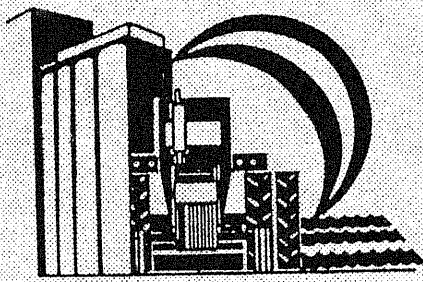


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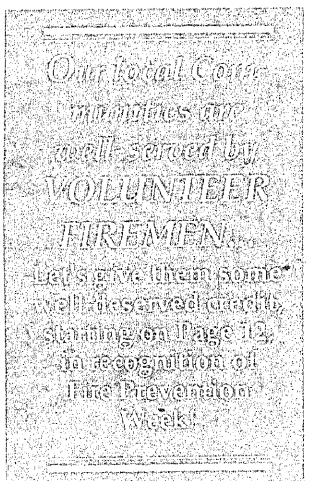

\$5,000 to lucky Pigeon holiday shopper!

With the memorable 1987 Pigeon Chamber of Commerce Christmas Car Give-away successfully behind them, the Chamber has begun working on another "suspense-filled" promotion for this year's holiday.

"Let's Wheel and Deal" is the name of the five-week drawing designed to encourage local shopping and promote Pigeon as a "progressive" community, according to Chamber President Dave Jarvis.

The Grand Prize winner will take home a \$5,000 shopping spree in the Village of Pigeon, redeemable at any Pigeon Chamber of Commerce members. Drawings will begin with Open House Sunday on Nov. 20, at which time double tickets will be offered prior to the 4 p.m. drawing. Other drawing dates will be Saturdays, Nov. 26, Dec. 3, 10 and 17, all at 4 p.m.

As was done last year, tickets will be "pitched" after

each week's drawing so that everyone has an equal chance of winning each week.

Tickets will be distributed on the basis of one ticket per each \$1.00 purchased, with a limit to be established by the Christmas Promotion committee.

HOW IT WILL WORK: Ten winners' names will be drawn from a huge mixing drum, with two becoming winners by opening locks. The other eight contestants

will win \$10 in Pigeon Money.

Of the two remaining contestants, the first one on stage will be given the option of taking the prize "package" (valued at at least \$200) or waiting to try their hand at winning the Grand Prize \$5,000 Shopping Spree at the final drawing on Saturday, Dec. 17.

If the first contestant takes the chance at the Shopping Spree, then the second contestant wins the Prize Package OR has the option of walking away with \$200 in Pigeon Money. If the first contestant takes the Prize Package, then the second contestant gets the chance to win the \$5,000 Shopping Spree. But before the first contestant opens his/her Prize Package, s/he will be offered \$200 for the box.

At the end of the fifth drawing, the five "Spree" contestants will return to the stage, each choosing a key. The first week's winner will have first choice of the key, followed by the other winners in order.

The lucky winner will hold the key that opens the "Shopping Spree" lock. All other contestants will win a consolation prize, yet to be determined.

MUST BE PRESENT: As in past years, persons participating in the promotion must be present to win. The Pigeon Chamber of Commerce suggests that persons who will not be in town for a Saturday drawing "hold" their tickets for a Saturday when they know they'll be able to be there.

"The whole point of holding a promotion of this size is to draw people into Pigeon," explains Jarvis.

"If persons do not have to be present to win, we defeat our whole purpose."

TOY GIVEAWAY: Thanks to a \$1,000 donation by Thumb National Bank & Trust Co., Pigeon, the traditional Children's Toy Giveaway will be held as usual, gifting 10 children every week with toys.

Children can sign up for the drawing by depositing a ticket into Santa's mailbox prior to each Saturday's drawing.

To help celebrate the open-

The women behind the men . . .

If it's true that "behind every successful man there's a woman," as the old saying goes, then that must be doubly true in Bay Port — where 16 women who are members of the Fair Haven Township Firemen's Auxiliary stand

behind the 12 men who make up the Fair Haven Township Volunteer Fire Department.

These 16 women are members of one of only two such auxiliaries in Huron County — in Bay Port and Kinde. They are proud of the role they play in fire-fight-

ing in Fair Haven Township, a role which includes keeping the firemen fortified with food and supplies during many hours of exhausting and sometimes dangerous work.

"When Fair Haven Wood Products burned down last

year, the men were at the scene around the clock and we were right there, providing water, coffee and sandwiches — enabling them to keep going," says Auxiliary President Judy Forman.

The auxiliary goes out to assist the force whenever the entire department is called to a fire, she explained. They also go out when many area departments are called to assist in a major disaster, such as the Reimann-Snyder fire which burned the Pigeon business to the ground on Easter Sunday seven years ago.

None of the women have any fire-fighting training themselves, although auxiliary member Annette Henne was sent by her peers to an Emergency Medical Technician course, enabling her to obtain her state EMT license. What the women have in abundance is a desire to be helpful in a very stressful time — when there is little else they could do.

HOW THEY STARTED: The auxiliary was the idea of native Bay Porter Louise Deming, who passed away three years ago. "She was the founder of our group," says Forman. "She felt sorry for the guys who fought fires with nothing to drink or eat for many hours."

The Auxiliary gives lots of

credit to the Kinde Firemen's Auxiliary, which provided lots of assistance as the Bay Port group organized.

The Fair Haven auxiliaries remember with a laugh the time they all loaded up to help fight the fire which claimed the Kinde Elevator in 1977.

"Only we didn't know they had evacuated the whole town!" auxiliaries remember with a chuckle.

OTHER DUTIES: The auxiliaries keep busy at other times, too. They assist local families who have been burned out due to a fire, providing gift certificates to local stores to replenish clothing, furnishings and food.

NON-DISASTERS: The auxiliaries are also proud of their "non-disaster" community involvements. For three consecutive years, the club has won prizes for the floats they have entered in three

community parades, in Bay Port, Pigeon and Sebewaing.

They also conduct an Easter Egg Hunt for area children in the spring. Most of their operating funds come from hard work during Bay Port Fish Sandwich Days.

The auxiliary meets once a month under the leadership of President Judy Forman, Vice President Donna Deming, Treasurer Cathy Steele and Secretary Charlene Kleinfeld.

One thing the auxiliaries emphasize is that being married to a Fair Haven Township Fireman is not required for membership. Presently, four members are not married to local firemen.

"A desire to help and a dedication to the community is what makes a good auxiliary," stresses Forman, who herself is married to Fire Chief Ralph Forman, who has served in the department for over two decades.

THUMB AREA IN ECONOMIC COMEBACK

Michigan's Thumb Area is "coming back" from poor business and agricultural economic conditions of the past 10 years, according to good attitudes and entrepreneurial spirits in business, says State Commerce Director Douglas Ross. Ross toured the Thumb last week, noting women-owned businesses are some of the "special weapons" which are bringing back better times here. He said farming will always be a major part of the Thumb's total economic scene, but urged all counties to diversify to reduce problems when worse economic times come — as they always will.

VILLAGE BACH FESTIVAL NEARING

Cass City hosts the tenth season of the Village Bach Festival during Thanksgiving Week '88, with concerts scheduled Nov. 22 and Nov. 25-27. The First Presbyterian Church sanctuary will host three major concerts during the celebration, featuring 30 professional musicians from Georgia, Iowa, Ohio, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, California and Michigan.

MENTAL EXAM FOR SEBEWAINGITE

Stephen Osterhout, 17 of Sebewaing, pled innocent last week in Otsego County Circuit Court to the charge of first-degree murder, in the April 12 shooting death of 28-year-old Dean Lyons of Cheboygan.

Circuit Judge Alton Davis ordered Osterhout to undergo psychiatric tests to determine if he is competent to stand trial. Osterhout remains in the Otsego County jail following last Monday's arraignment. Lyons was killed by a .22-cal. rifle shot to the head, and his missing auto was recovered two days later. Fingerprints on the car have been identified as Osterhout's, and he will be tried as an adult, police said.

EARLY AUTOPSY IN WOMAN'S DEATH

Preliminary autopsy results say Susan M. Dixon, 27 of Livonia, died of a heart attack, according to investigators. The woman's body was found Sept. 27 near a cabin on Rose Island, two miles north of Sebewaing. Foul play is not expected to be a cause, State Police say.

The heart attack was possibly induced by asphyxiation of the lungs, possibly caused by pneumonia or depressants, they said.

Final autopsy results are expected later this week, according to Huron County Prosecutor Karl Kraus.

1988 Beet Crop Is Looking Good!

THE SEBEWAING PLANT of the Michigan Sugar Company began the 1988 campaign Wednesday by receiving 721 loads of sugar beets, totaling about 15,000 tons, for a new opening day record. Agricultural Manager Richard Jacoby said that by the time early deliveries were cut off Thursday evening, nearly 30,000 tons had been brought in. He added that additional loads were being transferred from the company's Ruth and Verona stations. Slicing and first processing started Friday morning, with enough beets on hand for 5 or 6 days of processing. Factory officials are keeping careful watch of weather conditions so processing would not be interrupted.

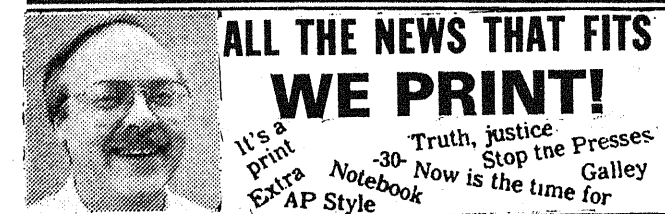

Bluewater YFC deserves support

There's been lots of talk in recent months about TV preachers and building projects from broadcast ministers which always need "money, money, money and more money." We've seen too much of Jim and Tammy Faye Bakker and some of the others, who have gone beyond their church callings and have been lining their own pockets too fully and too frequently.

People are correct in having questions or concerns about such godlessness and squandering, often from people who can afford it the least. It's too bad the charlatans can't be made to wear big signs saying "we've abused our right to raise money" or "don't give to us — we waste your gifts." Luckily,

Total attendance for the year was 9460 persons, and, to quote YFC's John Gunden, "the bottom line is 135 kids committed their hearts to Jesus Christ! That is an excellent ministry taking place right here in our own back yard!"

It's not always easy getting to youngsters, who are far busier today than were their parents in school. So, YFC goes to young people when and where they can.

Breakfast Clubs are set up and running to serve Lakers, Unionville - Sebawaing, North Huron, Bad Axe and Harbor Beach High Schools — and each has growing attendance. A week of assembly shows in junior and senior high schools was recently completed, with a burger bash being the grand finale — and more than 300 youngsters participated.

Weekly youth rallies, special Christian music concerts and other events help round out the YFC schedule, along with the recent (and successful) bake sale and auction over Labor Day weekend.

Probably best-known of all the YFC activities is the musical group "Allied," which this year will feature 40-plus singers from eight Huron County high schools. They perform all year long, bringing a positive, moral message to thousands of people in concerts statewide.

All these things are done by Executive Director Dwight Gascho and his motivated crew on shoe-string budgets. They do remarkable things with just a little — and they need your help.

As Gunden and Gascho say, people who can give a few dollars are very welcomed to support YFC. And, a \$25 gift monthly adds up to \$300 in support a year — GREATLY needed to do good things right here near your home.

So, before you send off \$15.95 (plus \$4 for shipping and handling) for some record album or wonderful skillet you see advertised on TV, think again. And before you send a "love gift" of \$5 or more to some far-away TV preacher, think again.

RECOLLECTIONS
Of By-Gone Days

Cars and cattle...

DEAR EDITOR:

Whenever I visit with young people they naturally talk about things that are happening today. It seems everybody is in such a hurry. Cars go a lot faster and roads are better and things cost a lot more than they used to.

There are a lot of things going on that we older people didn't know anything about when we were young. Maybe they are happier than we were, but I suppose our great-grandchildren will have it a lot different than our grandchildren have it.

When I was young and you had a car that went over 55 miles an hour, you were really going 80 or 90 miles an hour by the way cars are now.

Some cars had big steering wheels while others had smaller ones. You had to hang on real tight because we didn't have power steering and if you hit a bump, you felt it!

Back then you did things by hand and we didn't have all these sprays people use now. We didn't need to be afraid that everything we ate would cause cancer.

Back then an average farmer had 80 to 120 acres of land. We had four good horses and around 10 cows and 75 to 150 chicks. And if you had a big barn, you'd maybe have 15 or 20 steers.

Everybody had a straw stack at the back of his barn and the cows used to rub on them and the horses ate straw. All winter your bean straw and corn fodder all got worked into your manure pile and there was never any better fertilizer than that.

You had your beans and grain stored in your own grainery or corn crib. If you needed a little money, you'd take a couple beans or a few bags of wheat to town and sell them and you kept track of how high the market was.

And if you had some pigs to sell, you'd take them to the stockyard and ship them to Detroit and take whatever you got. If you had some cattle to sell, you had to keep track of the price because there were a lot of cattle buyers coming around to buy

them. They always tried to get me to lower my prices.

When we lived east of Elktion I had a cow to sell and my Dad told Joe Schmidt about it. He came to my place and brought a couple of men with him. Many of you older people remember Joe Schmidt — how he used to come around and buy your steers.

I showed them my cow and told them what I wanted for her. Of course, they wanted it for less money, but I insisted on what I wanted.

Then one of them said to the other one in German that we can come out on that price if we make sausage out of her. But I stuck to my price and got it and they said they were losing money.

So I told them to make sausage out of her and they wondered how I knew that. Joe told them I could speak German and were they surprised!

In Prov. 4:14 it says, "It is naught, it is naught saith the buyer, but when he is gone his way he boasteth."

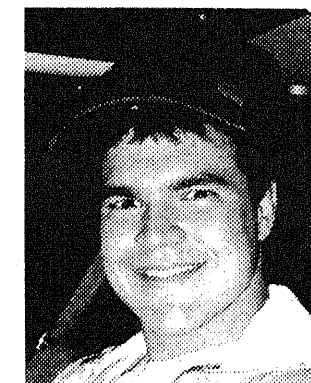
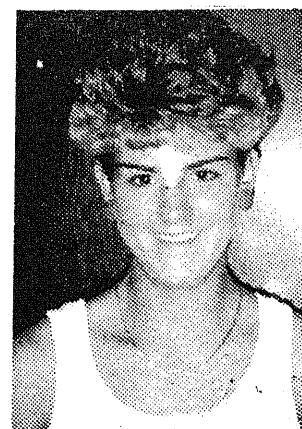
Well, I believe we all like to make a good deal but we should be careful who we deal with and not brag about it if we think we got the best end of the deal.

Kendall Wertz made use of his new kicking shoe going 6-6 in extra point conversions.

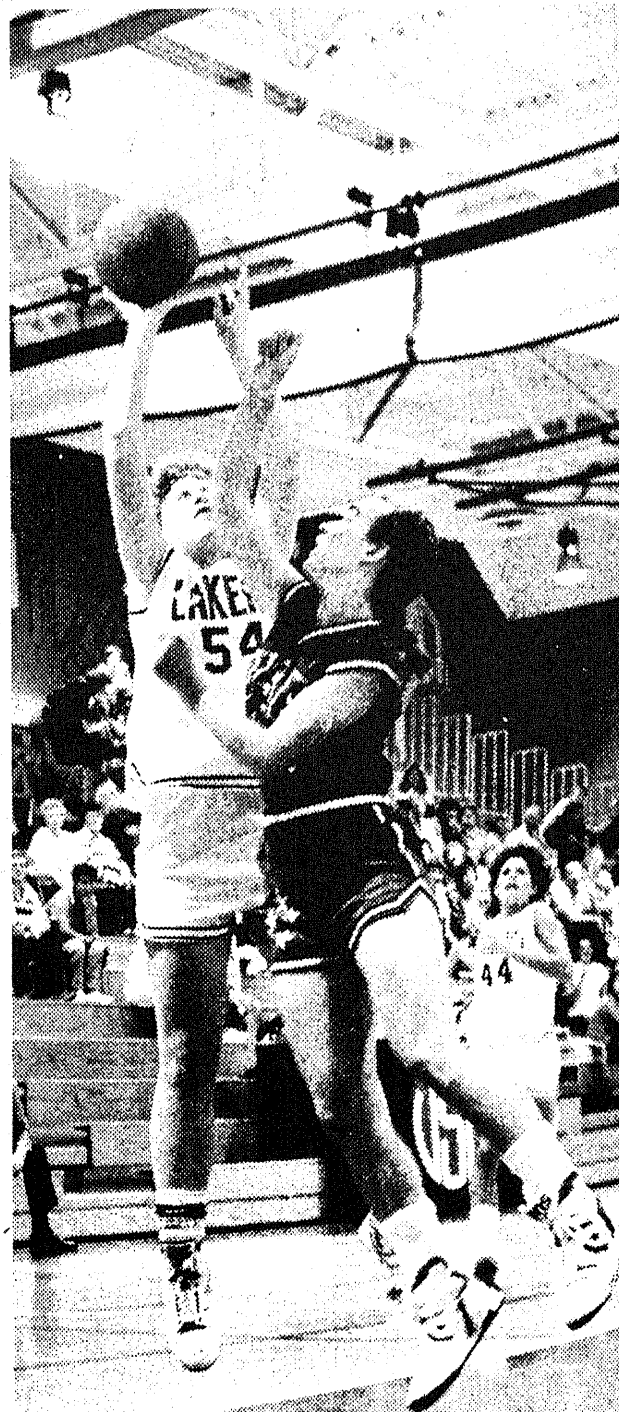
This week's opponent, Vassar -- need we say more?

TURNAROUND: But on Thursday night, the Lady Lakers were stopped by a potent Marlette Red Raider team, 65-54.

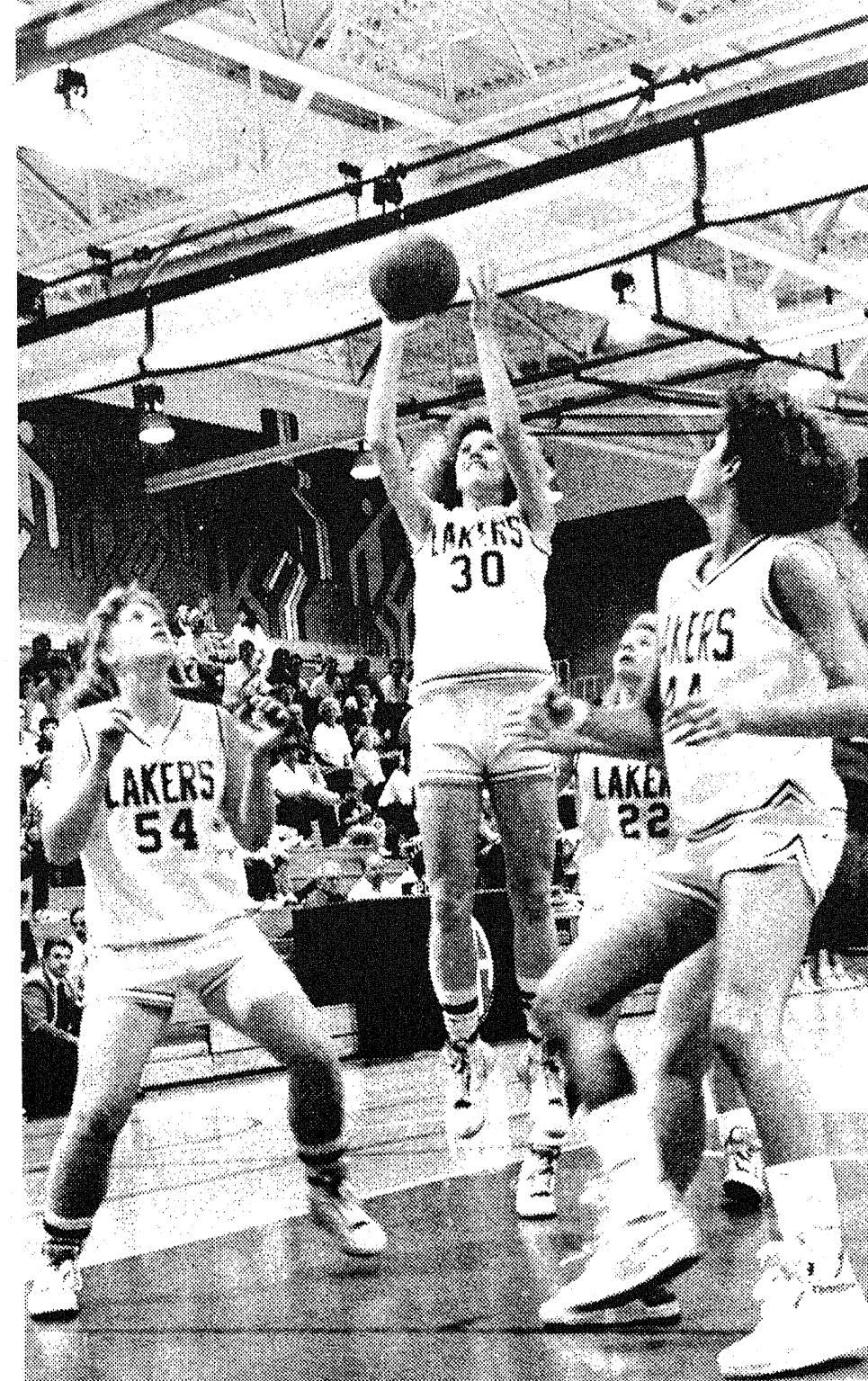
Coach Beachy described the loss as a result of a "defensive breakdown."

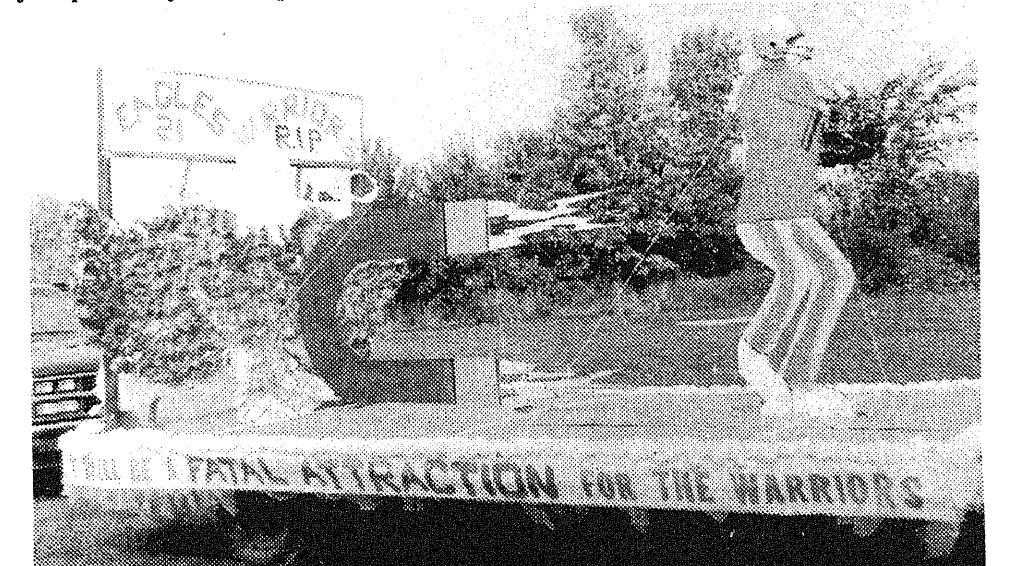

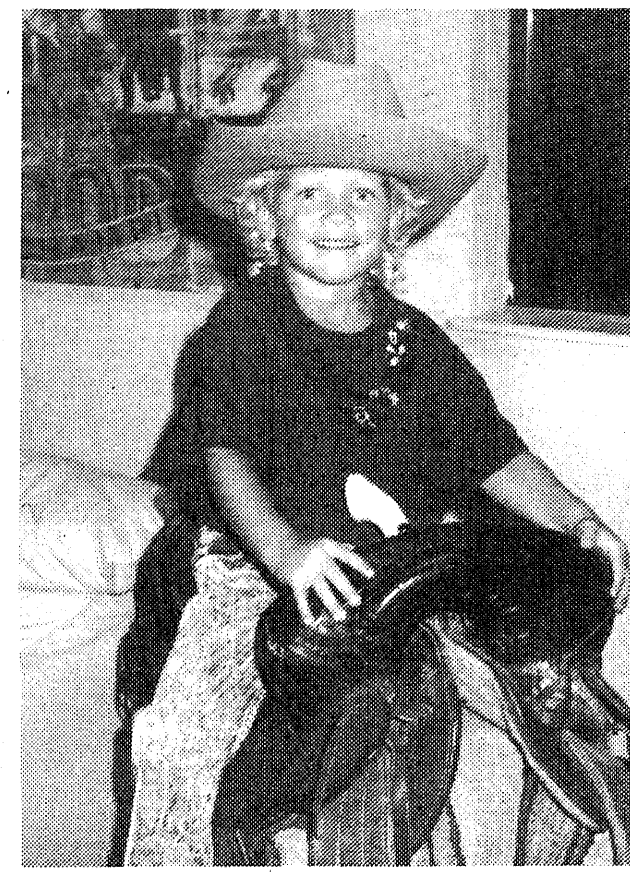

The occasion of death is most often marked by a ceremony or rite, most time religious. Generally the body of the deceased is present and viewed in a casket during the wake or visitation period and there is an organized procession to the place of final interment or cremation.

Some people choose an alternate to the funeral. There could be the disposition of the body without any attendant rites or ceremonies; or there could be a service prior to or following final disposition.

As there are alternatives to the funeral, there are also different forms of final disposition. These may include earth burial, entombment, cremation, burial at sea or donation of the body to a

medical institution. In most cases, the alternate forms of final disposition can include a funeral with the body present, if that is desired.

Memorialization can also take many forms. It could be a monument or a marker on grave, an inscription on a tomb or mausoleum or a gift to an institution in memory of the deceased.

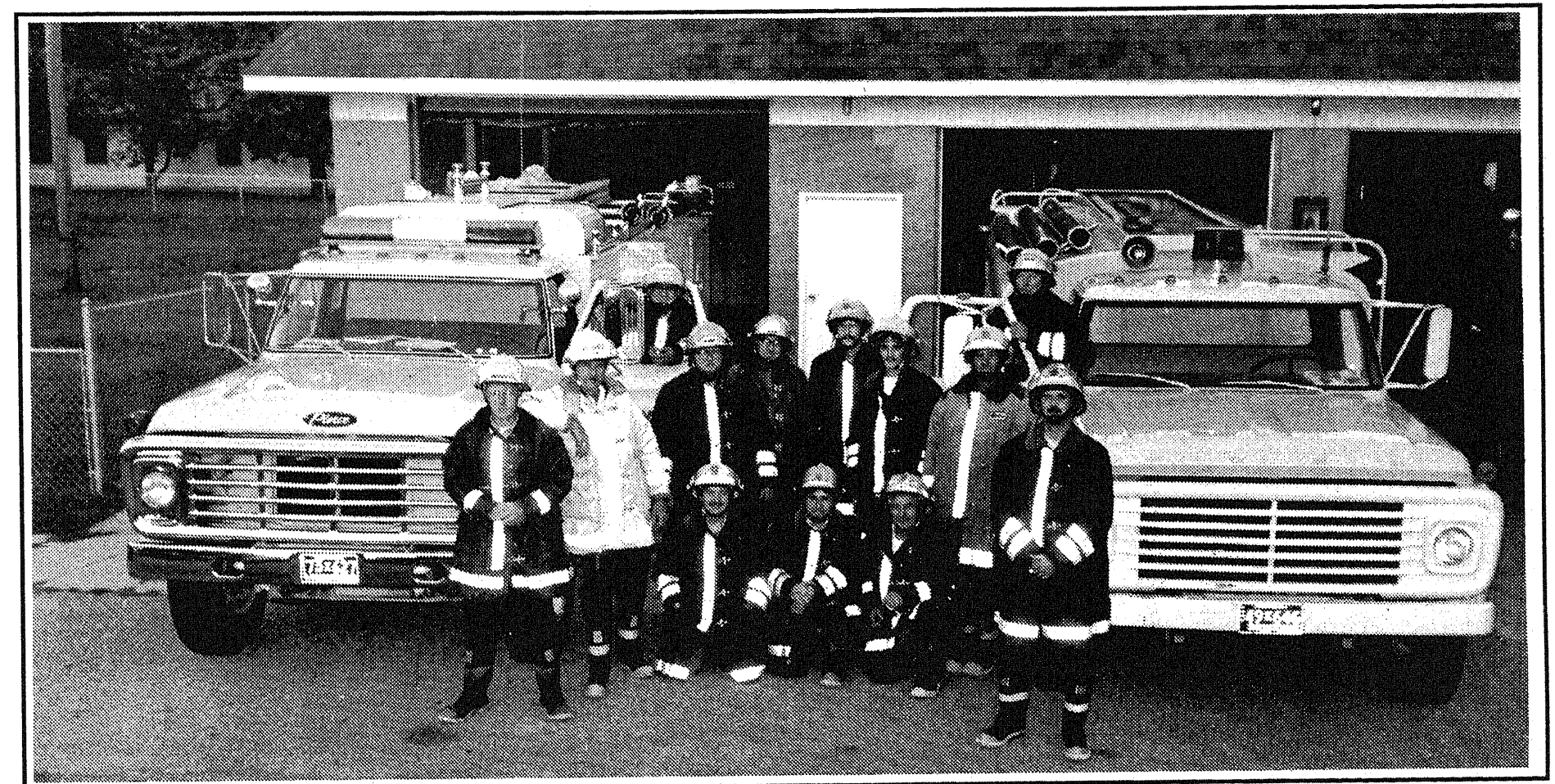

Rebuilding the wreckage left by drug addiction; Elderly couple pays for 'dead dog'

I'm asking for \$250 so I can buy my daughter and son bunk beds and a used bicycle for each of them. You see, their father also sold the new bikes they had received for their birthdays. Frankly, whatever you send, be it \$25, would be

most appreciated. — Mrs. B.J., Lancaster, Tex.

DEAR MRS. J.:

I hope you realize that if the kitchen sink hadn't been bolted down, your husband would have sold that, too. That's the thing about drug addiction — it knows no boundaries and has no limits.

It's my understanding that what your husband did is "par for the course" as far as addicts go. Should he elect for recovery someday, part of that process should involve making restitution.

Until such time, please accept my \$500 check to ease the pain of what he put you and the children through.

DEAR MR. ROSS:

I have a friend who really needs help, but is too proud to ask. He's living in a house with a broken down refrigerator that needs \$70 worth of parts. Try as he may, he just can't save up the money. Any extra left over from his measly income must go toward medi-

I used to think that people who were too proud to ask for help didn't merit assistance. I've since changed my mind, because I've learned that the majority of these people don't know how to ask.

Instead, I choose to recognize your friend's needs — both monetary and his need to maintain his quiet pride. This explains why I'm forwarding my check to you. Let your friend think his kitchen improvements are from you — it will rest that much easier on his mind.

My husband and I recently established a new campground. Along with this venture, we acquired new neighbors including an elderly couple who befriended us from the start.

Years ago, this couple adopted a stray dog when it was hit by an 18-wheeler. The dog was commonly referred to as "Bones."

They nursed and protected him from other animals that traveled into the area and posed a threat to this crippled dog. Just recently, we learned that Bones' health was failing and the couple had to leave him with a vet.

A week later, we were told the vet put Bones to sleep. This left the couple with a \$135 vet bill and a dead dog. I'm asking if you could possibly help them to pay the vet bill and eliminate their being caught "short" financially on their meager Social Security income. — Mrs. G.T., Shreveport, La.
