#### Director David F. Hales of the DNR is urging extreme caution in the face of continued high fire danger. Hale pointed out that the lack of rain has turned our State into a tinderbox. The 4th of July weekend was a crucial time as warm temperatures and high winds continued to place state forests and

grasslands succeptible to serious wildfire. To date, DNR fire fighting teams have responded to 632 wildfires this spring. These fires have consumed over 6,000 acres, and another 6,000 acres have been fought by local fire fighting units.

It's final! Michigan will not receive a permit to import and display 2 giant pandas, a species that is critically-endangered worldwide. After approving 3 such exhibits in the past 14 months, the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service came under intense criticism from the World Wildlife Fund.

The annual MUCC convention held at Sault Ste. Marie a week ago came through with some interesting resolutions. The delegates endorsed a stand to seek a crossbow hunting season in Michigan, defeated a resolution that opposed the reintroduction of timber wolves in the Upper Peninsula and rejected a resolu-tion seeking an end to deer hunting over bait. They also supported a resolution that makes it unlawful for charter boat captains and their crew to fish while under payment for a charter. The captains will also be held responsible for their clients to have valid fishing


