

Lakers finish last TBA season in second place

The Lady Lakers ended their regular season last week with a mini-replay of the first and second halves of the season.

A heartbreaker of a loss in double overtime to the Marquette Red Raiders started off the week, and a victory over Vassar followed on Friday.

Those games mirror the season, as the Lakers stormed through the first half of the season, seemingly on their way to the Thumb B title.

But Coach Paul Beachy says his team fell into a slump in the second half, dropping first into a tie for first place with Millington, finally settling into the second place spot with a 10-4 record.

The games also gave a bit of revenge to each of the winners, as the Lakers had previously beaten Marquette, and Vassar had taken a game from the Lakers earlier in the season. No team in the league has beaten the Lakers twice this season.

Marquette traveled to Laker country seeking to avenge their earlier loss, and for three quarters of the game, it looked as if they would fail at their mission. The Lakers ended the second and third quarters with a six point lead, but then the Raiders roared back, outscoring the Lakers 17-11 in the fourth.

The lead seesawed back and forth throughout the period, and it looked as though time would run out with the Lakers down by two. But a long jumper by D.J. Ferris tied the game at 42-42, and the game went into overtime.

The first overtime ended with the game tied again at 46-46. Marquette pulled ahead

Complaint about cable changes

DEAR EDITOR:

Last Monday night at the Caseville Township meeting, it was announced that Harron Cable TV was going to take channel 11 off the cable. Apparently there is an obscure FCC rule that allows channel 25 (10 on cable) to complain to Harron about territorial rights. Since both are CBS affiliates, channel 25 has the territory for CBS programs served by Harron Cable TV.

Harron could block out 11 at those times when both are broadcasting the same CBS program (to comply with the FCC rules) but has for now opted to take 11 off the cable all together. I don't know when because as I write this, channel 11 is still on.

It's my opinion that if Harron has the choice it should

take off channel 25 and not channel 11.

My reasons are these: Channel 11 picture quality is always better than 25. I like to watch channel 11 weather because it seems their meteorologists cover the eastern half of the lower peninsula quite thoroughly. Their forecasts are often useful to us here near the tip of the Thumb. Channels 5 and 12 weather as well as 25 are all similar. So there is no loss if 25 goes off the air.

Finally channel 11 brings us Detroit Lions football when the Lions play at home and they're blacked out because the Silverdome is not sold out. Channel 25 is within the 75 mile radius for blacking out whereas channel 11 and most importantly we, are not.

I think the only way to stop

this is to do at least three things in mass.

1. Let Harron know you aren't happy.

2. Write the Federal Communications Commission in Washington, D.C. and tell them we are being discriminated against. A special ruling should be possible allowing a variance to the existing FCC rules.

3. Let Congressman Bob Traxler know of the problem. He'll untie the bureaucracy, so the special ruling gets done.

It does no good for Harron to complain to the FCC directly without the viewers support. That's thought of as one competitor for our business (viewing audience) trying to brow beat another competitor. It must be a grass roots campaign. Let's get on with it.

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Out in the Field WITH "FARMER BOB"



From planting the seed in the spring to the final plowing in the fall, Farmer Bob has had a busy and productive year.

He's planted and harvested dry edible beans, sugar beets, and corn, and he says yields from all three crops have been good. Corn, the last crop to be harvested, has yielded about 140 bushels an acre, an above average yield.

Moisture, though, is a bit high, even though this year's crop was harvested about two weeks later than last year's.

Farmer Bob plows as many fields as he can before the winter freeze, as it makes it much easier for him to get back into the fields in the spring. Springtime can be a wet season, and that could delay his plowing and subsequently his planting. Plowing in the fall also allows the soil to get plenty of moisture through the winter, to give tender spring plants a head start on the new growing season.

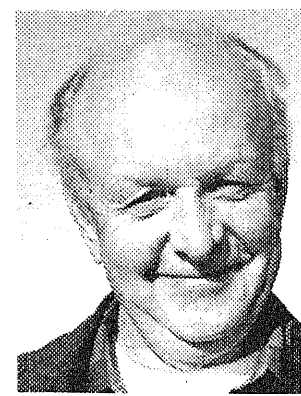

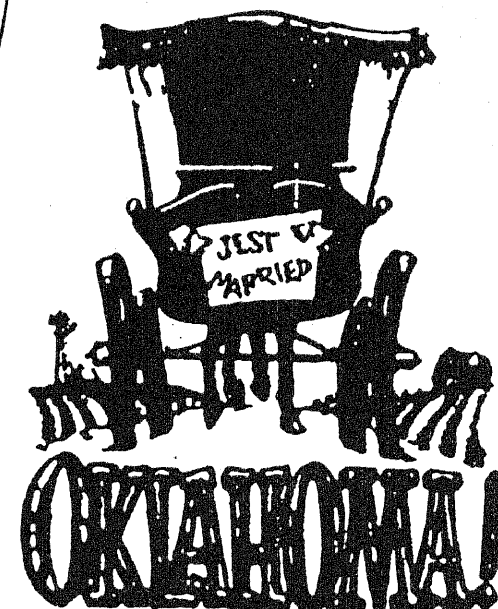

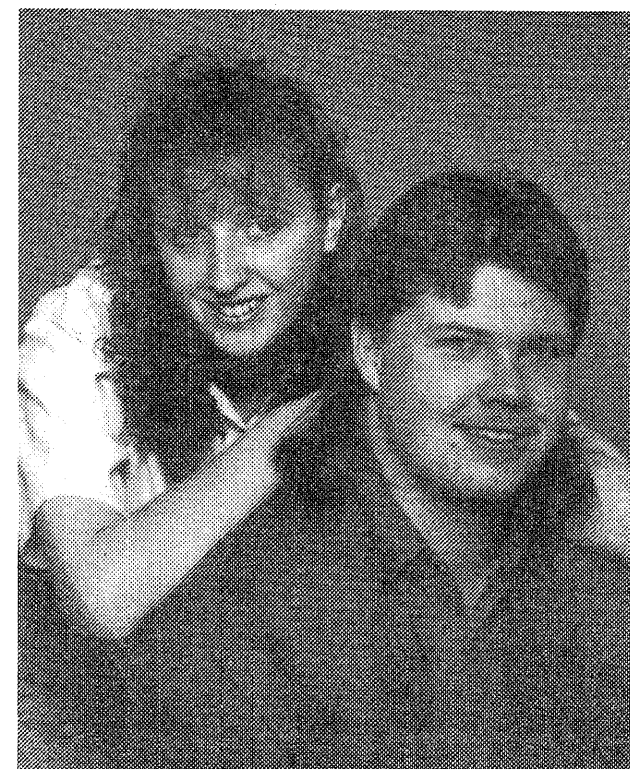

An applicant cannot be a dependent on someone else's Federal Income Tax, unless they are over 60 years of age, according to Edwin H. Eichler, CEO of Pigeon Telephone.

For example: A family of one with a monthly income of less than \$681; or family size of eight with a household income of less than \$2,304 are eligible for Lifeline Service.

Pigeon Telephone Company customers may be eligible to receive: \$4.00 off their monthly phone bill; one-half off the usual tariff rate charges (up to \$30) for new service hook-ups.

Customers seeking more information and applications should contact a Pigeon Telephone Company customer service representative at 453-4321 or 800-292-0614 or stop by the business office at 7585 Pigeon Road, Pigeon during regular business hours.

When the new Lifeline Service goes into effect on Dec. 1, all local telephone exchange companies in Michigan will be offering Lifeline Service.

If a person is not a customer of Pigeon Telephone Company or does not reside in Pigeon Telephone Company's service area, one can still receive Lifeline Service from his/her own local telephone exchange company.

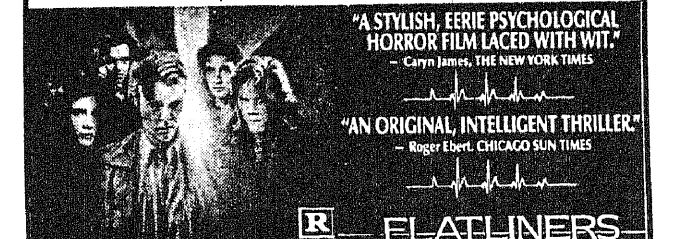

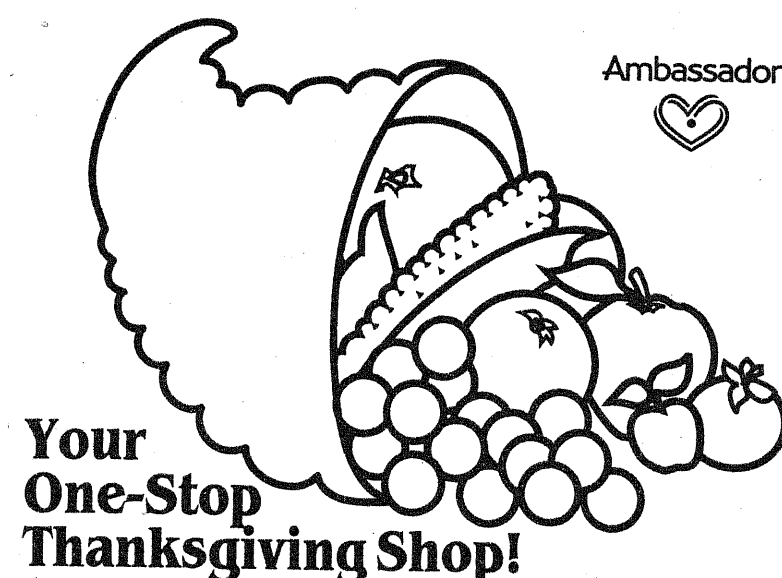
