


Record numbers expected for Bowfishing event June 1-3

Farmer Bob now awaits warm, sunny weather, which will make the corn and beets grow rapidly.



Outdoor Report

Michigan's bass season, walleyes, trout and salmon fishing provided the hottest action throughout the Bay. Walleyes were very active along most of the shoreline with Hot n' Tots and crawlers harnesses being the best bet, and six to eight feet of water being the best depth.

Lake trout fishing has been hot at Conditione City all week and salmon were hitting offshore at Port Austin. Best depths there were in the 50 to 60 foot range and various spoons were all attracting fish.

The DNR has announced plans to hold two elk hunts again this year. The first hunt, held in October will have 90 permits available, with 30 of those hunter's choice permits. The late hunt, held in December, will have 140 permits and 50 of those will be hunter's choice permits. Biologist are hoping that the two hunts will reduce the state's elk herd to 850

Elk license applications will be available August 1 and there will be a \$4 nonrefundable lee with the application. Successful applicants must then pay \$100.35 for their elk license.
