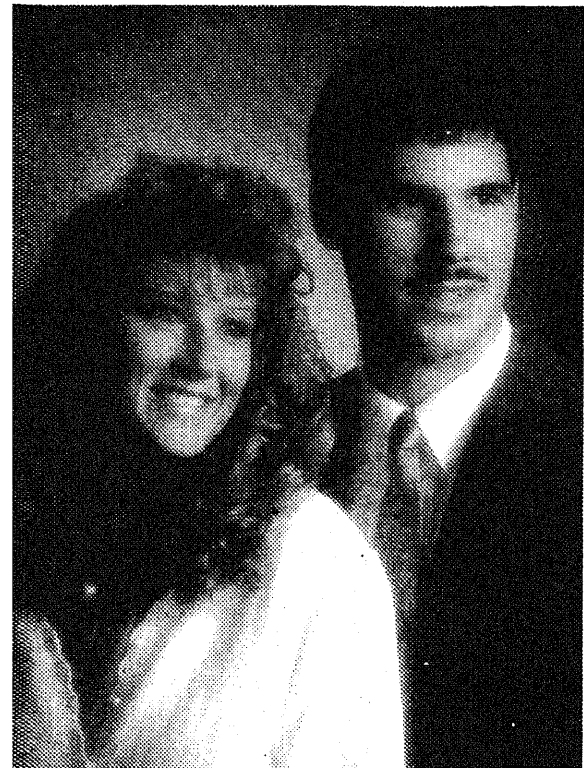

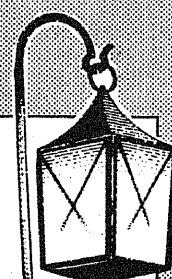

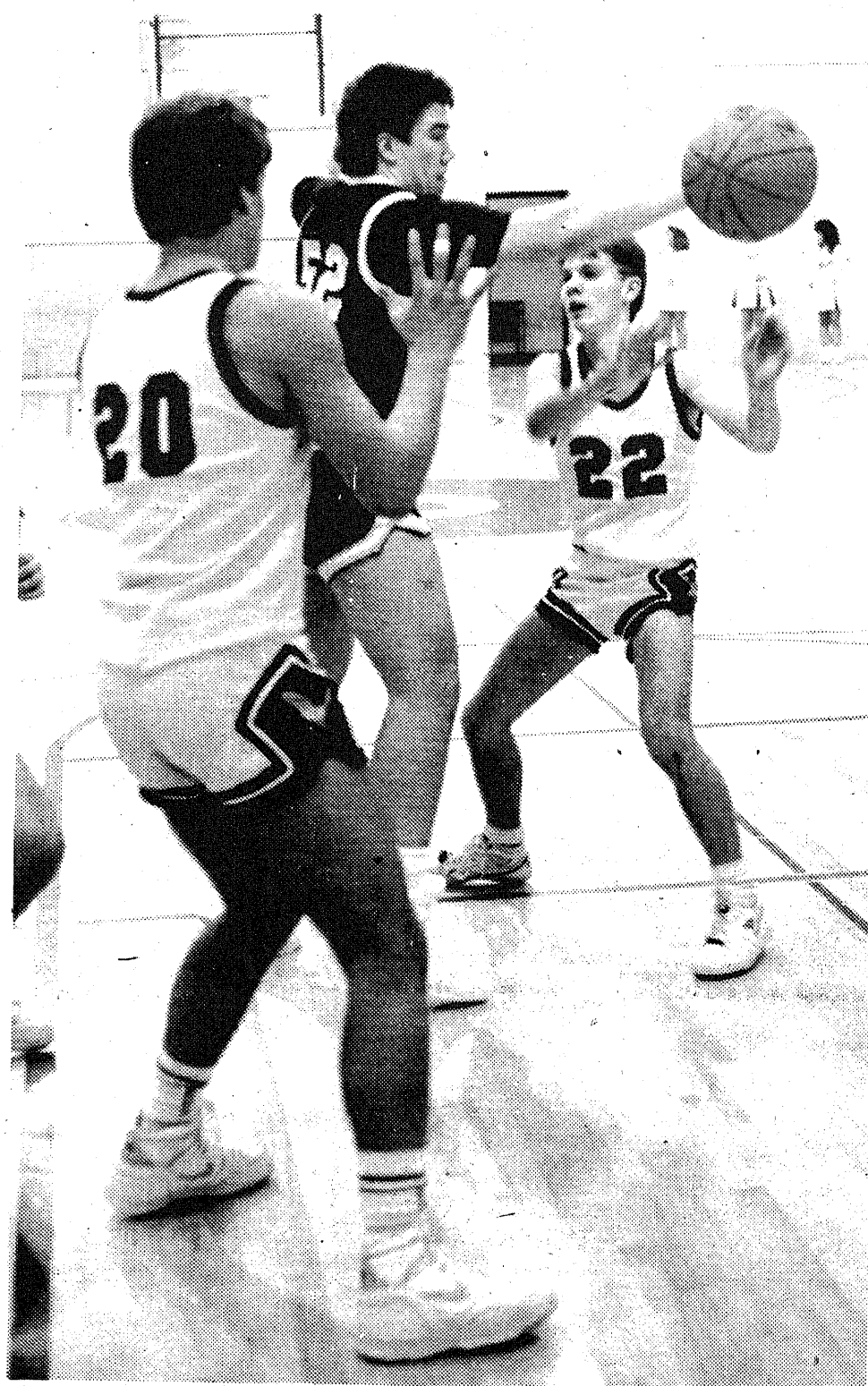

WOODS and WATERS

Skiing . . . Cross-Country style

I had never seen the snow so soft. With each stride, it parted briefly and then buried my skis with quicksand swiftness leaving only the protruding brown tips to convince me that I wasn't floating on some anti-gravity device from the twilight zone. Following the faint trail with deliberate strides, I fairly skimmed over the hard, packed snow that lay beneath last night's dusting. It was cross-country skiing at its best and I wanted to make sure it stayed that way.

Earlier, back at the road-head where I had parked the truck, I had considered making it an all-day trip. I had the necessary gear, both on my body and stuffed in the day pack riding on my back, but common sense told me that I would be crazy to try it on the first good snow of the season. Skiing in the country, although one of the most enjoyable pastimes during the winter

season, can be dangerously demanding, especially to a sedentary old fool like myself.

I had charged up the first several hills with the zest of a nordic racer and careened recklessly down the other sides with long, sweeping telemarks. Like a kid on Christmas break, I wanted to savor everything as fast as I could. But within a short time my heart pounded furiously inside my chest, my arms were leaden and my legs trembled from fatigue. I pulled in my horns and settled down to a steady stride that would eat up the distance and conserve the limited energy in my frail, old frame.

Skiers, even those of the cross-country variety, are notorious for their clothing and equipment and how well it fits their bodies, and while this is very important, what really matters is how fit your body is.

Cross-country skiing can

be a demanding sport, especially if you plan to use one of the hundreds of groomed trails available to you in Michigan. Many first-time skiers push themselves too hard and sometimes forget that following the trail into the woods is only half of the work. The other half, coming out, when you are dead on your feet, can be agony rather than enjoyment.

Because of this, it is important to get into condition ahead of time. I don't mean a strenuous program designed for serious competitors, but rather simple methods to increase the enjoyment of your skiing. The best is walking. Anyone who is on a program of 3 to 4 miles a day, for 3 to 4 days a

week is already in good enough shape for a full day ski trip. Remember, most of the good ski areas in Michigan are in quiet places and there are no provisions for a vehicle to pick you up if you get tired.

Another important facet of cross-country skiing is to dress right. The layering system is best, with underwear that draws moisture away from your body, an insulating layer is next, and finally a windproof, breathable layer on top. It is always smart to carry an extra sweater or down vest to slip on when you stop to rest. The perspiration generated by active skiing can cause a quick chill once the activity has stopped.

Taking along some extra fuel, in carbohydrate form, is also a good idea. Active skiing burns up calories at an alarming rate and the knowledgeable athlete knows that replenishing this loss is monumental in keeping your energy at a

high level. Candy bars, nuts, crackers, gorp and granola are just some of the ways to fill your fuel tank without loading your stomach. They all provide a quick lift and add to your fuel reservoir.

Don't forget to take along a small canteen or thermos of liquid. Many don't realize that dehydration is more of a problem in winter than it is in summer. Winter air is so dry that body fluids are lost at a much greater rate than during the warmer months.

My first cross-country ski trip of the winter was a memorable time. I had planned the distance, carried enough food, water and extra clothing to make it comfortable, waxed my skis with extra care, and didn't fall down once. Well, maybe just a couple of times....

OUTDOOR REPORT

Most hunters have wrapped up their seasons on New Year's Day. Those hardy fellows who were still chasing deer with bow and arrow, or grouse and squirrels with firearms had to hang it up on January 1. Rabbit hunters still get several weeks to trudge the woods, but cold weather and deep snow has caused havoc on most late season hunting this past year.

Ice fishing continued to be good during the past week. Perch action was reported good at Quincassee, good at Sebawaing, fair to good at Bay Port, and good to excellent at Caseville. Walleye action was poor for most of Saginaw Bay, but good success was reported of both the Tittabawassee and Saginaw Rivers.

Michigan's 1990 non-game wildlife tax check-off was recently kicked-off with the presentation of the program's annual poster. This year's theme is "Michigan Coastal Dunes-A Heritage Worth Saving". The Non-Game Wildlife Fund is part of the DNR Wildlife Division's Natural Heritage Program and is supported through citizen contributions through a check-off on the state income form. These contributions provide important funding for the protection and management of non-hunted wildlife, and endangered plants and animals in Michigan, including loons, eagles and spotted turtles.

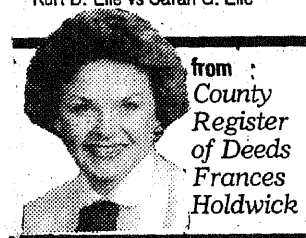

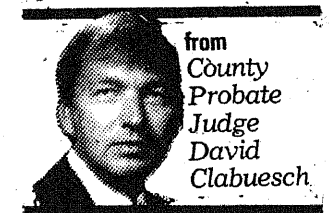



Wheelchair user deserves a boost

DEAR MR. ROSS:
After your TV appearance on Larry King, you've been a constant thought on my mind. Ten years ago, I was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis (MS). At that time, I was a 27 year old active working woman, full of independence. I had no idea what MS was — but quickly learned, because within two years, I was confined to a wheelchair.

In 1983, I moved into a wheelchair accessible apartment, which I'm able to maintain with the help of a health care attendant. I fill the hours in my day doing phone work for Animal Rights, caring for my plants and baking homemade bread, all with my best companion at my side, Twinkle, my dog.

Society moves fast, and healthy people don't have time to visit with me, for most of my time is spent in bed. I have only a few friends, but I'm happy nonetheless. It's important that you know I'm not bitter toward people being too busy for me, because until I landed in a wheelchair, I never knew anyone who was confined to one.

Now that you have my background, I'll present my request. I live on \$5 disability which covers the basics. I tightly budgeted. What I'm requesting are the funds to purchase an "Easy Stand" manufactured by the Ait Co. This device is a hydraulic lift system designed to help people like me to stand upright. I haven't stood up in seven years!

You have no idea what it would do for my self-esteem to be able to stand up again, not to mention the physical benefits. I just hope

you are sitting down when I tell you the cost is \$1,700. Even though I'm confined to my apartment, I've built a life for myself in which I'm happy and find rewards. Please add to my fulfillment in life, Mr. Ross, by granting my request. — Miss P.F., The Woodland, Tex.

DEAR MISS F.:
Get ready to stand up and be counted as a THANKS A MILLION recipient! The fine folks at Ait, Inc. in Redwood Falls, Minn. made me a deal I couldn't refuse to obtain for you a "Easy Stand" — arrangements are made, and the shipment is on the way. VILLAGE OF CASEVILLE Proposed Wastewater Treatment Facility

The U.S. Department of Agriculture, Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has received an application for financial assistance from the Village of Caseville. The specific elements of the proposed action are to build a wastewater lagoon system in Caseville, MI. The lagoon site is described as all that part of the E 1/2 of the S 1/4 of section 25 lying S of the Pigeon River and Nly 780 ft of the E 1/2 of the NE 1/4 of Section 36 and Wly 33 ft of the E 1/2 of the NE 1/4 of Section 36, Caseville Township, Huron County, MI with the exception of certain easement grants. The project will also provide sewer collection lines to all developed building lots in the Village of Caseville. The total cost of the project is \$5,824,000. FmHA is considering a loan of \$2,174,000.00 and a grant of \$1,400,000.00 to assist in financing the project.

FmHA has assessed the potential environmental impacts of this proposed action and determined that the location(s) of some collection lines, a pump station and the lagoon discharge line will impact the 100 year floodplain and/or wetlands. It has been determined that there is no practicable alternative to avoiding this impact. The basis of this determination is summarized as follows.

A portion of the discharge line from the lagoon system to the Pigeon River will be built in a wetland. New sewer collection lines will be built in road right-of-ways that pass through several scattered wetlands within the Village. Sewer collection lines and a pump station will also be placed in the floodplain which includes several homes and businesses near the Saginaw Bay shoreline.

The Village Council has decided to make sewer service available to all potential users within the Village of Caseville. Some of these users are located within the flood plain and others cannot be reached without placing sewer collection lines in road right-of-ways that pass through scattered wetland areas. Various alternatives prepared by the consulting engineering firm have been considered before arriving at this final decision.


Mitigation measures will include obtaining DNR wetland permits for any construction in a designated wetland area and restoration of that area to its original state. The collection system in these sensitive areas has been designed to meet the needs of existing users and not to expand development. The Village will adopt a wetlands ordinance for use within the Village of Caseville.

The mitigating measures identified in this notice have been agreed upon by the Village Council and will be followed. The proposed actions conform to applicable State and Local floodplain protection standards. The pump station located within the floodplain will be raised to above the 100 year floodplain level in accordance with those standards.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency is also providing assistance for this project. Any written comments regarding this determination should be provided within fifteen (15) days of this publication to Charles E. Kelsey, District Director, Farmers Home Administration, 852 South Hooper St., Caro, MI 48723. FmHA will make no further decisions regarding this proposed action during this fifteen (15) day period. Requests to review the FmHA Environmental Assessment upon which this determination is based or to receive a copy of it should be directed to the above address.
