
Outdoor Report

A lucky 145 hunters were selected for the December elk hunt and the Thumb continued to be well represented. Richard Krohn of Elkton, Garv and Kenneth Stockoski of Port Austin, Joel Stoick of Caro and John Farver and Barbara Dudek of Fairgrove will be participating in the December 6 opener and are already knee-deep in preparation for this "once in a lifetime" hunt.

With the 1988 firearm deer season finally over, DNR officials will be tabulating the results and issuing information in the near future. A couple of records are sure to be set. The first will be a record kill. Preliminary reports have indicated that the harvest should be up by several percentage points making it the largest on record. The 2nd record was good news for everyone. Only 8 hunters lost their lives during the 1988 hunt. While this may sound morbid to some, one must realize that with 800,000 hunters in the field it was something short of a miracle. Compare those figures to a Sunday morning drive and you will know what I mean

Black powder hunters are getting ready for the muzzleloading season which begins this Friday. The 10-day hunt will give rifle hunters a chance to fill unused tags providing they hunt with a muzzleloader of at least .44 caliber.





ROBERT L. GILLINGHAM 1903-1988

Robert L. Gillingham, 85 of Caseville, a longtime prominent local businessman, passed away Friday, Dec. 2

following a lengthy illness. Mr. Gillingham was a descendant in a long line of business owners, commercial fishermen, realtors and Thumb promoters. He ran the Gillingham Fish Company of Bay Port with his late brother, John, owned North Island Fish Company of Caseville, and R. L. Gillingham Real Estate of Casev-

ille, and was past president of Peoples Oil and Gas Company

Long active in promoting the Thumb for tourism and vacationing, Gillingham was president of East Michigan Tourist Association in 1943, headquartered in Bay City.

The family was in commercial fishing on Saginaw Bay prior to the Civil War, as their schooners worked on Wildfowl Bay before Bay Port was established. At one time the family fleet numbered more than 20 vessels and fish from Saginaw and Wildfowl Bay were shipped to New York, Boston and Chicago.

A series of fires around the time of World War II caused the company to suspend commercial fishing. At that time the industry went into decline as the large volume of Walleye, Perch and Herring fishing deteriorated. The Gillingham involvement in fishing ended in 1968.

Mr. Gillingham was an accomplished violinist who began collecting hand-made instruments, until he had about 30. He often loaned the instruments to students in areas all across the country. He told how he received his first violin from his father in 1914, and he took the train from Bay Port to Sebewaing for violin lessons.

He was graduated from University of Michigan Law School in 1929, and was admitted to the State Bar of Michigan the same year. He was a member of F&AM and a past member of
