





I left my parents when I was 16, the voungest of seven children, to seek an education and a better way of life. As you may know, alcoholism is a major setback for American Indians. All my brothers and sisters have taken up this habit, and I don't want to follow in their footsteps

Since I was the last child, my parents expected me to live wisely and become something. On my own, I graduated from high school and attended college while working nights at a restaurant to pay for school and board. Six months ago, I completed college and am currently working for a mortgage company. I enjoy my job and feel lucky to be in the business world. Meanwhile, my parents are both getting old-my father is 83, and my mother is 67. My father has been ill and can't seem to get better. A Navajo medicine man told him that he needs to have a ceremony done for him very soon or his illness will worsen. I am not sure if you are familiar with the ceremonies my people have for the sick. Because it is sacred to them, I cannot say too much. These ceremonies really do heal

the sick. My parents are asking that I assist them financially, but I find myself in a bind. I am asking you to help with the \$300 needed to buy Indian blankets, woven baskets, buckskin,food and enough to pay the medicine man
