


Immunization status of your teen

The Huron County Health Department would like to remind all parents to review their childrens' immunization records to ensure they have met recommendations from the Michigan Department of Public Health.

The recommendations are that a child should have a Tetanus & Diptheria booster every 10 years. For instance, if your child received a booster shot of Tetanus & Diptheria upon entering school as a kindergartner, he/she should be eligible to receive a Tetanus & Diptheria booster at the age of 14 or 15.

Caseville water system helps future growth

STAFF TRAINING: Robert Peter, Caseville DPW superintendent, and village employe Wayne Champagne, have been taking courses sponsored by the Michigan Department of Public Health and the American Water Works Association for the past two years, and are now licensed to operate the plant after passing state exams.

Peter explained the new nology in water treatment.

"The plastic chips used in the clarifier are the very latest technology. We have the first clarifier of this type to be installed in Michigan," Peter says. He tests the water daily to make sure it meets all state standards for safety and purity, testing for bacteria, chlorine, suspended particles, and hardnes.
