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

With the memorable 1987 Pigeon Chamber of Commerce Christmas Car Giveaway successfully behind them, the Chamber has begun working on another "suspense-filled" promotion for this year's holiday.

"Let's Wheel and Deal" is the name of the five-week drawing designed to encourage local shopping and promote Pigeon as a "progressive" community, according to Chamber President Dave Jarvis.

The Grand Prize winner will take home a \$5,000 shopping spree in the Village of Pigeon, redeemable at any Pigeon Chamber of Commerce members. Drawings will begin with Open House Sunday on Nov. 20, at which time double tickets will be offered prior to the 4 p.m. drawing. Other drawing dates will be Saturdays, Nov. 26, Dec. 3, 10 and 17,

As was done last year, tickets will be "pitched" after each week's drawing so that everyone has an equal chance of winning each weck.

Tickets will be distributed on the basis of one ticket per each \$1.00 purchased, with a limit to be established by the Christmas Promotion committee.

HOW IT WILL WORK: Ten winners' names will be drawn from a huge mixing drum, with two becoming winners by opening locks. The other eight contestants

will win \$10 in Pigeon Money.

Of the two remaining contestants, the first one on stage will be given the option of taking the prize "package" (valued at at least \$200) or waiting to try their hand at winning the Grand Prize \$5,000 Shopping Spreeat the final drawing on Saturday, Dec. 17.

If the first contestant takes the chance at the Shopping Spree, then the second contestant wins the Prize Package OR has the option of walking away with \$200 in Pigeon Money. If the first contestant takes the Prize Package, then the second contestant gets the chance to win the \$5,000 Shopping Spree. But before the first contestant opens his/her Prize Package, s/he will be offered \$200 for the box.

At the end of the fifth drawing, the five "Spree" contestants will return to the stage, each choosing a key. The first week's winner will have first choice of the key, followed by the other winners in or-

The lucky winner will hold the key that opens the "Shopping Spree" lock. All other contestants will win a consolation prize, yet to be

determined. MUST BE PRESENT: As in past years, persons participating in the promotion must be present to win. The Pigeon Chamber of Commerce suggests that persons who will not be in town for a Saturday drawing "hold" their tickets for a Saturday when they know they'll be able to be there.

"The whole point of holding a promotion of this size is to draw people into Pigeon," explains Jarvis.

"If persons do not have to be present to win, we defeat our whole purpose."

Thumb Weekly News Round-Up

THUMB AREA IN ECONOMIC COMEBACK Michigan's Thumb Area is "coming back" from poor busi ness and agricultural economic conditions of the past 10 years, according to good attitudes and entrepreneurial spir-

ts in business, says State Commerce Director Douglas Ross. Ross toured the Thumb last week, noting women-owned businesses are some of the "special weapons" which are bringing back better times here. He said farming will always be a major part of the Thumb's total economic scene, but urged all counties to diversify to reduce problems when worse economic times come -- as they always will.

VILLAGE BACH FESTIVAL NEARING

Cass City hosts the tenth season of the Village Bach Festival during Thanksgiving Week'88, with concerts scheduled Nov. 22 and Nov. 25-27. MENTAL EXAM FOR SEBEWAINGITE Stephen Osterhout, 17 of Sebewaing, pled innocent last week in Otsego County Circuit Court to the charge of firstdegree murder, in the April 12 shooting death of 28-year-old Dean Lyons of Cheboygan.

Circuit Judge Alton Davis ordered Osterhout to undergo

psychiatric tests to determine if he is competent to stand trial. Osterhout remains in the Otsego County Jail following last Monday's arraignment. Lyons was killed by a .22-cal. rifle shot to the head, and his missing auto was recovered two days later. Fingerprints on the car have been identified as Osterhout's, and he will be tried as an adult, police said.

EARLY AUTOPSY IN WOMAN'S DEATH

Preliminary autopsy results say Susan M. Dixon, 27 of Livonia, died of a heart attack, according to investigators. The woman's body was found Sept. 27 near a cabin on Rose Island, two miles north of Sebewaing. Foul play is not expected to be a cause, State Police say.

The heart attack was possibly induced by asphyxiation of the lungs, possibly caused by pneumonia or depressants,

Final autopsy results are expected later this week, according to Huron County Prosecutor Karl Kraus.

Connecting through networks Who's in your network?

My network, you say? What in the world is a network? Well, who are the people with whom youkeep in contact? You know, the ones with whom you regularly share joys and sorrows, ins and outs. These are the people of your various

Networking is old as the hills and new as the businessperson who just discovered what a good idea it is to keep in

For the past year or so, I've been a part of a network of church professionals and volunteers who share a commitment to churches and ministry in rural areas. I'm learning schedule, along with the recent (and successful) about some remarkable people and places through them.

Then there's Gladys from Appalachia. A church executive who works out of headquarters in New York City, Gladys comes from a family who was displaced from their land in Tennessee during World War II when the Oak Ridge Atomic Energy facility was built. Gladys' home place is now a part of U.S. nuclear history. She's worked as a deaconess, church and community worker and now chairs a major Appalachian organization that cooperatively ties together many of the service organizations, church and otherwise, that work n rural Appalachia. She's in the network.

The point of all this is not to glorify these folks or the rural network that we make work. The point is that we grow by our relationships with others, whether they are people whom we see every day or people with whom we have to keep in touch by phone and mail. We are challenged when we brush up against people who hold common values and dreams and together we act upon those dreams. Plus, we get to know some mighty nice folks.

Each of us has networks in which we function. We have family, work colleagues, church family, bowling team, the gang at the coffee shop or grocery store, school buddies and lots of others. Some networks are for work and business and others are for fun. Through these connections we learn about the world and even impact the world for better or worse. Through our networks we meet the special people who mark our world with their laughter and intensity, their concern and understanding.

Robert Muller has written: "You are the center of a network. You are the center of the world. You are a free, immensely powerful source of life and goodness. Affirm it. Spread it. Radiate it. Think day and night about it and you

will see a miracle happen." The miracle is communicating. The miracle is the ability to network - to be better persons and make a better world because of what we all give to each other.

Breakfast Clubs are set up and running to serve Lakers, Unionville - Sebewaing, North Huron, Bad Axe and Harbor Beach High Schools — and each has growing attendance. A week of assembly shows in junior and senior high schools was recently completed, with a burger bash being the grand finale and more than 300 youngsters participated.
Weekly youth rallies, special Christian music con-

certs and other events help round out the YFC bake sale and auction over Labor Day weekend.

Probably best-known of all the YFĆ activites is the musical group "Allied," which this year will feature 40-plus singers from eight Huron County high schools. They perform all year long, bringing a positive, moral message to thousands of people in concerts statewide.

All these things are done by Executive Director Dwight Gascho and his motivated crew on shoestring, budgets. They do remarkable things with just

DEAR EDITOR:

Whenever I visit with young people they naturally talk about things that are happening today. It seems everybody is in such a hurry. Cars go a lot faster and roads are better and things cost a lot more than they used to.

There are a lot of things going on that we older people lidn't know anything about when we were young. Maybe they are happier than we were, but I suppose our greatgrandchildren will have it a ot different than our grandchildren have it.

When I was young and you had a car that went over 55 miles an hour, you were really going 80 or 90 miles an hour by the way cars are

Some cars had big steering wheels while others had smaller ones. You had to hang on real tight because we didn't have power steering and if you hit a bump,

you felt it! Back then you did things by hand and we didn't have all these sprays people use now. We didn't need to be afraid that everything we ate would cause cancer.

Back then an average farmer had 80 to 120 acres of land. We had four good horses and around 10 cows and 75 to 150 chicks. And if you had a big barn, you'd maybe have 15 or 20 steers. Everybody had a straw stack at the back of his barn and the cows used to rub on them and the horses ate straw. All winter your bean straw and corn fodder all got worked into your manure

better fertilizer than that. You had your beans and grain stored in your own grainery or corn crib. If you needed a little money, you'd take a couple beans or a few bags of wheat to town and sell them and you kept track of how high the market was. to sell, you'd take them to response. the stockyard and ship them to Detroit and take whatever you got. If you had some cattle to sell, you had to keep track of the price because there were a lot of cattle buyers coming around to buy

them. They always tried to

get me to lower my prices. When we lived east of Elkton I had a cow to soll and my Dad told Joe Schmidt about it. He came to my place and brought a couple of men with him. Many of you older people remember Joe Schmidt — how he used to come around and buy your

I showed them my cow and told them what I wanted for her. Of course, they wanted it for less money, but I insisted on what I wanted.

Then one of them said to the other one in German that we can come out on that price if we make sausage out of her. But I stuck to my price and got it and they said they were losing money.

So I told them to make sausage out of her and they wondered how I knew that. Joe told them I could speak German and were they sur-

COUPON COOKBOOK CORNER

The benefits of a fiber-rich diet are well known. What is not so well known is how to increase fiber consumption without drastically changing eating habits. 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



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
