewis says.

**CASEVILLE OPTIMISTIC:** The Village of Caseville has already seen business increase for the season, says Chamber of Commerce President Helen Kopack.

"We're looking forward anxiously to the Memorial Day weekend," says Kopack. She also says that the harbor expansion, when finished, will be a definite boon to the area, bringing in more fishermen and boats.

Engineers for the harbor expansion project, which will cost about \$1.8 million, say improvements should be in place in time for the 1989 boating season.

**DESIGN IDEAS:** Caseville should also benefit in the future from the suggestions of the Design Michigan team from Cranbrook Academy, which will be offering suggestions on ways businesses in the village can spruce up their image in the community and enhance Caseville's reputation as a first-class resort area.

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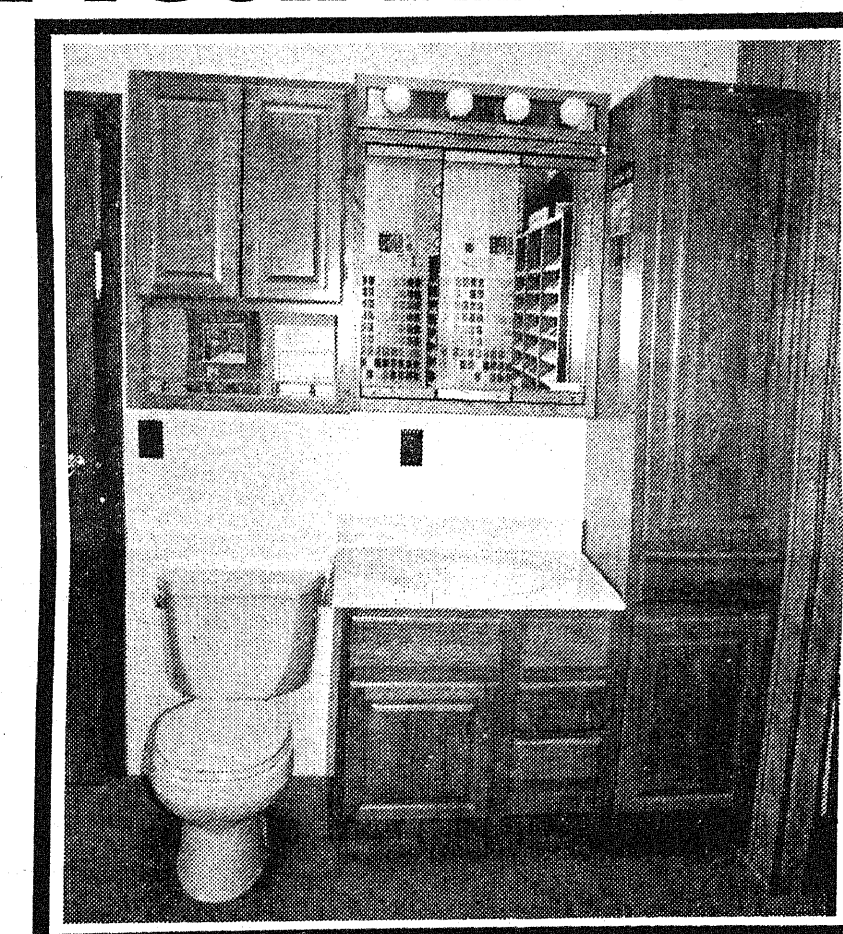

Campers planning to reserve sites or inquire about facilities can refer to AAA Michigan's 1988 private campground guide, which also lists phone numbers and indicates campgrounds inspected and approved by AAA. Most accept telephone reservations.

**RESERVATIONS UP:** Reflecting the summer crush expected at many state park campgrounds is the 14% jump in reservations compared with 1987. As with private parks, many state

facilities are popular due to their proximity to outdoor attractions.

For example, the Upper Peninsula's Tahquamenon Falls is known for its scenery while southern Michigan's Hoffmaster near Grand Haven has a two-mile stretch of shoreline surrounded by sand dunes drawing sun worshipers.

Last year, Ludington State Park, with two popular bass-fishing lakes along with its location on Lake Michigan, attracted the highest number of campers in the state.

**HOW TO RESERVE:** Campers can reserve a state park site by phoning the park or mailing a reservation form, available at the parks or from the Department of Natural Resources Information Services, Mason Building, Box 30028, Lansing, MI 48909.

Campers can also call the State Park Division at 373-1270 to receive vacancy information during most of the summer, officials say.

The nightly state park fees at most campgrounds is \$8 with some at \$9. There is a \$6 fee for semi-modern sites and \$4 for rustic.

Those seeking all-rustic camping can choose from 140 state forest campgrounds where nightly prices vary from \$2 to \$5.
